## Tolk Station Construction Continues

### U.S. Congressman Discusses Issues

#### Town Hall Meeting Held Here Saturday

Kent Hance, Congressman for the 19th district, from Lubbock, visited in Muleshoe Saturday afternoon in a series of Town Hall meetings.

Congressman Hance, at the time he was elected, said he would return to the district periodically for a series of Town Hall meetings with his constituents.

During his meeting in Muleshoe Saturday, he spoke on a series of events considered to be of vital concern to the persons in this area and across the nation.

#### IRAN

Focusing first on the crisis in Iran, the Cong-

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ressman said the current crisis could be compared to Pearl Harbor and Vietnam, and termed it one of the few events to come along to change history.

According to the Congressman, regardless of the outcome of the crisis, it will be one of the major historical events for this nation.

Because of the location of Iran, near Russia, and the oil supplies formerly obtained from that country, Iran was a critical location for the government. Hance said that after Ayatollah Khomeini took over the country on January 16 of this year, the United States tried to establish relations. However, both the first and second prime ministers to serve under Khomeini have resigned in disappointment with the government established by Khomeini.

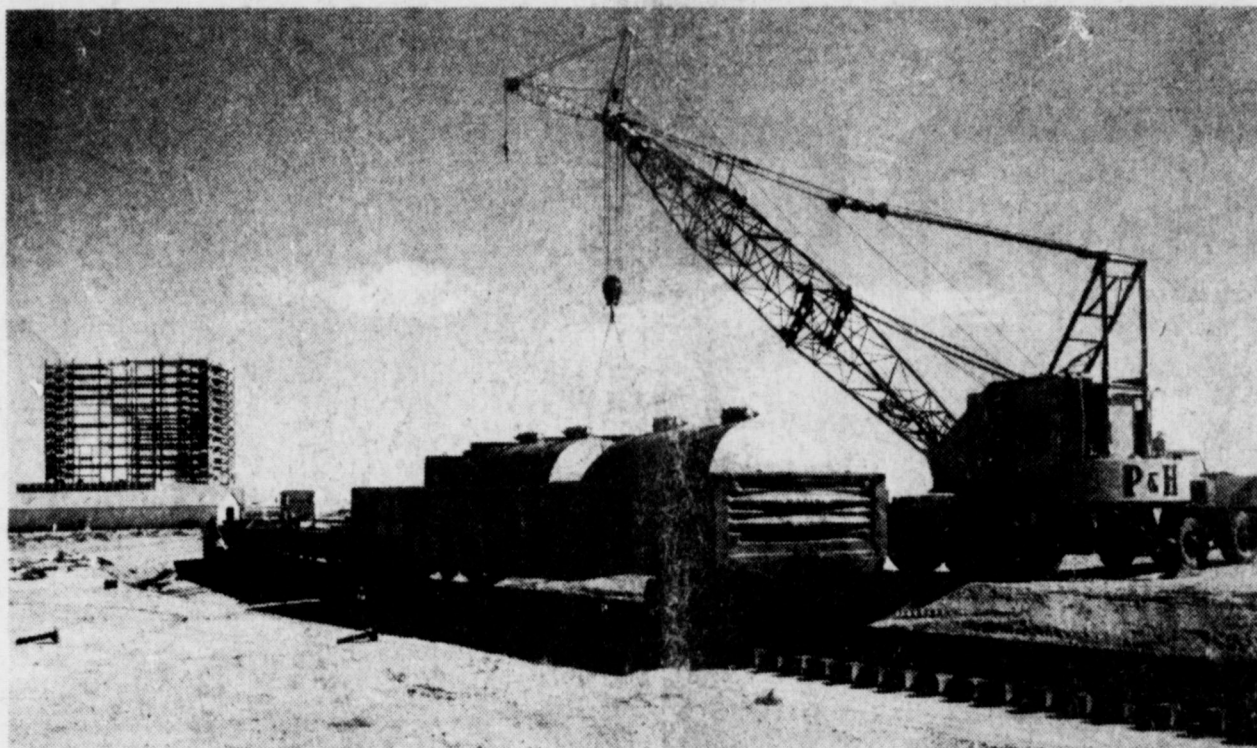
Hance told the Muleshoe audience that unemployment was about 45 percent under Khomeini and that inflation ranged from 50 to 100 percent after he took over the regime.

It is believed, according to Hance, that Khomeini and his government encouraged terrorists, aided by only a few students, to take over the U. S. Embassy in Tehran to help divert the attention being received by his beleaguered government.

Repeatedly, Hance said the number one concern of the U. S. government at this time is the ultimate safe return of all 50 hostages.

