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An Old Citizen Speaks His Mind.

Editor San Antonio Express:

I desire to call the attention of your patrons to some of the ordinances of this city which, I think, are oppressive, to wit: The cow ordinance for one.

On avenue C and Sixth and Seventh streets, over three-quarters of a mile from Main Plaza, all the inhabitants of that part of the city support these families by the sweat of their brows, or in other words, are laborers of wood and drawers of water. An old gentleman, a stranger, residing at Mr. Sam. Maverick's place at the river above the Alamo falls, at least two blocks outside of the limits of the cow ordinance, has been ever.

Then my neighbor, on the corner of Seventh street and Avenue C had to pay \$14 for his two cows and two yearlings. But the City Fathers, in their actions, "all right," he is nothing but a stone hauer.

The excuse for this oppressive ordinance is, that it interests the stock raisers, who run in the streets. Now, allow me to inform you that Avenue C, between my house and Mr. Pitts has bushes six feet high growing in said streets of this city, and that the City Fathers, who are so prompt as to any other part of the city, and then we live in our property at its full value.

We have no objection to the cow ordinance if you will draw in the limits to the streets where the cows become a nuisance. From what I can learn, the police are the citizens who fail to keep their gates closed; or the cows have got so smart that they have learned to open the gates, and they destroy the alderman. Now, they have never opened my gate, neither have they hurt my trees on the street this year. But then I forget that it is my property, and I am not to be bothered with any rights in this city or elsewhere.

I think the whole matter sums up in this, that the city will be benefited or not, and that the streets clear of cows where vehicles rarely go. I would suggest to the Honorable Mayor and aldermen to create a new ordinance, that will be a benefit to the city. That will be the stock holder for the city, as a retrenchment of the watchword in their present administration, as most of the aldermen seem to be.

I am satisfied that retrenchment is the only way to benefit the city. I have received from the market houses, particularly the one on the West side, a list of all the goods that have been sold there, and the amount of the same. The market house was reported under Col. Street as having sold \$100,000 worth of goods in 1874. That year was the best year for the market house since it was first established.

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GEORGE VANCE.

Ex-Governor Vance, of North Carolina, in his recent address before the Southern Historical Society, related a secret incident of the war. He said that soon after the failure of the Hampton Roads conference he was visited by the late Governor Graham, who stated to him that many of the Senators and Representatives in the Confederate Congress, and other men believed that the end of the war was near, and desiring of obtaining peace through Mr. Davis, they desired Mr. Vance, as Governor of North Carolina, to enter into separate terms with President Lincoln. Governor Vance said that he declined to take the secret step.

Three Scotch herd boys who worked together in the Parish of Bankfoot, Perth, grew up to be Robert Nicoll, the poet Dr. Duff, the missionary, and Mr. Mackenzie, the present Premier of Canada.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—Judge Brady of the Supreme Court, granted an order of prohibition on the suit of Drexel, Morgan & Co. vs. the Bank of California, to recover \$25,000 gold, on affidavit that defendant is a foreign corporation, whose president is dead, and whose cashier lives in San Francisco, and which has no office in this city on whom service could be made. The suit is not for deposits, but on a circular note.

The National Board of Steam Navigation has now hundred delegates from Louisiana, North Carolina, Georgia, Louisiana, Norfolk, Baltimore and St. Louis. The Secretary of the Board said the objects of the Board were, first, before safeguards for life and property; second, fixed and permanent rules of navigation; third, relief from exactions of patent right holders; fourth, protection from undue liability.

DAYTON, Ohio, Sept. 2.—Yesterday Wm. Dawson, ex-colonel of an Indiana regiment, while attending a wedding party at Harlow's Mill, having refused admission to six roughs, was stabbed by one of them named James Murphy, in the abdomen, and died in a few minutes. Three hundred persons gathered around the fall last night with the avowed purpose of lynching Murphy, but were prevented by the entire police of the city.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Yesterday and to-day a large number of depositors of the Freedman's Savings Bank, crowded the rooms of that institution, expecting to receive a dividend of twenty-five percent, having been misled by unauthorized newspaper statements that such a dividend would be made on the first of September. These depositors were informed by the clerks that a dividend would not be declared before Christmas, the remaining sum namely, \$75,000 for that purpose having yet to be realized.

Paymaster Gilbert E. Thornton, has been detached from duty as purchasing paymaster at Washington, D. C., to take effect on the first of October next, and ordered to settle his accounts. Paymaster Wm. W. Williams has been ordered to duty as purchasing paymaster at Washington, in place of Mr. Thornton, who has been on duty here for three years. In accordance with the usage of the navy, he will be ordered to another station.

The Treasurer of the United States has to-day transferred \$200,000 of gold from New York to San Francisco, on the application of the National Gold Bank of San Francisco.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—Intelligence was received here this noon of a collision in the Channel between the "Majesty's" war vessel, Lord D'Almeida and Vanguard, resulting in the sinking of the latter. No lives lost.

MADRID, Sept. 2.—Gen. Martinez Campos has arrived at Ripoll, on his way to Barcelona with the Carlist prisoners captured at Seo de Urgel.

The Bishop of Seo de Urgel who was captured, will be imprisoned in a fortress at Alicante, where he will await the decision of the government or his fate.
