GRAHAM PUBLIC SCHOOLS HAVE OPENING; ABOUT 800 PUPILS ENROLLED

It is impossible to appreciate the vigor of youth unless one attends the opening of a public school of several hundred boys and girls in September after they have had three months vacation; they come from the homes full of life and vigor; they have been living an outdoor life and have not been subjected to the restraints of school life; they gather around the school building early, each one trying to see which can make the most noise; they are not yet under the immediate supervision of the respective teachers and they feel more or less free to make an unusual amount of noise.

As we witness these happy scenes it takes some of us back to our own school days when a few timid boys and girls would assemble at some dilapidated building to meet some stranger who had come into the community to teach the session of school. The opportunities for the boys and girls of Graham are great. We have as good schools as can be found in the State and a loyal sympathetic citizenship to encourage the pupils and teachers.

Schools opened last Monday under the most auspicious circumstances. The only thing that kept the opening from being an ideal opening was the fact that the new superintendent, H. B. Cogdell, convinced every one that he is the man for the place. He is a successful school man and a stranger would not have not known, except from remarks made by the speakers that Mr. Cogdell was a new superintendent. He had arranged an interesting program which was carried out to the satisfaction and pleasure of all present.

With Mrs. Woods at the piano all sang America. Dr. C. R. Taylor, pastor of the Baptist church, conducted the devotional exercises which the following made short prayers: E. S. Graham, mayor; J. T. Rickman, president school board; Rev. Gary Smith, pastor Presbyterian church; Rev. J. E. Evans, pastor Christian church; Rev. T. E. Bowman, pastor Methodist church; Edgar McLendon, editor Graham Leader.

These talks were interspersed by the following musical numbers which were appreciated by all present: Violin solo—Miss Mary Bowman; Vocal duet—Mrs. R. A. Duncan and Mrs. H. B. Cogdell; Clarinet solo—J. M. Burkett. At the close of the program Supt. Cogdell made some explanations for the benefit of the pupils after which the exercises were concluded.

Tuesday school work begin in earnest. Organization is completed everything running smoothly.

PHYSICIANS GIVE BANQUET
The physicians of Graham gave a banquet to physicians of Young and surrounding counties last Wednesday night at the Dolman House. On account of the heavy rain in the afternoon the attendance was small as many could not come because of the mud. The program was carried out and the physicians with their families enjoyed the occasion. Music was furnished by Casburn's band. In addition to the excellent music by the band a vocal duet by Mrs. Cogdell and Mrs. Duncan was received by every one present. Ina Mae Price favored the guests with a reading which was enjoyed very much. The physicians present were responded with short talks. L. W. Price acted as master of ceremonies and performed the duties in honor to the fraternity and to himself.

MOTION PICTURES OF 90th DIVISION IN FRANCE COMING

An unusual opportunity is being presented to the people of Graham and Young county next Tuesday, September 14, when the official picture of the activities of the 90th Division in France will be shown at the National Theatre.

During the presentation of this six reel picture, filled with thrills of actual fighting, many will be able to recognize a friend or relative as many of the boys from the vicinity were with the 90th.

Scenes of real action showing "our own boys" going over the top in the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne battles are portrayed, as well as scenes of balloons burning and being shot down, airplanes duelling and falling, the French mortars, anti-aircraft guns, machine guns and artillery in action, manned perhaps by some one you know.

Every inch of this wonderful film was taken in France or Germany by the United States Signal Corps and no one can doubt its officiality. Major Owen J. Watts, divisional adjutant of the Ninetieth, controls the film. He saw it in Germany and after returning to the United States he spent several weeks in Washington conferring with war department officials until the picture was released for showing in Texas and Oklahoma.

Texas and Oklahoma were favored because the entire division was composed of men from the two States mentioned. The division left Camp Travis, where it was organized and trained, in June, 1918. By June 30, all organizations had reached France, where after a month's stay in training they moved into the front lines in the St. Mihiel section. Here it remained for a few weeks prior to the great drive. On September 12 it participated in the big drive and gained every objective assigned to it.

