## GRAHAM MILL TO ENLARGE QUARTERS

The Graham Mill & Elevator Company's \$50,000.00 addition to its ice plant is one of the latest pieces of construction and expansion announced for Graham's progress column.

According to S. R. Crawford, president of the Company, the new unit will mean a doubling of the present capacity of the ice plant and give it a daily output of thirty tons.

The engine is of the Erick type, and has already been purchased according to Crawford. A new structure to house the additional machinery is already under way adjoining the south section of the present plant.

It is estimated, says Crawford, that Graham will be able to supply all ordinary demands for ice in this territory. Ice had to be shipped in during the recent season, but is expected that the new unit will care for all demands. If it is not large enough, expansion will continue until demands can be supplied.

The signals are well learned and the boys will need now to polish up the rough spots in their form and develop the spirit of aggressiveness that always is necessary to a winning team. Kidd and Price at quarterback are running the squads like veterans and loom up as among the best of the backs for this position. Wallace Price is also another consistent man in the backfield making up in aggressiveness what he lacks in weight.

On the line Dowdle and McLaren are fast developing into a couple of real tacklers. With just a little more aggressiveness they can be counted on to turn most plays back before they are hardly started. Stewart and Howard, also, Couger are making things hum at guards while Mayes and Johnson are to be depended on as two good centers. On the wing positions McNamara, Morrison, Matthews, Reed, and Dickenson are all running a close race. All of these men are sure open field tacklers and all will keep their opponents back field in a trouble. Morrison and Matthews more than likely excel in tackling while the rest are better at gathering the passes in.

## FIGHT FOR BETTER COTTON PRICES

The great meeting of the American Cotton Association in Montgomery, Alabama, last week, discussed a lot of things, but we believe the gist of the whole conference may be given in six definite things every cotton farmer

in the South can do to help the fight for better prices:

1. First and foremost, hold your cotton. We must show the bear gamblers and their allies that they have absolutely mistaken the spirit and determination of the Southern people if they think we will sit idly by and be robbed of half the fruits of this year's labor. It has cost between 30 and 40 cents a pound to make this year's crop. The decision of the Montgomery meeting was that 40 cents should be a minimum price for middling.

Not only must each man resolve to hold his own crop, but he must see his neighbors and insist on their holding. As J. A. Brown says, "We must shut up the market so tight that no man can buy or beg a bale of cotton at present prices—so that the only way to get a bale of new-crop cotton until prices improve will be to steal it!"

J. A. Todd, the distinguished English authority, who came to Montgomery at President Wanamaker's request, sized up the present world situation somewhat as follows: (1) The world will need every bale of cotton that is produced this year. There is no real overproduction. (2) Right now, however, there is practically no movement of cotton goods, a wholly abnormal temporary dullness in the business of cotton manufacturers, and of course they are not offering normal prices for cotton. Present prices are only fictitious prices based on a temporary demoralized market.

Nevertheless if one-fourth of the cotton farmers of the South are such fools as to accept this fictitious undervaluation for 1920 cotton, prices on the whole crop will be lowered. We should not do this.

2. Go to your county mass meeting Monday, September 20. Every county in the South is asked to hold a mass meeting of its cotton farmers on this date, to make plans for holding, warehousing, cutting acreage and co-operative marketing. Go, and get your neighbors to go, both landlord and tenant, black and white. We must educate everybody and all classes to the importance of this fight. And see to it that everybody makes some contribution for supporting the Cotton Association in its plans. A good method will be to have every grower authorize his ginners to deduct 10 to 25 cents a bale for the organization. Business men should subscribe liberally, for no one will be hurt more than if the South's spending power and debt-paying power is cut in half.

year by sowing a record-breaking grain crop this fall. Don't just talk about "cutting down acreage"—a negative sort of program. Tell everybody to cut his cotton acreage by sowing more wheat, oats and rye, and by sowing more clover to enrich the land for corn next year. This is the only sensible way to reduce acreage.

4. Put your cotton in a warehouse and organize a co-operative marketing association. Remarkably important was the comprehensive report on co-operative marketing adopted at Montgomery, the result of months of labor by Cotton Specialist Murph and others. The report tells just how to start co-operative selling with official grading or classing your community.

As for warehouses, if there is not sufficient warehouse room in your section, it will pay to hurry up the construction of buildings of a cheaper sort. In next week's *Progressive Farmer* we expect to present some plans worked out by D. C. Walby, vice president and manager of the Arkansas Cotton Association, whereby 1,000 bales may be taken care of in a structure costing only \$1,500. We do not believe, of course, that every community should be content with such cheap and impermanent construction, but this at least indicates that no community need accept the ridiculous prices now offered by bear speculators on the ground that it can't house its crop.

