Ice Will be Shipped in Until Plant is in Operation.

The building for the new ice plant has been completed, with the exception of the storage room, and this will be completed in the next few days.

In conversation with Mr. S

R. Crawford, who is president of the company, he stated that everything would be in readiness by the first of April, but that the people would not suffer for ice before that time. The storage room, he said, would be ready in a few days, then the company would ship ice to Graham and put on its wagons for the delivery.

It is their present intention to make morning delivery only, but should the demand be great enough an afternoon delivery will be made.

The new plant is to be modern in every particular and will be able to manufacture enough ice not only to supply Graham but every community and many towns surrounding us.

Mr. Crawford assured us that the people of Graham would not be forced to go through the same experience this year that confronted them last year, as no shortage of ice would occur.

Capacity of Silos.

The size of the silo will depend upon the number of animals to be fed and the length of time silage is wanted. One thing to remember is that it is best to feed a definite amount per day, that is, about an inch or more, so that the silage will form rate all around the silo. This prevents moldy silage.

Below we give a list of standard sizes, their approximate capacity, the number of acres of corn required to fill the silo and the number of cattle that can be fed, estimating a feeding period of 180 days, with 40 pounds of silage as an allowance per animal. It is generally recommended that sizes from 12 to 18 feet in diameter be selected and a height of from 22 to 32 feet for the reason given above. Where more ensilage is needed, as is often the case, two, three or more silos are
