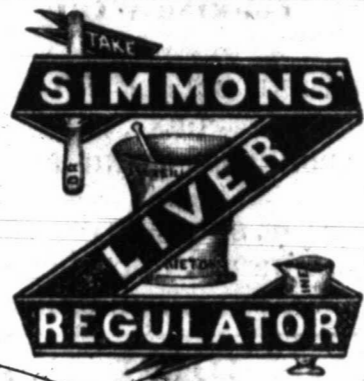

WILL San Antonio ratify Schleicher, Coke and "Bill"?

SCHLEICHER hates the colored people, and they hate him.

"WHAT! Schleicher! Old Schleicher!"

We might stand one in a Congressman's name, but two of them is too much.

The Galveston News has nothing to say about Schleicher's nomination at Goliad.

LET a public meeting of all opposed to Schleicher's election be held in San Antonio.

THE Hebrews have no use for Schleicher in this city. Ask them, and they will tell you why.

The German voters, when they want a German in Congress, will not propose Schleicher.

SCHLEICHER, when translated into English, means "snake," or, as we have shortened, "snake." We don't want a "snake" in Congress.

SCHLEICHER is Morgan's man, Morgan's engineer, Morgan's railroad monopoly tool. Failing to get Stockdale, Morgan's attorney, they give us Morgan's engineer. Bah!

SCHLEICHER is bad enough, Coke is worse, and "Bill" Russell is still worse; but to pack all three will break the back of any party or any District.

JIM REED, the San Antonio stage robber, made no confession before he died, after all that has been said about it. The published confession was a forgery.

LET the honest men of Western Texas agree together, without regard to party, to vote for any able man to beat Schleicher. We make the proposition, and we will abide by it.

THE Bexar delegation and its friends was the strongest party in the Goliad Convention, and were masters of the situation, and yet they frittered away their opportunity. The people will hold them to account for it.

The Austin Statesman complains that the money arising from the last sale of bonds does not arrive. What is the matter? Austin needs that money, and the Statesman does too. That is the reason that paper is so mild on Coke.

THE FRONTIER COUNTIES were not represented in the Goliad Convention, and they were overslaughed. About twenty of them, nearly half, had no representation at all, even by proxy, and consequently a frontier protection man had no showing in the nomination. The whole frontier will feel outraged by the conduct of the Goliad Convention.

THE FRONTIER has been wholly ignored in Schleicher's nomination. He will not be "worth a row of pins" to it. What is the use for Democratic conventions to talk about their devotion to frontier protection after this? Nobody will believe them after this, and they do not believe in themselves. Gen. Baylor in Congress would have been worth forty Schleichers to the frontier.

SCHLEICHER must and will be beaten for the honor of San Antonio and West Texas.

HURLEY is a humbug. We always thought so. The Galveston News says that he was directed by the City Council to confer with the wharf monopoly men, and that "he has failed to do his duty." Hurley can do his duty when the money is on duty's side; when it is on the other side, he cannot. That's Hurley all over. We know his raising. He is a first class fraud.

THE Goliad Convention would have ignored Coke's administration had it not been for "Bill" Russell. "Bill" saved Coke for once. *Pro nobilitate fratrum.* The regular resolutions presented to the Convention had no mention of Coke. But "Bill" introduced a nauseously fulsome laudation of Coke, and the Convention, though opposed to Coke, allowed him to force the vote, and passed the resolution, which will be their shame ever afterwards. The Convention also indorsed "Bill's" Democracy. Of course, it could indorse any such creature, after indorsing Coke. It was a jack-assical concern all round and all over.

THE REPUBLICANS of San Antonio, and of Western Texas, have shown from the beginning a fair disposition to unite with the Democrats upon any moderate, national man for Congress, on the ground of his ability to promote the improvement of our harbors, the protection of our frontier, the settlement of our troubles with Mexico, and the general development of the West. But the Goliad Convention has paid no regard to their wishes. It has given us a Coke Ireland Morgan monopoly tool as its candidate for Congress. We shall not unite on Schleicher, that is certain. If now there is a fierce contest, the Democracy will only be to blame for it. They give us a candidate we can not and will not vote for. And yet we are willing to sink party preferences for the sake of a good man. But it will soon be too late.

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—The majority against the Constitution is 47,000; against license 6000. An official canvass also shows a majority against minority representation of 18,500, and a majority against State aid to railroads of 25,124.

HAVANA, Aug. 28.—An official dispatch from the eastern department states that a force of Spanish troops attacked a body of insurgents numbering 350 men in Bayaboa, causing the death of many of them and twelve Spaniards.

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—J. C. Bancroft Davis had a special audience with Emperor William to-day, and delivered his credentials as the American minister. He afterwards visited the Empress.

NEW YORK, August 28.—The Beecher investigating committee have submitted their report. They conclude:

- 1. That Beecher did not commit adultery with Mrs. Tilton at any time or place whatever.
- 2. Beecher has never committed any unchaste or improper act with Mrs. Tilton

nor made any unchaste or improper remarks.

3. If this was a question of errors of judgment on the part of Mr. Beecher it would be easy to criticize, especially in the light of recent events; and in such criticism, even to the extent of regrets, we are sure no man would join more sincerely than Mr. Beecher himself.

4. We find nothing whatever in the evidence that should impair the perfect confidence of Plymouth Church or the world in the Christian character and integrity of Henry Ward Beecher, and now let the peace of God that passeth all understanding rest and abide with Plymouth Church and her beloved pastor, so much and so long afflicted.

Republican Meeting in the West.

LAREDO, WEBB CO., Aug. 22, 1874. Proceedings of a mass meeting of the Republicans of Webb, Encinal and La Salle counties convened, pursuant to a previous call by the chairman of the Executive Committee of said counties.

The meeting was called to order by Hamilton C. Peterson, chairman executive committee. There being no secretary, E. D. Rawson Esq was nominated and unanimously elected. The chairman stated that the object of the meeting was to elect delegates to the Republican Congressional Convention to be held in the city of San Antonio on the 9th proximo, and also to elect an executive committee for Webb, Encinal and La Salle counties for the ensuing year.

The chairman appointed the following named gentlemen as a committee to suggest names of delegates to the Congressional Convention, viz: Thomas Lang, H. Poggenpohl, Atanacio Gomez.

The following named gentlemen were appointed as a committee to suggest names of members for an executive committee for the ensuing year, viz: T. Sheldon, E. D. Rawson, Ribiano Botello.

A recess was taken to give the committees time to report. After a lapse of some fifteen minutes, the meeting was called to order and the committee on nomination of delegates submitted the following names, viz: Hamilton C. Peterson to represent Webb county; E. D. Rawson to represent La Salle county; Don Carlos Salinas to represent Encinal county.

The committee on nomination of an executive committee submitted the following names, viz: C. G. Brewster, chairman, E. D. Rawson secretary, H. C. Peterson, T. Lang, H. Poggenpohl.

The reports of the several committees were unanimously adopted.

Speeches were made by Messrs. Lang and Poggenpohl.

On motion it was resolved that the San Antonio EXPRESS, Nacces Valley and Brownsville Banners publish the proceedings of the meeting. There being no further business, on motion the meeting adjourned sine die.