5. Do all you can to help men who are in a tight place financially from having to sacrifice their cotton. Make it a point to see the president or cashier of the bank you do business with. Tell him a large part of his business comes from farmers and that farmers expect him to go the limit in helping them now. See your merchant and tell him he had better suffer some temporary inconvenience, better wait until he can wait no longer on his cotton customers, rather than force the South back into the poverty and backwardness it formerly suffered. And if you have tenants or neighbors who insist on selling anyhow, buy their cotton if possible, and hold it out of the regular channels of trade.

6. Demand also a fair price for cotton seed. This subject has already been discussed in previous issues of the *Progressive Farmer*. The decision of the Montgomery meeting was that farmers who can use cottonseed meal for feeding should exchange cotton seed for an equal quantity of cottonseed meal, or should sell seed when a ton of seed is selling for as much as a ton of meal.

If this battle for better cotton prices is to be won, the growers themselves must fight to the finish. Here are six definite things every man can do. Check up yourself and see how many of them you are willing to do—and spread the news to your neighbors—*Progressive Farmer*.

Are your children ready to start to school in good health and vigor this fall? If any of them have adenoids, now is the time to have them treated instead of waiting until school days are on us. And if any children have defective teeth, they should no longer postpone a visit to the dentist. Many a child is blamed for backwardness at school when the fault is with the parents. in Book 1, page 284, of the School District Boundary Record to determine whether or not a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said Common School District in the amount of \$2000.00, the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 20 both inclusive, payable 20 years from their date, with option of redemption after ten years and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building and equipping a school building of wood and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this County shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of

them are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County and who are resident property taxpayers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election.

**EAST SIDE BUSINESS DIS-  
TRICT NEARLY COMPLETED**

The biggest thing that has hap-  
pened in Graham's building history  
has recently been completed. On  
the east side of the city square 15  
stores, and three rooming houses,  
one of which may be called a hotel,  
have literally added a whole new  
business section to the city.

W. M. Smiley, Mrs. Barnes, Owen  
& Robinson, F. M. Burkett, C. M.  
Rickman, Wootten & Taylor, Calvin  
Brothers, Morton & McNabb and  
Dillingham & Fielder are among the  
names on the roll of honor which tabu-  
lates Graham's booster citizens.  
The Buick Sales Agency is located in  
the Smiley store on the extreme  
south end of the new east side busi-  
ness section. It is said that the Post  
music store will occupy part of this  
store. The next store north is not  
rented, although parties are said to  
be scrambling to Smiley for posses-  
sion. The third and fourth stores  
from the south end are the property  
of Smith Bros. and Wood, grocers.  
The fifth store from the south end is  
owned by Mrs. Barnes, who has not  
seen fit to let the store go to the  
lessee as yet. Owen and Robinson  
own the largest building in the city.

The Rob-Own hotel occupies the  
second story with all the convenien-  
ces of the modern hotel of the me-  
dium sized city. The Sanitary gro-  
cery store, owned and occupied by  
the F. M. Burkett interests, is one of  
the finest stores both in equipment  
and stock in this section of the state.

North of Third street there is still  
another business block. Every build-  
ing and store is brand new. Nearest  
Third on Elm is the Mecca Cafe, oper-  
ated by Worm Brothers of Eastland  
and Desdemona. The Mecca is said  
to be one of the finest equipped cafes  
in Texas. The next door north of the  
cafe is the General Auto Supply Com-  
pany, controlled by Messrs. Smith  
& Prideaux. This large supply house  
is located in the Wootten & Taylor  
building. In the Calvin Brothers  
building next door north is the Worm  
Brothers meat market, grocery store  
and bakery. These departments rank  
with those in the largest Texas cities.

The Morton & McNabb building  
just to the north is divided into two  
parts, the United States postoffice  
is in the southern part owned by W.  
M. Morton, and the Davis Drug Com-  
pany, who announce that it will main-  
tain both its new store and the  
present one, occupies the McNabb

portion. The upstairs of this build-  
ing comprises a modern 21-room  
rooming house, to be managed by  
McNabb. The last of the new build-  
ings to be mentioned is the Fielder  
& Dillingham two-story structure,  
not yet completed. Downstairs there  
are two stores which will probably  
be leased to Fort Worth parties next  
week. The office suites on the second  
floor are not yet completed; but it is  
said that several professional men  
both of Graham and other cities are  
patiently awaiting completion, so  
that they can move into the new  
building.

The progressive spirit of the east  
side is marked. The owners and busi-  
ness men occupying the buildings  
are setting a good natured pace for  
other parts of Graham to follow.  
When asked how they like the new  
business district, they invariably re-  
ply that they are determined to get  
their share of business, which is most  
probable from all prospects.

Graham's new business district  
probably represents a quarter of a  
million dollars invested. This to-  
gether with the building going on in  
the residence sections of the city are  
enough to convince the most doubtful  
if such there be in the city, that Gra-  
ham is having a healthy growth.