He termed the next ten days, from Saturday, as very critical in attempting to obtain safe release of the 50 hostages. He said if there is not some settlement in the next few

### Structural Steel Rising Into Sky

Blue steel reaches high in the air -- almost sixteen stories high -- at Southwestern Public Service Company's Tolk Station. The coal-fired plant in Lamb County, near Muleshoe, is becoming a reality -- no longer just blueprints or a large hole in the ground surrounded by all the huge construction equipment, piles of blue steel, a few temporary construction buildings. Although still two and a half years away from the scheduled completion, the unit is beginning to take shape -- 20,000 yards of concrete have been poured, 1,750 tons of structural steel have been erected.

Tolk, like all of Southwestern's plants constructed since 1952, is designed and engineered by Southwestern personnel. No two units have been built exactly alike, but the first and second unit at Tolk will be very similar. However, if new technology is introduced which would make the second unit more efficient or easier to operate, then changes would be made.

Southwestern is one of very few electric utility companies in the United States that design and engineer their own plants. This procedure has proven to be very efficient and economical -- so economical in fact, that Southwestern's plants are built for about one-half of the national average per KW. And when you consider that the first unit at Tolk will cost well over \$200 million, the savings become apparent.

For the last few years, Southwestern has put a new unit on the line about every two years, but each unit takes longer than two years to construct. As Harrington III, near Amarillo, enters its last six months of construction, Tolk has been under construction for about fourteen months.

At Harrington III, all major pieces of equipment are now in place. The boiler has been tested for leaks. This boiler, like all boilers in Southwestern's plants, is custom designed and built to Southwestern's specifications, but is assembled at the plant. After the boiler is in place, it is filled with water and pressurized or "squeezed" to locate any leaks. Some leaks, whether from factory or the on-the-site welds, are normal, but must be found and corrected before the boiler can be used. Each major piece of equipment will be tested between now and March of next year, before the boiler is used.

Harrington III, like Harrington II, will use an emission control device called a baghouse. The baghouse at Harrington III is composed of 32 compartments with 204 bags in each compartment for a total of 6,528 bags. It operates on the same principle as a vacuum cleaner. Tolk will also use a baghouse filter system but

Muleshoe schools received good income from football games again this year, although the income was down slightly from last year. In 1978, the total football income, including both playoff games as last football season.

Most of the loss of revenue was in pre-season games, with the biggest loss in the Idalou game, where a total of \$2,261.76 was received last year, and only \$1,313.41 this year. Justice of the Peace K.B. Martin reported that only violation had been filed with him in Bailey County, with most of the activity reported to the north in Parmer County.

At least one hunting accident was reported. One man was reported to have been climbing down from a plane enroute to a pheasant hunt, and shot himself in the foot when his gun accidentally discharged.

Temperature for early mornings was predicted to be in the low teens for the rest of the week, and the clouds were expected to be out of the area by Friday.

Not enough moisture was expected to seriously hinder harvesting operations.

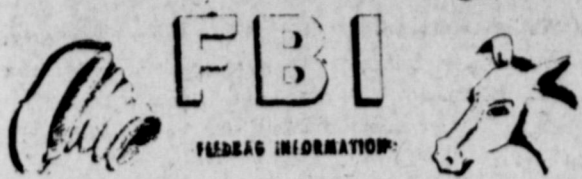

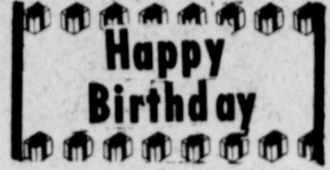

The High scorers of the game were Ronnie Cox with 8, Ronald Briggs with 7 and Darin Shaw and Mike Pecina, each with 6.

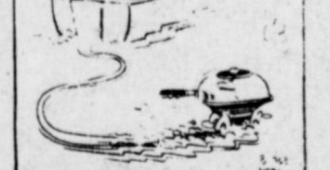
**Eighth Grade Boys In Loss To Dimmitt**

### Fireplaces Made Safe

Neglect and careless fireplace use often result in injury or a serious fire hazard. Use the following "tips" to reduce the threat of accidental burns and fires:

- 1) Never use flammable liquids to start the fire.
- 2) Avoid excessive amounts of newspaper to build roaring fires in the fireplace.
- 3) Charcoal is great for steaks, but never burn it in a fireplace. Burning charcoal gives off deadly amounts of carbon monoxide, so use it outdoors--never in a fireplace.
- 4) Keep a metal or glass screen in front of the fireplace to catch flying embers. Flying embers can easily ignite carpet, furniture and other combustible items in the room.
- 5) Make sure no flammable materials hang down from or decorate the mantel. A spark from the fireplace can ignite such

Lack of sanitation, insufficient cooking and improper storage can allow bacteria in food to increase to dangerous levels and cause illness when the food is eaten.

