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## EPIDEMIC NOT SUFFICIENT TO JUSTIFY ALARM

While there are estimated something over five hundred cases of influenza in the town, the death rate has been very low, only two having died, and there is no cause for alarm over the situation. The disease has spread much worse than it did last year, but complications and pneumonia have been very rare. There is no doubt of the epidemic being influenza, but it is of a much milder type than last winter. Few homes in the town have escaped, and in several instances whole families are down with the disease, but the doctors have so far been able to cope with the situation and will no doubt in a few days have it stamped out.

The health officials warn against the customary hysteria that the public is accustomed to fall into when there are chances of an epidemic. Every precaution should be taken the doctors say, against coughing and sneezing in crowded places and the best thing to do when you get a cold is to immediately do something for it. The shows are no place for sick persons, the doctors state, and if people, not well, persist in frequenting these places, the authorities may find it necessary to close them for the time being.

## MILK AND BUTTER PRODUCTION PROFITABLE

Edgar H. Kemp, County Agent. For years the farmers of the North, East, West and Northwest have maintained a very profitable sideline to their general plan of work: that of dairying on a small scale. Portions of the South and Southwest are coming now to realize that something has been overlooked in our scheme of things, and are rapidly entering into the buying and production of better strains of milk and butter producing cows. Whatever breed if economical producers of these products, such animals are very valuable assets, not only to the individual farmer but to the community and section at large.

At the present and for some time past the Holstein breed has the day as the greatest producer of milk and butter. These dairy cattle are yet practically unknown in this section. However, there are many cows of this breed which have records of as high as 120 gallons of milk and 35 pounds of butter a week. These are of course exceptionally fine cows, but a production of from six to ten gallons of milk and from two and a half to three pounds of butter fat a day are common. Anyone who has kept up with this breed will readily recognize these statements as facts. A very forceful argument in favor of these is their adoption by the successful dairies in practically all of our large cities and by some of the milk producing corporations in the world. If these people with thousands and even millions of dollars invested find these to be the most profitable cattle is it not a fact that this breed should be equally profitable for the farmer?

There is a steady market in the cities for milk and milk products. One of the large Dallas dairies maintains a milk-buying station at Denton and there are innumerable small towns in the state which are regularly shipping milk and cream into the markets.

Under present conditions in this country a single cow giving six gallons, testing around five per cent butter fat, will easily yield a return of five dollars a day.

Anyone interested in these cattle should communicate with me at the earliest possible date and I will be glad to assist them in getting a start of these. It may be possible to secure financial aid where necessary.

## LOVING HAS CO-OPERATIVE COUNCIL OF AGRICULTURE

Realizing the futility of single-handed endeavor in marketing their products, the farmers of Loving and that vicinity met on Monday night, February 2nd, at Loving and went into permanent organization. G. B. Underwood was elected president and J. M. Barnett secretary.

Mr. Kemp, county agent of Young county, was present and made a short address to the meeting in which he commended the spirit manifested and urged the necessity of organization work, and assured the Council of the help and co-operation of A. & M. College, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture as well as himself. Washington is exceedingly anxious that the farmers organize themselves into these Councils; and it is Mr. Kemp's plan to further this work in Young county as rapidly as possible.

It is alarming when one learns that today the class of producers is greatly in the minority; in fact only twenty-one per cent of the population of the county is in the country, and that is rapidly decreasing. Why? Easily answered! What incentive has the farmer boy or girl to stay in the country, or the grown folks, for that matter? Little or no recreation and no conveniences which the people in the towns regard not as luxuries but necessities. Can the farmer have these? He can, but not under the present scheme of things. He must be paid a better rate and have better marketing conditions for his crops. How is he to remedy this? He must organize himself with his neighbors into a mutual welfare body, and make known his wants as an organization and act as such and not as an individual. Our country's most brilliant men realize this and are bending every effort to encourage the farmer to place himself in a position where he may better himself.

## OIL FIELD DEVELOPMENT RUSHING LYDON WELL INCREASING FLOW DAILY

The Lydon well continues to increase in flow. The first of the week it passed the 2,000-barrel mark and reports from there since then are to the effect that it has improved at least one hundred barrels since Monday. The work of development in that section has been better than would be supposed possible with the present wretched conditions of roads and several new derricks will soon be completed.

On the Ed McCluskey place just the other side of South Bend, where a new location has been made a derrick is being hurriedly erected and everything is expected to be ready for work by the 15th of this month.