Later the division was transferred to the Meuse-Argonne sector, where it started in the big drive there, which finally led to the termination of the war.

The division was on the front seventy-five consecutive days, received five official commendations, took 2000 prisoners and captured immense quantities of war materials and supplies. It never gave an inch of ground and every action of the two States should be proud of the actions of the boys who composed it.

If you hear the boys tell of the real thrills that they experienced during their stay at the front and there be any doubt in your mind, this will be your opportunity to convince yourself that the story was only half told.

NEW PIPE LINE INTO YOUNG COUNTY

The right-of-way is being secured by the Texas Company for a 4-inch pipe line from Breckenridge to the Arnold well. The right-of-way has been practically secured and as soon as the material can be put on the ground the line will be put in. The line comes from Breckenridge to Ivan and then to the Arnold well, which was one of the first wells in Young county. Connections will be made with the South Bend field and the Graham well.

When this line is completed the Texas Company will be in position to handle some of the Young county production.

There has been one line from Breckenridge through Eliasville to South Bend some time. The coming of another line into another part of the county will stimulate drilling and it will not be long until there will be 200 wells in the county.

Locations are being made now faster than material can be secured for rigs. With more sunshine to dry up the mud holes many new rigs will spring up in the south and west part of the county.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE
Because details have not worked out as rapidly as expected, the general meeting of the Graham Chamber of Commerce scheduled for Thursday night has been postponed for a short while by the directors of the Chamber. The meeting will take place at an early date, it is said; and officers of the Chamber expressed their desire to have the meeting as soon as possible if for no other purpose than to offer an opportunity to many business men and others who have shown a keen interest in the city to speak their minds for Graham.

When interviewed today, Albert Kay, director, said that he took the stand that there is no time like the present to do anything. Kay also said that he was pleased with the spirit of co-operation shown on every hand and stated that he was in favor of giving the opportunity to every citizen to lend a helping hand, and that this could be done through keeping the members of the Chamber of Commerce in close touch with what is going on.

President Boyd Street, who called the meeting scheduled for Thursday night, stated today that getting the citizens together just for the purpose of meeting one another is not enough reason for a meeting, and added that something of general interest is necessary to make the meeting satisfactory to all.

Directors Criswell, Graham and Morrison spoke about the possibilities of bringing railroads and gas to Graham. They said that Captain Colby, president of the North Texas Supply Company, has been conferring with the Chamber of Commerce; and he is reported to have said that he is awaiting an engineer from California to make a survey of the gas supply near Graham. Colby is quoted as saying that if the engineer reports a sufficient gas supply, that Graham will have gas in time for the winter load. When asked whether the people he represents could float such a project, Colby stated that they were the people who supply gas to Bakersfield and other cities of California.

W. B. HARLEY MEETS A TRAGIC DEATH

W. B. Harley, of Graham, met a tragic death last Saturday night when he was struck by a car at the northeast corner of the square in Graham. He never regained consciousness and died about one o'clock Sunday.

Robert Walker, Robert Harrell and Mr. Harley were going from the McCloud corner across to the Birdsong corner about 9 o'clock Saturday night. Mr. Walker and Mr. Harrell stopped at the turn post and Mr. Walker spoke to Mr. Harley but it is believed that he thought he had time to cross ahead of the car but the car was going at a faster speed than usual. The body of Mr. Harley was carried about 75 feet.

The car was driven by J. E. Worley who was in a hurry for medicine for his wife, who was critically ill. The accident was such a shock to Mr. Worley that he was not able to drive the car back home.

Mr. Harley is survived by a wife and five small children who have the sympathy of the entire citizenship of Graham.

BANK BANDITS ESCAPE
Just before going to press last Thursday one of the boldest bank robberies was pulled off in Graham that any town ever experienced. A brief mention was made of the robbery in our last issue.