"Disease-producing bacteria may enter the body in contaminated food and produce infections in the digestive tract, and, in some cases, in the bloodstream. Other bacteria may form poisonous substances called toxins," said Elmer "Buck" Butgereit of the Food, Beverage and Meat Products Division of the Texas Safety Association.

will utilize a different bag cleaning technique.

At Tolk, the railroad into the plant, while not complete, is usable. The first shipment of equipment into the plant by rail has arrived. The steam drum, one of the largest single pieces of equipment, will arrive this month. The steam drum hangs from huge steel girders high in the top of the plant with the building constructed around it. Its placement is a milestone in the construction schedule.

An innovation at Tolk is the use of fiberglass water pipes, 120 inches in diameter, underground located underground from the plant to the cooling tower. The fifty-five foot lengths of pipe won't corrode and are easier to put in place than pipe previously used.

Tolk will use stainless steel condenser tubes—278 miles of tubes—and, for the first time, stainless steel condenser tube sheets.

Tolk, like Harrington III, will be equipped with a Direct Digital Control system. There are only five or six systems of this type in use in the country at the present time. The Direct Digital Control (DDC) incorporates three computer systems; the boiler control system; the data acquisition system (or plant computer which is

the eyes and ears of the plant operators and continuously monitors the efficiency of the plant; and the turbine speed and load control system. All systems can communicate at rates in excess of 1200 bits per second.

Most of the dirt work is complete and structural work will begin in December on the coal-handling facility. This facility, unlike the bottom-dumping facility at Harrington, will feature rotary-dump cars. Railroad cars, moving through a dumping building located over the coal stackout hopper, will be turned upside down while still attached to cars in front and back. This type dumping will minimize coal dust and will enable coal, when frozen, to be dumped much easier and faster. The rotary dump cars are five to seven tons lighter than the bottom-dump cars and will carry that much more coal and still remain within the maximum gross weight per car.

Tolk, with a capability of 543,000 KW, will be Southwestern's largest single unit. This one unit will generate more electricity than any of Southwestern's gas-fired plants and considerably more than a single unit at Harrington. Tolk will generate enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

One unit at Tolk will burn 296 tons of Wyoming coal per hour, 7,104 tons per year. Four trains, each composed of 110 cars, will be required to supply coal to Tolk.

When the first unit at Tolk starts generating electricity in 1982, construction of the second unit at the same location will be well under way.

days, the situation could linger on for weeks and possibly months, before being settled.

He also predicted that the United States would be changing activities in locations of other embassies in view of the Iranian crisis.

He also said it was critical for Israel and Egypt 'to get along,' and reminded that 48 percent of the oil for the United States comes from OPEC countries. He said it would be militarily and economically to the advantage of the United States to have a peaceful settlement of the current crisis in Iran.

### BUDGET

On the new budget, Hance said the new budget was approved by a vote of 206-186, and said there is a \$30 billion deficit, compared to a \$29 billion deficit last year.

However, this is considerably lower than the \$66 billion deficit when former President Gerald Ford was in office, according to the Congressman.

Each budget item was cut from one to three percent, he said, and also commented that he believed that following the next election, the budget will be coming closer to balancing.

### WINDFALL PROFITS TAX

Hance said he opposed the Windfall Profits Tax for oil producers, because it taxes domestic production, and exempts foreign oil.

He commented that he would have supported a tax of \$4-\$6 on foreign oil, but said the Windfall Profit Tax bill, as written, will not encourage more production of oil, or exploration, but will, in fact, stop exploration processes.



Clay cookware revives in popularity on the home-front!

With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and disadvantages.

Enthusiasts claim that the self-basting action allows use of less-tender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds in the steam as well as the food juices.

In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed—a plus for weight watchers.

One disadvantage is the pots may stain. Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clean since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware.

Also, sudden temperature changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.

### FARM BILL

The Congressman predicted that the new farm bill will be approved following what he termed a 'knock-down, drag-out' fight, with target and loan prices tied to the cost of living index.

Also, test the glaze to determine the absence or presence of lead. A simple home test is to fill the cookware half full of vinegar and allow it to stand overnight. If there is any difference in the glaze below the vinegar line, use the dish for non-acid foods only.

Adapting this ancient cooking craft to microwaves requires few changes. As with many adapted recipes, decrease the liquid by one-fourth.
