Prompt and effcient work on the part of Graham's voluntary fire department Tuesday at 2 o'clock probably pre vented a disastrous conflagration when fire broke out in the Gifford Cafe, located in the basement of the brick block just north of Birdsong's on Elm street.

Three persons were cut and bruised when they were dragged from the narrow openings that give an outlet from the basement to Fourth street. Two negro employes of the cafe were overcome with smoke and were unconscious when removed.



The injured included Mrs. Lee Gifford, owner of the cafe, who was painfully bruised during the course of her rescue through the narrow window: John Polk, cafe, chef, cut window; John Polk, cafe chef, cut and bruised by broken glass; Pete Worth, bruised and overcome with smoke, and J. 

Another big producer was added to the Young County field when the Seaboard No. 1 M. K. Graham, on the south 20 acres of the orignal Graham Oil Syndicate's 40-acre lease, came in flowing at the rate of 85 barrels an hour, or about 2,000 barrels per day. The well struck the practically assured, according to Dr. E. D. Shurter, director of the 2,500 sand yesterday and made about 5,000,000 feet of gas and considerable oil. The well blew itself in today.

The 40-acre lease is now producing something like 4,000 barrels per day. the Graham Syndicate well, owned by the Mid-Texas, having increased its flow to 2,000 barrels last Tuesday after being drilled deeper.

FLOW ESTIMATED AT 85 BARRELS

The Seaboard No. 1 M. K. Graham makes the fourth big producer to be brought in during the last week, as the Godley No. 4 M. K. Graham came in last Friday making around 1,200 barrels. . The Godley No. 5 came in the next day flowing around 1,500 barrels. All these wells are on the 2,500-foot sand.

These wells have produced a wave of renewed activity in Young county and are regarded as the forrunner of a lively drilling campaign this spring.

As an indication of the widespread confidence in the Young county field. a prominent refinery man remarked that wells in the country would be producing twelve years from now. also added the prediction that within the next eighteen months this county will outstrip. Stephens county.

The Grand Rapids Furniture Record gives an interesting account of one such store, at Strasburg, Ohio. It is located in a town of 1 200 people, but it did a business in 1919 of \$830,407, and it was hoped to reach \$1,000,000 in 1920. It accomplished this wonderful result principally through liberal advertising. In 1919 it spent 3 per cent of its gross income on publicity. When a store puts \$25,-000 into advertising in a single year, you can see why it is doing close to \$1,000,000 worth of business. It draws business thirty miles or more." -Star-Telegram.





Beginning of Life Insurance. Life insurance grew out of marine Insurance, for merchants sending goods by sea in early times usually accompanied the ship themselves and were liable to capture by pirates; especially by the Moorish and Turkish pirates, who then infested the Mediterranean sea. In order to provide the necessary ransom for their release if captured, it became the practice of travelling merchants to pay a premium to certain individuals, called underwriters, who guaranteed the payment of the ransom in the event of the merchant being caught. The practice was gradually extended to insuring the lives, first of marines and then of other persons, the underwriters agreeing, in return for a certain premium to pay a fixed amount If the person insured died within a certain time. Out of this was evolved the various forms of contracts of life insurance in use today.
