Any system that does not provide for the up-keep will fail and the original cost be lost. Supplementary to the bond issue, every male person over 21 years of age with a reasonable personal road tax. He may have the privilege of paying the tax by his labor for the bonded contractor at current prices for good service.

A double sinking fund should be created, one to redeem the bonds as they mature, the other to keep up the road. The contractor charged with the up-keep of the roads will not suffer his district to get out of repair or remain long in bad condition. Repairs when first needed can be made at least cost, the great advantage being that once established good roads will be maintained at minimum cost, labor will seek the job and become expert, good roads to town will be secured; every citizen living in town would esteem it his duty to pay or work out his road tax, if not he would be subject to the same penal offense for failure to work the road.

Good wagon roads to cities and towns promote their interests. Property owners are benefitted by increased values of their holdings. No harm can come from a road tax intelligently and honestly expended in improvement of the public highways. We may "eat our cake and have it too."