Every day brings the line of the great oil field nearer to Graham and every week shortens the hauling distance from the freight yards to the new locations. By the close of summer it is confidently believed derricks will be visible in ever direction from town.

The Timmons well, five miles southwest from Graham, is now known to be a paying producer, although drilling will be continued there until the lower sand is tested. The McKee well in that same locality is now drilling at a little better than 1200 feet through formations identical with those found in both the Goode and Timmons wells. So there is but little room for doubt of a good strike being made there within the next few weeks. Oil lease and royalties in the Graham field continue to advance as the development progresses, giving evidence of the fact that confidence in the field also continues to increase.

Childress established a new record for hog sales last Tuesday when a stock raiser of that city sold forty-nine full blood Duroc-Jersey sows to local citizens for a total of \$15,999.00.

It seems to us that now is the time to build good roads in Young county. The present crowded living conditions of Graham make an epidemic of any kind and degree of intensity bad, because we have no facilities whatever for caring for the diseased. Every rooming house, hotel, and home is crowded so that it is impossible to check the spread of the disease, and those afflicted cannot receive the care and attention they could if we had a well equipped hospital to which they could be taken. As the city grows the demand for a hospital will increase. Contagious diseases of all kinds are sure to be brought here when the inevitable boom opens, and no time should be lost in preparing for the erection of a hospital building, fully equipped and adequate to care for the city for years to come.

## HUNTERS USING AN AIRPLANE ARRESTED.

The first arrest under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act for hunting wild fowl from an airplane was made in Missouri recently when the long arm of the law reached into the air and seized two men for hunting and killing wild geese from an air craft. The arrest was made by a warden of the Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture, which administers the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. Following their arrest the hunters made the trip to the office of the United States Commissioner at Caruthersville, Mo., in their plane. They had previously boasted of their ability, while flying, to herd the geese more effectively than sportsmen on the ground can possibly do. Hunting of the sort in which they engaged is specifically forbidden by the Federal and the regulations thereunder. Several states have passed laws forbidding hunting from airplanes, among them being California, Michigan, New Jersey, North Carolina and South Carolina. There is considerable sentiment in sporting circles against the practice, on the ground that it is unsportsmanlike.

## WICHITA COUNTY NETS \$2,000 FROM RENTING JURY-ROOM

Wichita Falls, Texas, Feb. 2.—Renting beds in the jury rooms at the court house netted Wichita County over \$2,000 in 1919, according to the County Auditor's report. The beds were rented at \$1 per night when not needed by jurors, and helped to relieve the room shortage here to some extent.

# NEWSPAPER MISTAKES

Occasionally a few of the many mistakes made by workers in newspaper offices escapes a whole galaxy of watchers for mistakes; the writer, the editor, the linotype operators, the proofreader, back to the linotype operator, then back to the printer, back to the proofreader, then to the printer and on to the pressman.

Then the mistakes are sent out for inspection of all the people and some of the readers swell up and nearly burst with self-importance on discovering the mistakes of the ignoramuses who make newspapers.

## W. O. W. "INSURGENTS" WIN FIRST SKIRMISH

The "insurgents" in the Woodmen fight have taken on new hope with the news from Sedalia, Mo., that the Federal Court there has overruled a motion to dismiss the injunction suit pending against the supreme officers. Mrs. Ida R. Heck, 1620 Alston Avenue, guardian of Maple Hurst Grove, has received a telegram to this effect from attorneys at Sedalia.

Texas Woodmen opposed to the new rates published by the order joined with Missouri "insurgents" in filing Federal Court proceedings against the supreme officers. Under this injunction the old insurance rates of the order are still in effect. The new rates were to go into effect Jan. 1.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

## INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC OF 1918 MADE RECORD HIGHEST

Washington, Feb. 2.—The death rate in the United States for 1918 was the highest on record, according to the census bureau's annual mortality statistics issued today which shows 1,471,367 deaths for the year representing a rate of 18 per cent for 1,000 population.

Of the total 477,467 or over 32 per cent, were due to influenza and pneumonia, 380,996 having occurred in the last four months of the year when an epidemic of this disease prevailed.

The other principal causes of death were the organic diseases of the heart, tobacco, acute nephritis, Bright's disease and cancer, which together were responsible for 391,391 deaths, or nearly 27 per cent of the total during the year.

# SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION AFTER BOOK COS

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23, 1920.

To Book Companies Holding Texas Contracts.

