We have leased the Graham Foundry Building, near the Depot, for a Cotton Warehouse. It will hold about 500 bales. In it we expect to store some of the cotton

There will be room for about 300 bales of Customers' Cotton which we will accept for storage at 25c per bale for the first month and 15c per bale for each month

Mr. Joe T. Carter, the public weigher, will have charge of the Warehouse. He will weigh cotton at the Cotton Yard and have same put in warehouse the day it

Don't Let Your Cotton Damage

Cotton begins to damage in November if left out in the weather. Putting cotton on logs, or turning it after each rain does not prevent it from damaging.

It will be more difficult to sell damaged cotton this year than ever before. Because of the big surplus mills and cotton exporters will not buy even slightly damaged cotton when they can get all the undamaged cotton they want.

If you intend to hold cotton it will pay you to build sheds for it at home, or store it in a public warehouse.
