BAD CHECKS

A few days ago The Leader reporter was in one of our banks and saw one of our merchants with several checks which the bank had refused to accept. It seems that the legislative body of Texas ought to GRAHAM pass a law providing adequate punishment for persons who give worthless checks. There is a so-called law against giving worthless checks, but it is about as worthless as the checks, for the reason that it exempts from DALLAS prosecution people who once had money in the bank on which they later gave checks. The man who had five dollars in the bank last year and drew it our may give a check on the same bank this year and escape prose-

The giving of fradulent checks is now a daily transaction in every Texas town. Every merchant in Graham has checks which has been turned down at the banks, and is either trying to get his money on them or has given up in despair and charged the checks to the loss account. The tender of a check is the same as the tender of a five dollar bill, and the man who knowingly gives a fradulent check is just as guilty of obtaining goods unlawfully as the man who tenders a counterfeit bill. To be sure the merchants can refuse to accept checks, but ninety per cent of the country's business is conducted with checks, and there should be a law with teeth in it for the protection of the public and the punishment of those who defraud in this way. Certainly no one desires to see anyone punished who gives a check believing he has funds to meet it, for those who do this are always ready and anxious to make their checks good. but a law against giving worthless rect age on their poll tax receipts or checks would make all of us more careful in keeping our accounts. The merchants tell us, however, that a very large per cent of the worthless checks given are never made good.

"TEN YEARS AGO"

Texas is the banner cotton state, the banner meat-producing state, the banner rice-producing state, and it bids fair to become the banner petroleum-producing state. Texas produced agriculture wealth of a value making it the first among the agricultural states of the union. Speaking towns, the Dallas News says:

Ten years ago not a single city in Texas had a population of as much as 100,000; now four have. Ten years ago, those four had an aggregate population of 340,830; now they have an aggregate population of 546,842. A more impressive evidence of how rapidly Texas has been urbanized is in the fact that the ten largest cities of Texas have an aggregate population of only a little less than a million, which is probably a fifth of the population of the state. The complete count is likely to show that nearly if not quite half the people of the state live in towns of 5,000 or more population, and the life of the town of only 5,000 is more urban than rural. 

COAL MINERS GET \$85,000,000 RAISE

Washington, Aug. 30 .- President Wilson today approved the majority report of the Anthracite Coal Commission, awarding anthracite miners wage increases aggregating \$85,000,-000, and notified the miners that he expected them "to accept the award and carry it into effect in good faith."

Replying to threats from the miners that they would stop work September 1 unless the minority report of the commission, recommending a higher award than provided in the majority report, were accepted, the President definitely stated that the majority award would not be set aside.

The majority report of the commission, signed by W. O. Thompson, president of Ohio State University, representative of the public and chairman, and by W. L. Connell of Scranton, Pa., representing the operators, granted wage increases of 20 and 17 per cent above the present wage scale. The 20 per cent increase was awarded contract miners and the advance of 17 per cent was recommended for company miners, mostly monthly men, miners' laborers and consideration miners.

Neal J. Ferry of McAdoo, Pa., representing the miners, whose minority report the workers in district meetings have endorsed, recommended a minimum wage of \$6 a day for adult laborers and an increase of 31 per. cent for contract workers.

In refusing the request of the miners for acceptance of the minority report, as made in a telegram sent through their local representatives, the President called attention to a resolution adopted by the miners in convention agreeing to accept the findings of such a commission as he appointed.

"By all the laws of honor upon which civilization rests," the President in his telegram to the miners added, "that pledge should be fulfilled. Any intimation that the anthracite mine workers will refuse to work under the award because it does not grant them all that they expected is a reflection upon the sincerity of the men who constitute the backbone of the community in which they live."

The President further told the miners that if their communication was intended as a threat they could rest assured that the challenge would be accepted and that the people of the country would find some substitute fuel to tide them over "until the real sentiment of the anthracite mine workers can find expression and they are ready to abide by the obligat bey have entered into."






