

The local schools hold contests to select representatives for the county contests. These meet at some designated place in the county and contest to determine the winner for the county. The State is divided into 32 districts and the winners from the counties meet in these district contests to select representatipes who meet in a state contest in Austin in May each year. More stress is placed on the local contests in each school as the purpose of the League is to help the masses of boys and girls throughout the country.

Those who availed themselves of the opportunity to attend the county meet at the Graham - public school building last Saturday witnessed a concrete example of the good the League is doing. It behooves every one to encourage the League in its efforts to make better citizens.

#### DEFECTIVE EYES OFTEN CAUSE "STUPID" PUPILS

Hundreds of school children in the Southwestern States are losing ground in their grades at school through defective vision, according to reports of the 170 public health nurses of the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross, received at St. Louis headquarters. The reports show that the "dull' boy or girl, usually the despair of parents and teachers, is often laboring under the handicap of eye strain, which acts directly upon his ability to learn.

One case in a Hill county, Texas, school is cited as particularly illustrative of this fact. This boy, the report of the nurse set forth, had been in the firs grade for three years, unable to go higher, and was regarded as mentally deficient and mocked by his fellow pupils as not being able "to read his ABC's." An examination by the Red Cross nurse and a physician showed him to be suffering from serious defective vision, which was corrected by glasses. Marked improvement in his classes was then noted.

Correcting of defects in school children is being carried out ona large scale by the nursing department of the Red Cross.