**THE COUNTRY LOSES**

A very surprising fact disclosed by  
the publication of the census taken  
this year is that many counties in  
Northwest Texas have lost population  
in the past ten years. This was un-  
expected, because it is that part of  
the State that has more vacant land  
and cheaper land than any other part  
of it. There the greatest percentage  
of growth was recorded in 1910. The  
explanation of this fact is that in  
that part of the State are no large  
cities. It is the cities that have  
grown, and such counties as Dallas,  
with the city of Dallas, Tarrant, with  
the city of Fort Worth, Harris, with  
Houston, Bexar, with San Antonio,  
and El Paso, with the city of that  
name, have very large percentages of  
population increase, but it was the  
cities that grew, and not the rural  
part of those counties. The West  
Texas counties that show gains of  
any consequence are those in which  
oil has been discovered, and the oil  
boom brought in people, but the  
farms of the country are neglected.

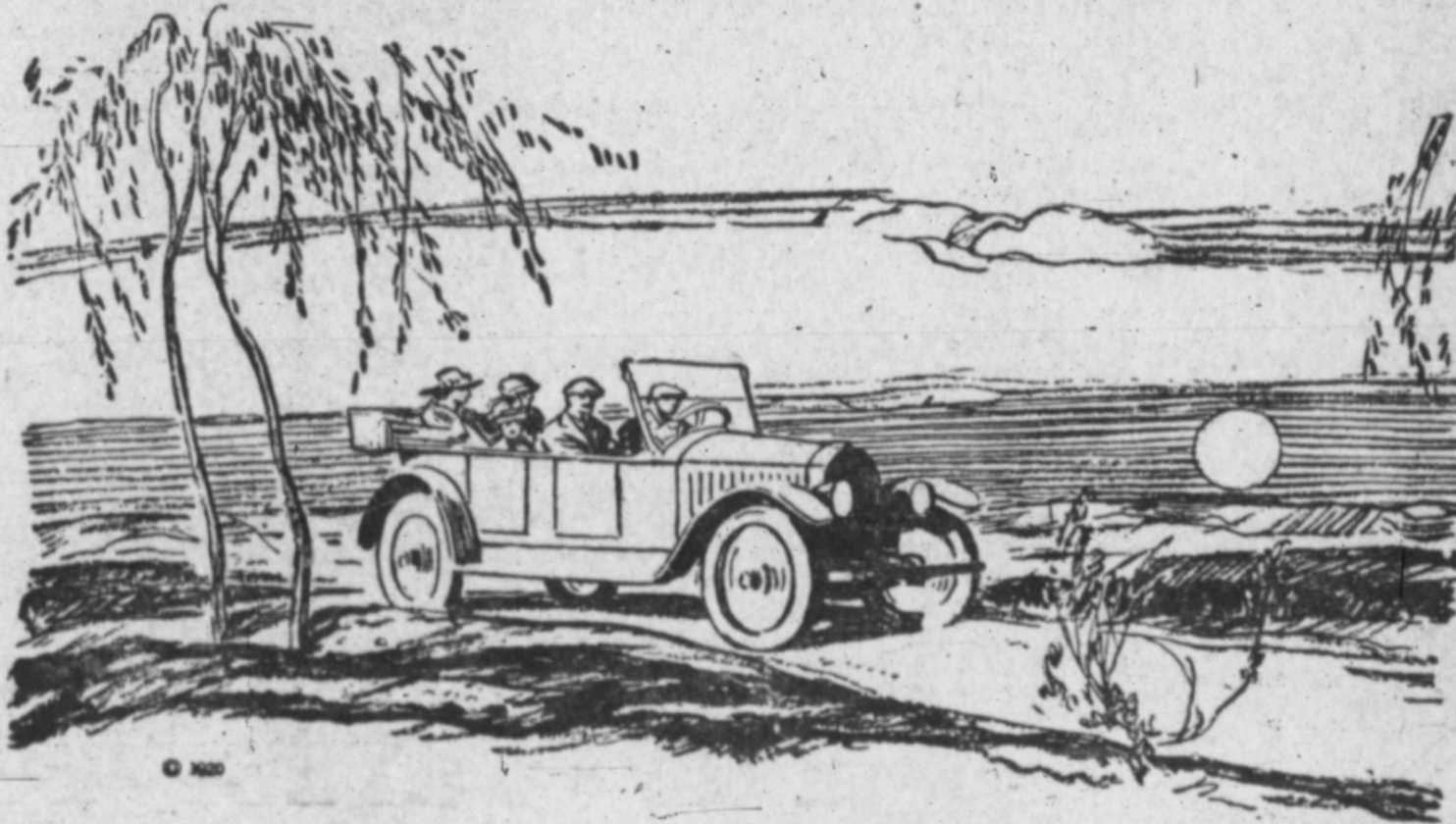