Gentlemen:

One half of the scholastic year has passed and many orders for free text books for Texas schools still remain unfilled. It is useless to tell me that a sufficient supply of your text books is in the state so long as this condition exists. I understand fully the adverse conditions under which you have, this year, attempted to carry out your contracts. I have explained these conditions to the people of my state, both through the newspapers and in public addresses. I have borne patiently the abuse heaped upon me as a result of the inconvenience to which pupils and teachers have been subjected. I wish now to suggest to you that you make sure that there shall be no repetition next fall of the delays, from which we have suffered this year, or that, if you cannot fill your contracts promptly next year, you give them up and let us purchase text-books elsewhere.

It is true that our schools were late in sending in requisitions for books. I had no law by which to compel prompt action. But it is also true that we waited patiently during three months of delay, before making urgent demands upon you.

This year I shall enforce rigidly the law in regard to promptness in making requisitions. I expect then to demand that each school shall have its books before its opening day. I would respectfully suggest to you that you begin now to send to our State a supply of your books sufficient to meet demands. Do not wait till August to forward shipments.

Investigations of mine as to conditions in the past show that delays in supplying text books by the opening of the schools have been of frequent occurrence. My opinion is that delays will continue to hamper our schools, so long as distribution is attempted through one state depository. In any of our large cities, car shortages and congestion at our freight and express offices will cause delay when vast numbers of books are to be shipped within a short time. The adoption of five different shipping points in as many sections of the state would enable us to avail ourselves of more car space and five times as many freight and express offices with their additional forces for handling books. Most of the book companies pay the cost of book distribution on a percentage basis. This plan would probably result in little or no increase in expense to you, and, in the end, might be more economical, if you consider the cost to you in the future of the penalties for delay.

I shall not again face the people of Texas with excuses for text-book shortages. My advice to the schools next fall will be to the effect that if their books have not been delivered in time for the opening of school their best course will be to take immediate measures for legal proceedings.

If you have the faintest idea of what I have endured during the past six months, or the slightest notion of the increase of work which the delays have caused in my department, you cannot but feel that I am justified in my attitude in regard to next year and future years. The present plan of distribution from one shipping point has not been successful in the past, and we have no cause to suppose that it will be so in the future.

If you are willing to join in a different plan to be arranged with me through your representatives, at a meeting at my office, I shall be glad to call such a meeting. If not, I shall consider the matter closed until I can get desired changes in the present law; but I shall expect no more delays in text book deliveries.

I wish to call your attention to the use of teachers employed in the schools as book agents, and the practice of attempts of employees of book companies to act as teacher-replacing agencies. There are few who have followed these policies, but their actions have caused criticism and discord.

18. Have your doctor examine you carefully once a year. Also consult your dentist at regular intervals.

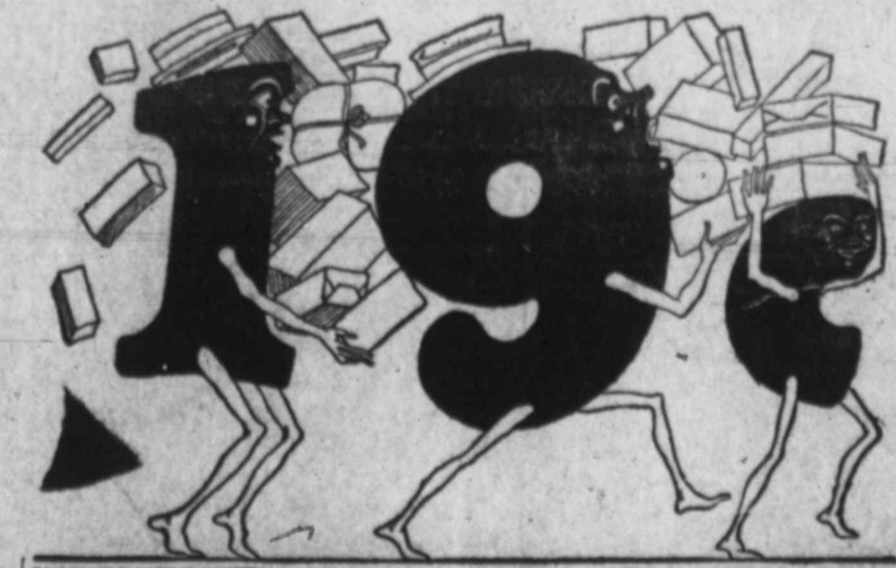