In locking the customers and officials in the vault the cashier, Mr. Mauldin, had presence of mind to hold the spring on the inside so that the lock did not hold. Most of us would have been so excited that we would not have been able to keep cool and level headed, as did Mr. Mauldin. An audit of the bank's business has been made and it is learned that the robbers secured \$4,358.72.

The Pinkerton Detective Agency and the Burns Detective Agency have both sent detectives here to study the situation. The bank officials identified the leader of the gang from pictures carried by the detectives. The leader's name is Tom Slaughter and we understand he was reared in Dallas. There is a reward of \$5,000.00 for his capture. He has robbed many banks in different states.

The insurance adjuster was here this week arranging to pay the insurance and he also had a picture of the famous "Tommy" Slaughter. Immediately after the robbery last Thursday a large number of our citizens and also some visitors in the city offered their assistance to Sheriff Wallace.

OIL INDUSTRY BRIGHTER THAN EVER MANY NEW LOCATIONS BEING MADE

WHO WILL BE NEXT PRESIDENT?

DISTRICT COURT
The district court is in session this week. The grand jury has been organized and some routine work has been done but at the time we go to press we were not able to find out what case had been disposed of. We give below the names of the grand jury and also a list of the petit jury for the first week.

GRAND JURY
The grand jury for the September term of court were organized and began work Tuesday. The following names are serving on the grand jury: J. T. Rickman, foreman; J. E. Bishop, A. H. M. Anderson, Edgar Matthews, C. B. Daniel, J. H. McCan, J. R. Cox, Frank Harrell, Will Donnell, Tom Bunker, J. H. Carter; Bob Wells.

Every phase of the oil industry in Young county is brighter than at any time since the first location was made. Every one connected with the oil business is optimistic. More locations are being made than ever before. The heavy rains for the past several days have interfered to some extent with heavy hauling but with a few days sunshine much heavy material will be moved.

The Texas Company is running a pipe line from Breckenridge to the Arnold well by the way of Ivan. Connection will be made with the South Bend field and the Graham well. The Texas Company will soon be in position to buy Young county production. This line will be completed as soon as the right of way can be secured and material put on the ground.

It was reported to The Leader some time ago that the Texas Company had made sixteen locations along the route this pipe line will follow. The building of the line proves the faith of the Texas Company in Young county.

The coming in of the Roxana-Boozler last Saturday has stimulated drilling around South Bend. The well at 1850 feet is producing 100 barrels oil and four or five million feet of gas. This well is expected to produce at least 300 barrels.

The Roxana-Payne No. 1 is flowing by heads from the 2180 foot sand. This well will produce 200 barrels when completed. Colcord-Scott No. 2 is good for 40 barrels daily in the 2150 foot sand when pump is installed. Panhandle-Scott No. 3 drilling at 2500 feet.

Panhandle-McCluskey No. 2 is drilling at 400 feet. Panhandle-McCluskey No. 3, hauling rig to location. Oklahoma Petroleum and Gasoline Company has made location at McCluskey farm west of house. Oklahoma Petroleum Company has completed rig 1500 feet south of Graham Syndicate well and is moving in tools. Graham Syndicate has 17 feet of pay sand at 1870 feet and is drilling at 1900 feet, will drill to McCluskey sand.

Colcord is rigging up to drill on Graham land on southeast corner Samuel Wood survey. Sun Company is erecting rig on Stovall land, Block 36, just west of Snowden & McSweeney rig. Erie Oil Co. is drilling at 500 feet on Stovall Block No. 43. Panhandle-McCluskey has location on Rogers land, Stovall farm, Block 18. Ford No. 2, location made. Burgess No. 1 on Fickling survey, location made. Donnell No. 2, 1000 feet south of No. 1, building rig on Survey 1111. Goode No. 1 made two twenty-five barrel flows from 3900 foot sand Monday. It is expected this well will be cleaned out this week. Goode No. 2 is making 100 barrels on the pump. Colcord River Bed is drilling at 2500 feet and will drill to the McCluskey sand. Godley Oil Company location on Graham land, 800 feet south of McCluskey well. Roxana-J. R. Holeomb, location made northwest corner McBrayer survey.

