CANADA. MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Owing to the accumulation of ice at the rapids the water has risen about two feet over the locks of Beauharnois Canal, flooding several houses compelling the inmates to leave.

OMAHA, Feb. 20.—The investigation which has been in progress for several days past, by the Legislature, into the management of the Penitentiary, shows that the prisoners have been subjected to extremely cruel treatment, and clothed and fed miserably.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 17.—Public interest in the James boys sensation has been aroused again by an arrest made yesterday near Independence, Mo., of one Hines, supposed to be concerned in the robbery of the Wells-Fargo Express car, where \$30,000 were secured.

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—A letter has been received by Chas. Collins, editor of the Times, direct from a party that left here last October for the Black Hills gold mines.

BRUSSELS, Feb. 20.—Various States of the empire are investigating the causes of emigration. To remove them, it is proposed to facilitate the acquisition of small estates, and to oppose the action of emigrant agents paid by Transatlantic governments.

MADRID, Feb. 20.—A report that complications have arisen between Germany and Spain in regard to the Guestar affair is denied. On the contrary, it is asserted that their relations are of a cordial nature.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Mr. E. J. Reed, late Naval Constructor, will introduce a motion that Parliament instruct the Admiralty to postpone for a year the Polar expedition which is now organizing, with the view that the Austrian and other governments may co-operate in the work of exploration.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 18.—A Washington telegram to the Alta California states that more than forty Senators have agreed to oppose all railroad subsidy bills, and that the Central and Southern Pacific men are confident that this defeats the Texas Pacific.

Next month a scout of U. S. troops will leave Fort Griffin in pursuit of the Indians now off the reservations. Col. Wood, in command at Fort Richardson, will leave in a few days for New Orleans, on a leave of absence for four months.

General Mackenzie is now at Fort Sill, and will inaugurate a vigorous campaign against the hostile Indians this spring.

W. E. CHASE, Esq., our brother of the Waco Register, and postmaster in that city, is married at last. We congratulate him, and wish him and his bride all joy and happiness.

GALVESTON either has some bitter enemies in the State administration, or she is a sink-hole of fraud and rascality. The News says there is a bill prepared to provide the appointment by the Governor, of a committee of three agriculturists to proceed to Galveston, and inquire into the abuses connected with the handling of produce at that point. It is said that the movement has particular reference to the weighing of cotton. The News seems to think that the Wharf Monopoly is the proper subject of "investigation."

The Waco Examiner is of the opinion that the whole subject of weighing, transferring and selling the products of the State, demands attention. That grave impositions are practiced, not only in Galveston, but elsewhere, the Examiner says it has abundant evidence. Indeed, every day produces new evidence of the existence of fraud, by which the farmers are cheated out of their hard earned money by a system of false weights, and other tricks known only to the initiated. The Examiner is a fervid advocate of State rights, and a bitter opponent of Federal interference in State affairs, even where not only gigantic frauds, but brutal murders also, are prevalent, and unpunished by State authority. If the State can interfere with the autonomy, or home-rule, of a city, why cannot the Nation do the same thing in a State? It is true that the relation of a State to the Nation is different from that of a city to the State, but the analogy is the same as far as the authority and responsibility of seeing justice done is concerned.

But that Galveston has been a vampire, fattening on the trade of the interior, almost from the beginning of our State history, is a fact that no one can deny. She has never built a mile of railroad, but has striven to defraud other cities out of the benefits of the railroads that have been built, that she might go rich on the trade of their investments and their labors. Her wharf monopoly, her cotton compress and weighing frauds, and other stealings from the planters, farmers, merchants and artisans of the interior, have been always supported by her press, except when these corporations failed to pay that press well; then they raised a howl against these frauds; but as soon as these frauds got ready to "come down handsomely" again, the usual silence of the press again prevailed.

