Election Returns.
PARSONS, Aug. 12. — Dispatches received here to-day indicate the election of the progressive candidate of the Choctaws, for Governor of that Nation. The election was held August 5th. for the purpose of choosing a Governor, Legislature, and all the principal officers of that people. Returns already received show that the progressive and liberal party have made great gains in its members of the Legislature, and probable election of the Governor. Should this party succeed, it will have an important bearing on the adoption of a territorial form of government, allotment of lands and the advancement and final triumph of the principles advocated by Col. Boudinot and other enlightened and liberal citizens of the Indian Territory.
A killing scrape.
LOUISVILLE, Aug. 12. — Horace Wetherspoon, a rich farmer in Anderson county, was shot and instantly killed last night in Lawrenceburg, that county, by A. M. Pontwood, a young lawyer of the town. Wetherspoon was in the act of drawing a pistol to shoot, but Pontwood was too quick for him. The shooting seems in clear self-defense, as Pontwood had tried to avoid bloodshed. Wetherspoon was a very desperate character and had killed two men before without provocation. Six weeks ago, at the very hour and almost upon the same spot he was killed, he had shot and killed Dr. Chambers, an old respected physician of the county, and was under indictment for this murder at the time of his death. Two loaded revolvers were found on his person, one of them half drawn.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12, 1874.
President Grant's Response to the President of the Argentine Republic and of Uruguay.
The President has sent the following telegrams to the Presidents of the Argentine Republic and of Uruguay, in response to their messages of congratulation on the completion of the cables between South America and other countries:—
EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, 1874.
PRESIDENT OF THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC:—
I heartily congratulate your Republic upon the completion of the work which brings the South American nationalities into immediate communication with each other and the balance of the civilized world. It is an important step in the interests of commerce and of good fellowship between nations and peoples.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, 1874.
THE PRESIDENT OF URUGUAY:—
I send the warmest congratulations on the completion of the telegraphic line that connects your country with, not only the United States of North America, but most of the civilized nations of the world. May these new means of communication cement the present cordial friendship into the most permanent form.

United States Officers and the Formosa Expedition—Possible Complications with China.
The participation of certain officers of the United States service in the movements of the Japanese government against the inhabitants of the Island of Formosa is likely to cause some embarrassment between our government and that of China. The latter claims to have jurisdiction of the Island of Formosa and its people, and any proceedings on the part of American citizens of an unfriendly or belligerent character against said Island or people, is a violation of neutrality. One of the officers connected with the Formosa expedition is Lieutenant Douglas Cassel, of the navy. General Le Gendre, an ex-United States consul is also attached to it.

The notorious Bill Wilson, a desperado that has been at large since he murdered a Sheriff in Falls county three years ago, and who is charged with various murders since that time, was arrested in Whitesboro a few days ago, by the Marshal of that town and deputy Sheriff Chapman of Dallas.

PROF. STACY, who has just left us, visited during his sojourn here quite a number of our leading citizens, and obtained the promise of several young lady pupils for the Austin Female College, of which his father is President. The institution is an excellent one, and we congratulate the Professor upon his success. Our old friend President Belvin, of Coronal Institute, at San Marcos, must come down and see us again, and not let Austin take the lead of him here.

MR. S. P. GAMBIA, our worthy postmaster, after unremitting confinement to the duties of his office for nine years, has obtained a leave of absence for thirty days from the Department at Washington, and will leave in a few days for a trip to Denver, Colorado, for the recuperation of his health and his wasted energies. We understand Denver is only three days' run by rail from Austin. A sojourn of a few weeks in that elevated and salubrious region, a visit to Pike's Peak, and a thorough cessation from application and labor, together with the association of some of his old-time friends who live in that section, will, we have no doubt, bring Mr. Gambia back to his duties with his "youth renewed like the eagles." We should be exceedingly glad to take such a trip during the present hot, sultry, and debilitating season. Mr. Gambia's deputy and clerks will take good care of the office while he is gone.

THE JENKINS CASE still excites discussion in this city. The report that Mr. Heckman, the murdered man, struck Jenkins with a club, turns out to have no foundation. They had a quarrel, and Jenkins went and got his gun, which was taken away from him and fired off. Afterwards, he went and got the gun, and shot Heckman in the back. Upon this fact was based the decision of the jury that it was murder in the first degree, which, under the law and testimony, they could not avoid. The decision of the jury was correct.

The complaint made of Gov. Coke, is, that, after he had actually pardoned Lindsey, who had committed a cold-blooded murder on his friend and benefactor, he refused to commute Jenkins' sentence to the Penitentiary for life. Lindsey, we understand, is now practicing law in Huntsville, although he deserved the same punishment that was visited upon Jenkins. Gov. Davis never pardoned a single man except the record of the case, after a full examination, justified him in so doing. Yet he was continually denounced for pardoning alleged thieves and murderers, which was ridigleously false.

One of the most ridiculous and outrageous things that has happened here in a long time was the extensive military preparation made in view of the report that about a thousand armed negroes were preparing to rescue Jenkins. After thorough investigation, we cannot find the least ground for this report.

That Jenkins was poisoned seems to be generally conceded. He was not dead when he was hanged, but he was in the deep and unconscious stupor which precedes death from the action of some powerful and deadly narcotic poison. He knew nothing of his being hanged. The poison was evidently given to him just before the fatal moment arrived. Who gave it to him has not been discovered, but it was somebody who knew exactly what he was about, and who gave it to him at the right moment to avoid the terror and agony of the hanging. He may or may not have known that he was poisoned. But it matters not.

MAJ. BRACKENRIDGE seems now to have succeeded in turning the tables on Gov. Stockdale in their rivalry for the Goliad nomination. Stockdale had it all his own way for a considerable time, and seemed likely to get the acmination on the first ballot. Maj. Brackenridge, in the meantime, was doing nothing, and seemed entirely indisposed to allow his name used in the candidacy. But, since the Boxar county convention unanimously declared for him, his friends have gone to work vigorously, and the prospect is that he will go into the convention with a stronger vote than Gov. Stockdale. But the two-thirds vote necessary to a nomination will prove the rub. Stockdale's supposed loyalty to Coke and Ireland is the great objection to him out West. Then, he is not a man to be relied on for frontier protection by any manner of means.

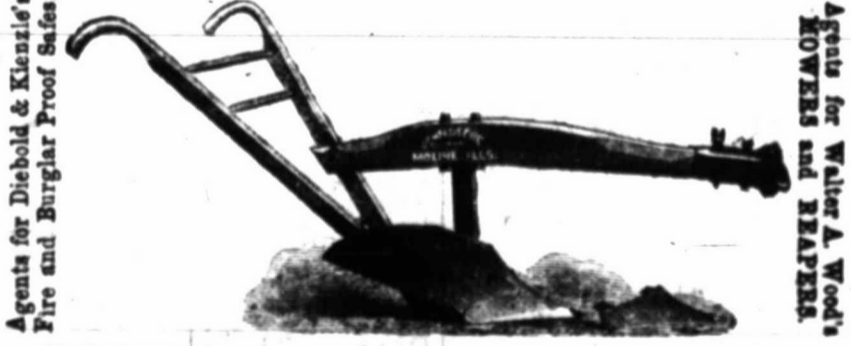
