Platform of the Republican Party of the Sixth Congressional District.

1st. We, the Republicans of the 6th Congressional District of the State of Texas, having regard to the necessities of Western Texas, declare that in our nomination of a candidate for the representation of the people of this District, in Congress, we place the protection, development and welfare of our country above all partisan considerations, and pledge our candidate to labor assiduously for the common good.

2nd. We hereby charge the administration of Gov. Coke with a neglect, willful or ignorant, of the interests and rights of our section, and we charge that the Goliad Convention, by its endorsement of Gov. Coke, forfeited all claim on the part of its candidate to the support of the patriots and well-wishers of Western Texas.

3rd. We demand from the Federal Government the fulfillment of its contracted treaty obligations for the defence of our frontier and pledge our candidate, if elected, to use every proper effort to give effect to our demand.

4th. Whereas past experience has taught us that Western Texas cannot obtain from the State Government the aid which is due to her, and necessary for the development of her natural resources, and believing that a division of the State will be beneficial to the promotion of her material interests, we declare in favor of a division of the State.

5th. We are in favor of harbor and river improvements of the State.

6th. We oppose the fostering of monopolies by the officers of this State and the members of Congress.

7th. We sustain the President of the United States in his opposition to and veto of the inflation bill, and favor a speedy return to specie payment.

THE Republicans of Vermont themselves defeated the author of the press-gag law. In Texas the Democracy endorse the State administration in its efforts to abase its printing patronage and destroy the freedom of the press.

WE note with pleasure the contradiction of the reported existence of yellow fever in Galveston. The Houston Telegraph intimates that the rumor was gotten up in the interests of St. Louis by a Washington operator. The charge is serious. It should be investigated and, if proven, severe punishment should be inflicted on the offender.

MR. DEGENER'S SPEECH.—We give to day the first half of the admirable and statesmanlike address delivered by Mr. Degener a week ago in Karber's Garden. The pressure upon our space caused by the Convention and the time required for the transcription of the photographer's report have been the causes of the delay in the publication of the address. After we have completed our report we shall also give space to the speech made by Col. Schleicher on his acceptance of the Goliad nomination and shall call the attention of our readers to the confirmation given by it to Mr. Degener's remarks.

ADDRESS OF HON. E. DEGENER.

The question is asked "whether I am a candidate for Congress?" My answer is, "for the time being I am not, eventually I may be a candidate."

Thus far nobody is authorized to announce my name, but it depends upon your action, it depends upon the action of other primary meetings of whose proceedings I am not officially informed, and upon the action of the Convention itself whether I can give my consent to have my name published in the papers.

This eventually needs an explanation, and you are welcome to it, if you will listen to me.

I presume, most of you have read the call for a Congressional Convention, signed by Judge Bagley, Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of this District. I doubt, however, whether many of you have noticed a peculiarity in this call, which is certainly a novelty in a document of this description.

Speaking of the object for which the convention is called, Judge Barden says: "For the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, or of taking such action with reference thereto, as may be necessary."

It is the word *or* to which I have to call your attention, a word, which gives discretionary power to the convention.

They may nominate a candidate, they may refuse a nomination, they may endorse an independent candidate, they even endorse the Democratic party.

Fellow citizens, an arbitrary power of this kind is not given to any body of men without good cause.

We shall find a clue to it by reviewing the history of the Republican party in this State. I allude to the last few years, which may with great propriety be called the Era of Defeat. That era commenced with the Congressional Election of 1871, in which I was the sufferer, it had its sequel in the Congressional and Presidential election of 1872, and its climax in the general, or State election 1873.

This last election, in which Gov. Davis was defeated, and Mr. Coke became the successful candidate, with so overwhelming a majority, as Texas had never given before, prostrated the Republican party to such an extent, that the earnest question was raised, whether it was not useless to continue the struggle, and better to drop the Republican organization altogether.

Was it the despondency of the party, or was it the lull which always follows great excitement? This much is certain, the latter idea seemed to prevail, and the hue and cry was raised: "The Republican party has accomplished its mission, let it cease to exist."

Those who raised this cry did not take into consideration a rule in history, which ever will repeat itself. The rule is this: Whenever a party becomes omnipotent, the extremists in its own ranks (they invariably being the most energetic), will drive the party against the wall, and a new party consisting of the remnants of the old, and the dissatisfied members of the dominant party, will rise in opposition. The older citizens among you will recollect the annihilation of the Whig party; they will recollect the sudden terrific rise of the Know-Nothings; how these were conquered by the alliance of the foreign born citizens with the Democratic party, little as the ideas of the former might harmonize with the pro-slavery proclivities of the latter.