Rhode Island in 1842.—Arkansas in 1875. More than thirty years ago, says the Washington Republican, just such a question was presented to the President and Congress in the Rhode Island case as is now presented in that of Arkansas. In 1842 the President of the United States was asked by King, the Gov. of Rhode Island, whether the charter government, which he represented, or that proposed to be established by the Dorr constitution, would be recognized. In response to the question the President said: "It will be my duty to respect the regulations of that government which has been recognized as the existing government of the State through all time past until I shall be advised in a regular manner that it has been altered and abolished and another substituted in its place by legal and peaceable proceedings, adopted and pursued by the authorities and people of the State."

In this view of the case the President was sustained by Clay, Calhoun, Crittenden, Webster and Preston. Opposed to it were Steamboat Hill Allen, of Ohio, and the Tammany Democracy of New York. The question presented in the Rhode Island case was, which of two governments should be recognized. The same question is presented by the Arkansas case, and is not, as some suppose, as in Louisiana, which of two men shall be recognized as the Governor of the

State. It will be observed that the President lays down three distinct propositions which will govern him in determining whether a change of constitution has been properly made: first, that the change was effected in a legal manner; second, that it was done peaceably; and third, that these legal and peaceable proceedings were adopted and pursued by the authorities and people of the State. The friends of the Dorr government, on the promulgation of this policy, were compelled to abandon all idea of establishing their government. Being dissatisfied with the President's position, the friends of the Dorr movement induced the House of Representatives of the United States to appoint a committee, and clothe it with powers similar to those conferred on the committee in the Arkansas case. That committee, after taking a vast amount of testimony, made a report, or rather two reports. The majority report fully recognized the validity of the Dorr constitution, and censured the President for interfering with it, while the minority report sustained the charter government and approved the action of the President. After much discussion, the friends of the majority report, becoming convinced that the House would not concur therein, rather than suffer open defeat, allowed the same to meet a peaceful death by the expiration of the session.

We think the position assumed by the President in 1842 is the correct one, and that it is just as good a law to-day as it was then, and it so, the people of Arkansas have no right to do what the people of Rhode Island were not permitted to do. It is said since the President interfered in the Rhode Island case a number of States have changed their constitutions, and the Federal Government has not interfered. So they have; but in the cases alluded to the officers of the old government made no requisition on the President to resist the installation of the new government. The change of constitution in those States, if not effected in the mode pointed out by the constitution itself, was by the people and the courts of the country, regarded as "legal and peaceable," and the manner of effecting it, one that was adopted and pursued by the "authorities and people of the State." Acquiescence and contentment followed the change, and the power of the General Government was not invoked to prevent a change from the old to the new. These cases furnish no precedents in the Arkansas case, for two reasons: first, because there is no acquiescence, and the Poland committee so state; and second, not only the Executive but the Congress of the United States has been requested to settle the question as to which is the rightful government of the State.

The Poland report shows that the proceedings in the Arkansas case were neither "legal nor peaceable," and that they were not adopted by the "authorities and people of the State." It further shows that the act calling a constitutional convention was unconstitutional in two respects, and that the constitution was declared ratified, not under any law of the State, but under the provisions of an ordinance which the constitutional convention had no authority to pass, and that was in violation of the Constitution and the rights of the electors in at least two particulars. Can it be said that a constitution thus declared ratified was the result of "legal" proceedings adopted and pursued by the "authorities and people of the State?" The report further states that martial law existed not only during the time the constitution was inaugurating, but down to the time of inauguration of the new government, not only this, but the committee says that they are "satisfied no one holding office under the old constitution, who should have attempted to hold on to his position and test the question of his right, could have done so without great danger to his life." In what single instance have the "authorities" and the "people" of the State of Arkansas created by the constitution of 1863 admitted that the Garland constitution was adopted by "legal and peaceable proceedings?" On the contrary, it is not true that denials of authority and protests have been entered at every step! And it is not true that the man the President and the committee say was elected Governor of the State under the constitution of 1863 is protesting against the Garland usurpation.

