### **WORK ON WICHITA** FALLS & SOUTHERN. WILL BE RUSHED

Officials are Busy Making **Preparations Preliminary** to Starting Work on the New Road

Within fifty days from the date of issuance by the Interstate Commerce Commission of permission for the construction of the Wichita Falls & Southern Railroad, the steel rails will have been laid into Graham. This was the statement made Monday by Chief Engineer McFarland, who stated that he was expecting the permission to be received at any time.

Rapid preparations are now being made preliminary to starting actual work on the railroad. Mr. McFarland stated that 1,500 tons of steel already has been received and that 1,000 more tons is now in transit from Kansas City.

Mrs. Nicklas experienced the hardships of frontier life. She and her three small children stayed alone while her husband was away freighting. During those days all supplies had to be freighted by wagons across the country from Fort Worth, the nearest railroad station. The Indians were all supposed to be on the reservations, yet it was unsafe for the men to be out without a gun for they never knew when they would meet a band of the Red Men who had escaped from the reservations. Many a night while she was left alone with her small children she was ffraid the cry of a baby might attract the red man's attention and bring trouble to her home. The howl of the coyote in the dead of night would make one realize the distance back to civilization.

Mrs. Nicklas was a member of the Christian Church. She was very zealous in her belief, and lived a devoted Christian life. During her last illness she talked very much of the happy meeting that would be on the resurrection morning.

Mrs. Nicklas had been in poor health for a number of years. In November she went to visit her daughter in Amarillo, thinking the climate there would help her. 