You all recollect how the civil war originated, how the Union party had the honor to save the Republic, and how the latter was again abandoned by the War Democrats, but was still powerful enough, under the name of the Republican party, to dictate the conditions of Reconstruction to the vanquished.

The Republican party has certainly not understood to avoid the mistakes previously committed by other dominant parties, and in this State it was prostrated, eye to such an extent, that the stepping in of the historical rule might well have been anticipated.

I must confess, I was not so sanguine. It was my idea not to participate in any election, but allow the Democratic nominee to walk over the track without opposition on our part, say even perhaps give my vote to a Democrat, provided:

1. That the nominee did not belong to what is generally styled the Bourbon Democracy;

2. That he was beyond any suspicion of favoring a ring or clique, but was an able, true and impartial advocate of our western interests;

3. That the platform on which he be nominated was of such a character, that Republicans could vote for him without stultifying themselves.

Now, fellow citizens, let us see how the Democratic Convention in Goliad has filled these requirements.

First: Is Mr. Schleicher a Bourbon Democrat? From my personal intimate connection with the gentleman, I am safe in asserting, that he is not. No he is none of that class, who have "neither learned nor forgotten." Much less is he an advocate of the Blood and Terror Policy, which found its illustration in the Goliad Convention, when a delegate declared, that he preferred "to kill one nigger to killing two Indians." This remark was not rebuked by the President, nor did any member of the convention call the advocate of Ku-Kluxism to order, thus allowing this stain to rest on the entire convention. I quote from the Galveston News, a Democratic paper, and shall be happy to apologize, if the report proves to be false. No, Mr. Schleicher's humanity is beyond suspicion of countenancing a Ku-Klux. He

may have his antipathy against seeing even the most cultivated colored man in office, especially in a legislative body, but certainly the loss of property in slaves could not engender in him that feeling of hate against the colored race, which is one of the characteristics of Bourbonism. No, no, Mr. Schleicher is not a Bourbon.

Second: Is Mr. Schleicher beyond suspicion of favoring a ring or a clique, is he an able, true and impartial advocate of our western interests? Of Mr. Schleicher's abilities there can exist but one opinion. A happy natural organization in conjunction with an education as perfect as the much boasted German schools and universities could give, together with ample political experience in this State will make Mr. Schleicher a representative of the Democracy on whom they may well look with pride, especially if Mr. Schleicher should be called upon to write important public documents. Those of you who recollect the brilliant letters, which appeared in the Herald of this city, some five or six years ago, over the signature of "Bexar", on the subject of division of the State, will concur with me, that as a writer Mr. Schleicher has no superior in this district, and will join in my regrets, that his literary efforts were of such short duration.

But is Mr. Schleicher in a position to use his talents impartially in the interest of his constituents, or will his gratitude towards those who seek to elevate him to the distinguished position of a Congressman force him to favor a monopoly, which threatens the welfare of Western Texas and of this city?

Far be it from me to intimate, that Mr. Schleicher would consent to anything he considers wrong, but whatever personal regard we may have for his character, we must acknowledge, that views will differ on the merits of an Internal Improvement question, especially when such improvement is at the mercy of a monopolist.

Mr. Schleicher will no doubt give a flat denial to all the inferences which may be drawn from the surroundings, but until this is done in the most satisfactory manner, Mr. Schleicher must excuse the people, if in view of existing facts, they consider the same as strong circumstantial evidence, that he is more a representative of the Morgan monopoly, than of the true interest of the people.

Let us see what the Morgan monopoly is. It began with a steamboat line between New Orleans and Galveston and Indianola. Then a railroad was added from New Orleans to Brashear City, which changed to some extent the starting point from the former city to the latter. This combination soon became strong enough to exclude all competition. Opposition lines were attempted, but soon killed off, and the merchants of this city who patronized the opposition steamers, were charged additional freight as a punishment for their temerity, when they again sent goods on board a Morgan steamer. The merchants here present will bear me out, that my statement is correct.

Subsequently Mr. Morgan became the owner of the Mexican Gulf and San Antonio Railroad charter. The road was built to Victoria and a splendid wharf at Indianola put in direct connection with the road, right through the centre of the city. This forced the commission merchants of Indianola to build houses and establish branch firms at Victoria. Then the road was continued to Cuero, and the same commutation of business firms recommenced. Hardly was this accomplished, and the Cuero town lots sold, when an arrangement was perfected by which the entire transportation business fell into Mr. Morgan's hands. The commission merchants had no longer any use for their establishments in Cuero, and could go to other parts. "The Moor has done his duty. He can go." In the meantime the people of Bexar county were solicited to take \$500,000 stock in RAILROAD stock against their county bonds. The vote of the citizens was in favor of the investment, and Mr. Morgan agreed to pay a forfeit of \$100,000, if within a certain period the road did not reach San Antonio. The Morgan road has until now not reached any further than Cuero. The time has elapsed, but the bond proves to be worthless.