The Galveston Times copies and approves the STRAZZAM's editorial, and hopes Wendell Phillips will deliver lectures everywhere in the South. The Times says he is a "scholar, hero and splendid orator." The time was when, knowing this, such was the force of popular prejudice, that a Galveston paper would not have said it. We remember when it was worth a man's life, in any event, his social position, to say that Lincoln was an earnest, honest patriot, even as he was great in intellectual endowments. Everybody now admits all this. Even more is conceded perhaps than Lincoln deserved. Popular prejudices are liberalized, and progressive popular intelligence, and in Texas, where the people are from all the States, as many of recent importation from the Northwest as from the Gulf States, the process by which prejudices of ignorance are dissolved is most rapid.—Austin Statesman.

Every word of the above is true, and, coming from an intensely radical Democratic journal, it is admirable. But the sole reason for this wonderful and beneficent change in Southern feeling and opinion is to be found in the philosophy and rule of the Republican party. Precisely in proportion to the success and strength of the Democratic party is the increase and bitterness of the proscription and murderous spirit of the Southern Democracy. The supporters of Henry Clay in 1844 were as much ridiculed and abused, in speech, as the supporters of Grant are now. If God does not see fit to punish us as a people for our sins, he will avert the national calamity of a Democratic return to power in 1876.

CUBA. THE WAR WAGED VICEROY IN THE CINCO-VILLAS DISTRICT.—BULLETIN OF BATTLE DURING FOURTEEN DAYS.

HAVANA, Feb. 17, 1875. The Gazette publishes the following official record of military operations in the Cinco-Villas district for the past fortnight: BULLETIN OF BATTLE. On Feb. 6th the insurgents met with a repulse in an attack on Ojo del Agua. Brigadier General Valera attacked and dispersed a party of insurgents who had burned the settlement of Los Chambas. The enemy are reported to have lost 100 men in the fight and pursuit which ensued. THE SPANIARDS ATTACKED AND DEFEATED.

A Spanish column, numbering 365 men, was attacked by 400 insurgents, commanded by Gonzalez, near Manacaes. The fighting was desperate on both sides. The Spaniards retreated after a loss of 150 killed, wounded and missing. The loss of the enemy must have been equally heavy.

INCENDIARISM. The insurgents, on the 12th, set fire to the Santa Rosa and Pelay plantations, but the flames were extinguished by the troops and the next day a conflagration was prevented at Yaqua, where several buildings had been fired.

A SPANISH COLONEL ON THE RUN. Col. Herrera, with the mobilized volunteers of Colon and Guanatus, had a fight with the insurgents on the Pedrosa plantation. He retreated, losing seven killed; the enemy's loss is unknown.

CONDUCT BY THE FIELD. Captain General Concha is still directing the campaign in the Cinco-Villas.

CONSPIRACY OF THE PRESS. The Captain General has ordered a more vigorous enforcement of the censorship. A staff officer, under the supervision of the General in charge of the censor's office, is to carefully examine all news, dispatches or newspaper articles that in any way bear upon the war, and any persons publishing such article or despatch without submitting it to the censorship will be punished to the full extent of the law.

TEXAS NEWS. A \$100,000 fire occurred at Sherman on the 23rd inst. by a fire from a boiler. A \$150,000 fire occurred at Dallas on the same day. A man named Jackson killed J. B. Gilchrist of Atlanta, Ga., with a ten-pin ball at Ennis a few days ago. Gen. G. W. Curtis Lee, son of the immortal hero, Robert E. Lee, and President of that noted and flourishing institution, Washington and Lee University, located in the singularly picturesque town of Lexington, Virginia, passed through Houston on the 23rd en route to San Antonio, where his sister will remain for some time. Gen. Lee will start for Europe before long, and make a tour through its famous localities. He has been granted a furlough of one year by the University for that purpose. The Chief Engineer of the Houston Narrow Gauge promises that the car will be running over twenty miles of the road by the first of April.
