### Not a Nuisance--in Milwaukee.

A test case brought by the city of Milwaukee, under an anti-smoke ordinance, has been lost, the court ruling that the city had failed to establish the fact that the black smoke was a nuisance. The evidence introduced by the city attorney consisted of photographs showing dense smoke issuing from a brewery's chimney, the testimony of persons living near who had seen the smoke, and the reports of tests made by the officers of the health department. The court did not consider the constitutionality of the law.





George Wilson Has Returned from the Philippine Islands.

A Returned Soldler Boy Tells Many Interesting facts of tils Experience in that

When Mr. George Wilson of Brenham enlisted in the United States army to go to the Philippine islands he did so to fight to uphold the standard of his country and did his share of it, having participated actively in every skirmish and battle in which his regiment was engaged. Incidentally he picked up a great fund of information on all subjects, relating not only to the operations of the American army, but the history of the country and customs toes. of these people.

Since his return Mr. Wilson has not been very well, notwithstanding which fact he is fond of rewhich time the insurgents made ial exquisitely beautiful. a great many attempts to break through our lines but were in brush with the enemy, and while there were no casualties on either side we dispersed their forces and captured a great quantity of ord ance stores, arms, prisoners and supplies of every kind. From Passay we were ordered to St. Peter's McCartey, where the United States torces were mobilized. The first night we slept or tried to sleep, in a torrent of rain. Next morning at 5 o'clock, with our 9pound rifes, extra ammunition and two days rations, we were on the march for Zapata bridge without trail or road, in the grass and brush shoulder high, skirmishing as we went. The second day we had the novel experience of repelling a bolo charge, which is considered an act of great desperation by the Filipinos. Armed with a weapon something like a Spanish machete, they cast aside arms and everything that cumbers them, and rely on hacking and slashing their way to victory. We had them badly whipped before they got near enough to use their bloody bolos. Slege of Ladysmith.

London, Nov. 11 .- The British war office has received from Gen. Buller the following dispatch:

Cape Town, Thursday evening, Nov. 9.—Have received by pigeon post from Gen. White to-day the following:

"The bombardment at long range by heavy guns continues daily. A few casualties are occurring, but no serious harm is being done.