Several other locations have been made by various companies but are not ready to be given out.

E. H. CASBURN IMPROVING
E. H. Casburn, who received painful injuries on Anst 5th caused by a 400-pound block of ice falling on his foot, is slowly improving. He was called back to Camp Mabry at Austin as an instructor in some branch of the cavalry department and while giving instructions to some men a 400-pound block of ice slipped from a truck and fell on his foot crushing some of the bones in his foot. The accident happened August 5th and it will be some time before he will be able to use his foot. His friends are glad to see him able to get out on crutches and hope for him a speedy recovery.

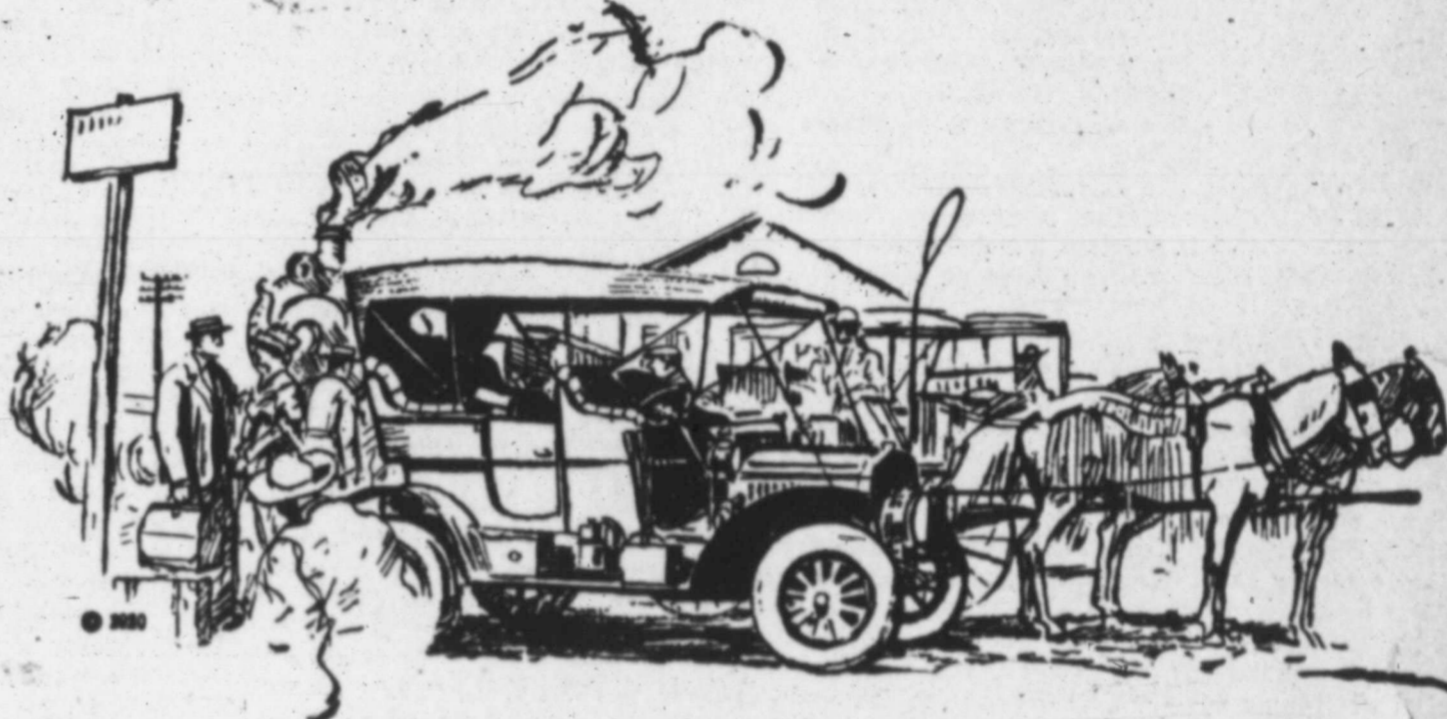

FAMOUS SHIP IS PRESENT

Vessel on Which Amundsen Sailed Through the Northwest Passage Lies on Shore Near Golden Gate.

The ship Gjoa, in which the valiant Norwegian explorer, Roald Amundsen, made his famous trip through the Northwest passage, discovering this new route, no longer rides the waves in quest of new and novel corners of the earth. She has become a monument to her own and her commander's great achievement, and now lies, caged in an iron fence, as though she were a beast, on the shores of San Francisco bay, overlooking Golden Gate.

The Gjoa has been preserved just as she was when Amundsen made his memorable journey in her. She is a small sloop-rigged vessel, but thoroughly seaworthy in the hands of hardy, trained sailors. She carries a "crow's nest," or lookout station, high up on her lofty mainmast. This was used as a lookout point on the trip through the passage.

