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GRANDE-DEPLORABLE CONDITION OF THE FROM-TIER-CRIME, ETC.

RIO GRANDE, Texas, Sopt. 20, 1867. Editor Express:

In the last two weeks the entire frontier from the Rio Grande to the Medina has been overrun by wandering bands of Indians, killing and wounding several persons and driving off large numbers of porses. There is no doubt but near 300 head of horses have been driven off in the last two weeks out of the counties laying between this river and the Medina With the exception of some 20 or 30 head re-taken by a scout from Fort Meigs, very few have been re-taken. The troops are continually on the scout, but there are not troops enough to give protection. Fort Duncan, that was always occupied before the war with a large garrison, has not been occupied

Aside from Indian depredations the country has been infested with horse and cattle thieves who have grown bold by the total disregard that has been paid to the punishment of crime; even since the surrender of the State, innumerable marders and robberies have been committed and hardly any notice taken of them by the Courts of Uvalde and adjoining counties. For instance, the Hall cotton robbery of some 200 bales, that occurred in June, 1865; although the facts were known by almost every merchant in El Paso and San Antonio and the operators well known to the community, yet no rotice has been taken of the matter by either the Grand Juries of Bexar or Uvalde counties, and even the military have rather stood aloof from bringing these high-handed murderers and robbers to justice. Even some have so well played their hand as to fill Government contracts, when if they had justice they would be serving out an apprenticeship in Huntsville. Security to the lives and property of honest citizens demands that every kind of criminal and crime that has taken place from the surrender of the State up to the present time should be dealt with by the military in case the Courts fail to punish the depredators.

THREE HIGHLY INTEREST. ING ITEMS FROM PARIS.

Not long ago I spoke of the lost secret for petrifying human ficah, of the perso-vering attempts made in Italy to redis-cover it, and of the discovery, while making these researches, of another method of preserving flesh, perhaps quite as valuable as the lost one. At the Great Exhibition, Dr. Brunetti, of Padua, the finder of the new method, was hon-ored with a gold medal, and, with the true spirit of a man of science, he came frue spirit of a man or science, he came forward the other evening at one of the meetings of the International Medical Congress, now in session at the School of Medicine of Paris, and divulged his secret. The great amphithester of the school was crowded with distinguished medical men from all parts of the world, and when the Italian savant had con-cluded his speech he was rewarded with an ovation which must have been a full compensation for any losses he may suf-fer from having his secret pass into the public demain. The following details are sufficient to enable any austomist to avail himself of this important discov-

The process of Dr. Brunetti, which he explained in French with method, and

1. To wash the piece M. Brunetti passes a current of pure water through the blood vessels and the various excretory canals, and then he washes the water out by a current of alcohel.

2. For destroying the fat he follows the alcohol with ether, which he pushes, of course, through the same blood ves sels and excretory ducts; this part of the operation lasts some hours. The ether penetrates the interstices of the flesh, and dissolves all the fat. The piece, at this point of the process, may be preserved any length of time desired, plunged in ether, before proceeding to the final

4. For the drying process Dr. Brunetti

places the pieces in a vase with a double bottom filled with boiling water, and he fills the places of the preceding liquids with warm, dry air. By the aid of a reservoir, in which air is compressed to about two atmospheres, and which com-municates by a stop-cock and a system of tubes, first to a vasc containing chloride of calcium, then with another heated. then with the vessels and execretory ducts of the anatomical piece in course of preparation, he establishes a gaseour currout which expels in a very little time all the fluids. The operation is now finished.

The piece remains supple, light, pre serves its size, its normal relations, its solid histological elements, for there are no longer any fluids in it. It may be handled without fear, and will last indeffnitely. The discovery is a magnificent one, and the sooner medical sch

and pathological pieces the better.

At one of the night meetings of this assure International Medical Congress we saw an American savant and dip "talking learnedly among the doctors." The question for discussion was the unity of races, and Hon. E. G. Squier took this occasion to give to the scientific men of all parts of the world a resume of his researches to Peru after the traces of the ancient races of that country, especially of what is called the age of polished stone. The walls of the famous old temple of Esculapius covered with drawings of primitive Astec and Incas architecture; but Mr. Squier, through the mouth of his friend, the distinguished M. Maury, of the Institute, for he apilluminated those walls, and thereb made his peace with the descerated tem-ple. What is better, he put new idem into the heads of that distinguished assembly on the much-discussed question, and enabled them to put down a new landmark and to trace out a new route of civilization of the ancient tribes. Mr. Squier took the ground that the architectural remains of Peru were the same as those found in Europe and other parts of the world, and indicated the same period, the same civilization, and more or less the same race of men. He was loudly applauded by the learned assemi-

The first question discussed in the Medical Congress was the question which the product of interests, more directly perhaps than any other, every family. It was the question of tubercle, its contigu-osness and prophylatic. The discussion turned mainly on these two points : Is tubercular consumption contagious, and may it not be prevented by inoculation? I should tell you that the profession, tired of being baffled by a disease so slow in its progress and yet so certainly fatal, have been experimenting of late years all over Europe, and that enough new facts have been arrived at to war-raut a certain number of the experimenters to declare that tuberenlar phthi contagious, and that a healthy and infected person ought not to sleep in the same bed. Experiments have been same bed. Experiments have been made upon rabits and other animals, by inoculating under the skin the matt from tuberelys, and those inoculated animals die consumptive in three months' time. The discussions of the Congress established no new doctrine in a positive way, but they brought out many valua-ble facts which will put the profession a step in advance in the right direction.— Paris Correspondence of the New York Tribune.