Mr. Morgan is an old man; he says, or is reported to have said, he had no money to continue the road, and did not desire, at his advanced age, to load more liabilities on his shoulders.

But suddenly we read in the papers, that Mr. Morgan has agreed to build a ship channel to Houston. This you see he owns the two principal gates which open the trade of our vast territory with the world. Well Mr. Morgan has money for the channel, but not for a connection with San Antonio. He had moreover an other one-half million to spare, to buy Texas State bonds and relieve Gov. Coke from his financial difficulties, from which the inference may be drawn, that the Cuero road instead of finding its terminus at San Antonio may be continued to Austin. Why not since it has by legislative action become a Pacific road, and optional whether it be continued to San Antonio or not.

It may further be inferred, that the assistance rendered to Gov. Coke, is either a return for favors already received, or still expected, in the International Railroad bond case.

But we have the Peirce Railroad, sure! Look at the map. See how the two lines of railroad, commencing at Indianola and Houston respectively, converge at Austin, embracing fully the Peirce line, and ready to crush it out, or take it up perhaps into the combination. Truly a brilliant investment of an \$800,000 subsidy. And for this trifle of a sum we have bought the privilege of paying to our lives and the

high freight which the monopoly may please to charge.

Do not believe, that the youngest of you will ever see the day, when a competition railroad line from the coast will force the giant Morgan to reduce his tariff. The Pacific road will run up the Colorado Valley, and San Antonio become a rotten borough. Yes, fellow-citizens, when we have fed this monopoly to its full size, our government will receive its cue from New Orleans, and we'll well we pay for the music.

Now let us see, what Mr. Schleicher has to do with this monopoly, or what the circumstances are, which place Mr. Schleicher in the unenviable light of being suspected of being the Morgan candidate.

The history of the Goliad convention will show. Gov. Stockdale of Indianola was the favorite candidate, strongly supported by the anti-International and anti-Pierce railroad Ireland Democracy.

But was it unwillingness to elect a bitter Democrat, or was it the instinctive caution, with which a man will walk in a dark room, lest he strikes his head against a door standing ajar? certain it is, that the Bexar delegation could not be induced to vote for the Vice-President of the Morgan railroad, notwithstanding his high position as a gentleman and a scholar. The fifty third ballot was reached without the requisite two-thirds majority. Then Gov. Stockdale withdrew, Mr. Schleicher, as an old San Antonio man, appeared on the stage, and the Bexar delegation went into the trap. They had fifty-three times refused to vote for the Vice-President of the road, and then accepted the engineer of the road with three cheers.

Now, to whom does Mr. Schleicher in reality owe his election? To a combination of the extreme Coke Democracy and the supporters of the Morgan monopoly.

Can Mr. Schleicher deny the strength of these facts? Can he philosophize the inferences out of existence, which will be drawn out of these facts? Will his high intelligence enable him to show that there is no motive even for suspicion? Granting for arguments sake, that Mr. Schleicher should convince us that we misconstrued his position, there still remains an obstacle he can not surmount. He stands on a platform which endorses the Coke-administration, which proclaims the Governor a patriot and a statesman. Gov. Coke, Republicans and the majority of Democracy, pronounced a failure, a patriot! a statesman! Contradiction would be a superfluity. Can a Republican vote for a candidate who indorses Coke? Can he without being a renegade to his faith and forgetful of his political honor accept such a platform?

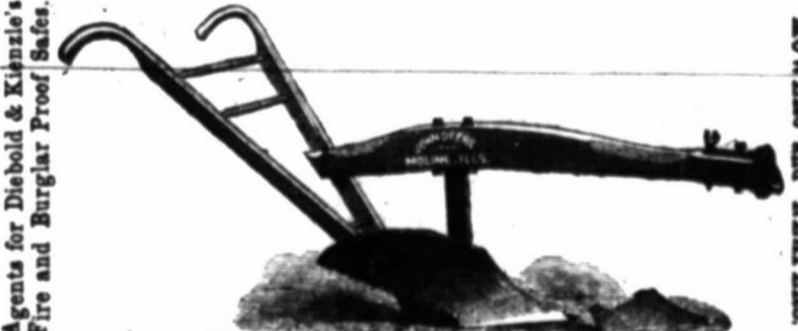