The Gjoa, though now beached for good, has an appropriate setting for a ship hailing from a Scandinavian country. Immediately behind the vessel stands not a Dutch, but an American, windmill of the Dutch type of construction. It is one of a group used to pump water on the beach near Golden Gate, and which give the shoreline, viewed from incoming ships, the appearance of a "Little Holland." The famous old ship is now at its last anchorage.

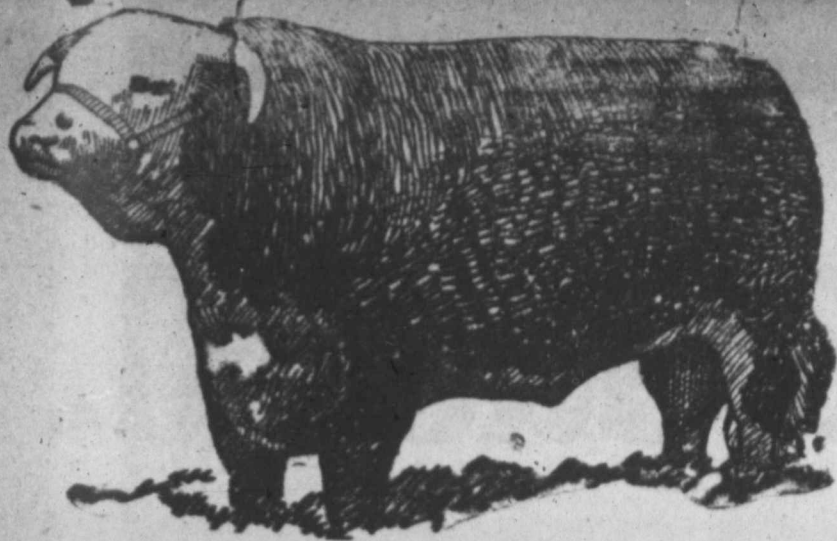

STATE FINANCES IN SOUND CONDITION

Austin, Aug. 31.—The State's new fiscal year will open tomorrow with \$14,000,000 in cash in the State depositories and with a general revenue fund of at least \$8,750,000, the largest general revenue balance at the opening of any fiscal year in the history of Texas, which, State Treasurer John W. Baker says, is more than ample to take care of disbursements without the necessity of the State going on a "scissors" basis.

Our financial condition is such that there is not a chance of the State going on a deficiency basis during the coming fiscal year," said Baker. "The general revenue on the opening day of the fiscal year shows an amount almost double on the opening day of the last year. We will have a little over \$10,000,000 in the general revenue fund as compared with \$4,682,000 September 1, 1919, which up to that time was the largest amount of general revenue shown on the opening day of a new fiscal year. On September 1, 1918, the general revenue balance was \$4,035,000, and \$5,000 on September 1, 1917."

The balance in the available school fund also has soared to a record-making mark, there being over \$1,500,000 to the credit of that fund, compared with \$54,000 on September 1, 1919; \$348,000 in 1918, and \$1,226,000 in 1917. The State Highway Department fund shows a balance of \$1,190,000. All other funds are in good condition. Mr. Baker will tomorrow or Thursday complete the annual statement showing exact balances in the various funds.

There will become available tomorrow appropriations aggregating \$19,000,000, according to Chief Clerk Freddy Reese of the Comptroller's Department. Four million dollars of this amount is an appropriation made at the last special session of the Legislature to supplement the available school fund as emergency aid for the free schools of the State, \$2,000,000 appropriation of the regular session for rural schools and the remaining \$13,000,000 is for the support of the State government and institutions of higher education for the new fiscal year.

A new system of keeping track of various appropriations will be inaugurated in the Comptroller's Department. Comptroller Mark L. Wigginton will open an account for each appropriation, making a total of 3,512 accounts, against 1,572 accounts under the old system of grouping the appropriations under various departments.

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION
The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Young, to be held at Jean and Graham on October 9, 1920, to fill the office of rural carrier at Jean, Tex. Vacancies that may later be filled on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles.

Women will not be considered for rural carrier appointment unless they are the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines, or the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines who are disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in line of military duty. Form No 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

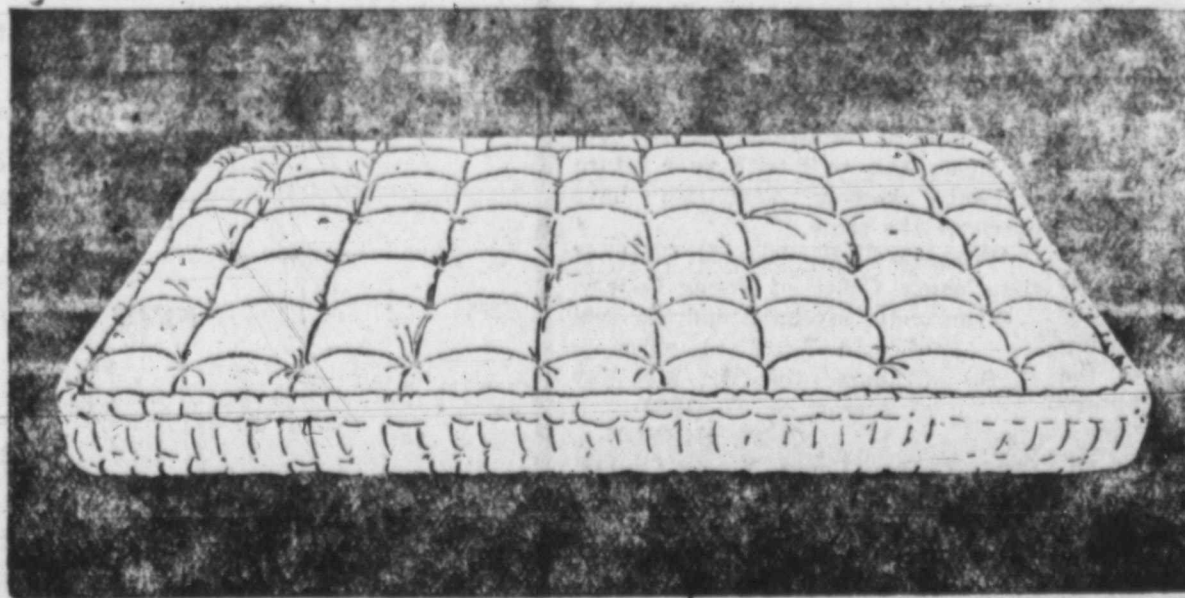
