RONNIE ALLEN, 9, DIES OF POLIO

Nine-year-old Ronnie Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Allen, now of Las Vegas, N.M. died of bulbar polio on Wednesday of this week. He died in a hospital in Las Vegas. He was called about the middle of the morning Wednesday and told the attending nurse, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Foster, and asked if they could see him. They made a quick departure, and before they got to Big Spring, another call came through the phone of his death. The Fosters were caught in Big Spring and held by state police.

Funeral arrangements are to be held in Las Vegas Friday at 10 a. m. in the First Methodist Church. Burial is to be in the Masonic cemetery there.

Survivors include the parents, a brother, Freddie, the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Foster and the great grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Reynolds.

A number of Sterling City people attended the funeral services.

The Allens had gone home from last week's visit here. They left on Monday and Ronnie got sick after getting back home. He had been visiting all his relatives and friends and had attended the Methodist Education Church School all last week.

He will be sorely missed by his many friends and relatives. His charming manner, his winning ways and his sunny disposition will always be remembered.

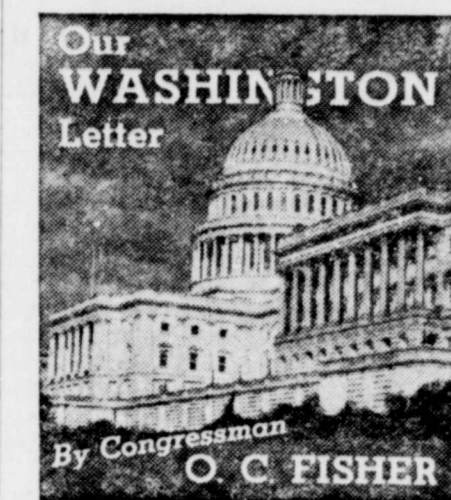
That gamma globulin is really expensive. Stuckwisch said if he bought it for use, it would cost over \$2 a cc. (whatever that is). Some clinics give it at \$4 a cc. And it takes a lot according to the weight of the person getting it. It can run as high as fifty dollars a person. It is made of blood plasma, said Stuckwisch. So it costs even more than blood. 8-BALL

Our two little ones got it in a Big Spring hospital Wednesday afternoon, and so much was given that it was given in both hips. Then Lee had to start in on penicillin shots. She has a very sore throat. Dr. Woodall said that under all the circumstances that she should be hospitalized. 8-BALL

Mass Gamma Globulin Shots Given Here



The guided missile—the human robot of the skies—is being advanced by the Army operating out of Fort Bliss in El Paso. At nearby White Sands Proving Grounds the Army Ordnance has already taken most of the bugs out of Nike, currently our last-ditch defense weapon against invading aircraft. Today a half dozen American cities are guarded by nearby Nike battalions.

This phase of our defense program has mushroomed in recent years to the point where the Army has asked clearance by the Armed Services Committees of the House and Senate for exclusive use of more than 600,000 additional acres of land in New Mexico, located parallel to the Texas border. The guided missile training program will be more than doubled within another year.

I went with a sub-committee last week to Ft. Bliss and Almagordo where public hearings were held on the proposed acquisition. Local ranchmen are naturally disturbed over the continued expansion of land holdings by the military, and they want to be sure that the fullest use is made of existing government ranges in the area before additional land is taken out of production.

Actually, of the land requested, 438,000 acres of it is public domain, already owned by Uncle Sam. The State of New Mexico owns 143,000 acres and 66,000 acres are privately owned.

We are in a guided missile era which began with the German V-2. We simply cannot afford to let the Russians get ahead of us in this field and hope to survive. It is freely predicted that within another 10 years an intercontinental missile may be developed which can be fired through the stratosphere for 5,000 miles at a speed of maybe 10,000 miles per hour. Imagine the kind of world we will live in if a button can be pressed in Washington and a half hour later a missile, with a hydrogen warhead, is exploded on Moscow! Or vice versa.

The idea, while yet fantastic, simply cannot be ruled out as a possibility. A few years ago Nike was a dream. Today it is a reality. Controlled from the ground, the Nike rocket is fired into the sky and by radar direction can trail the fastest jet invader and be made to explode within proper range. I have seen it done, with robot operated obsolete bombers as targets.

One hundred and six shots of gamma globulin were given to the Sterling City children Wednesday night at the hospital. Dr. Woodall of Malone-Hogan Clinic and Public Health Nurse Miss Barton supervised the mass "shooting". The reason for the gamma was that so many children presumably exposed to bulbar polio—the kind that killed little Ronnie Allen about noon Wednesday.

John M. Stuckwisch, administrator of the local hospital, called Dr. Woodall of Big Spring and they got in touch with State Health authorities in Midland and Odessa. The gamma was rushed here and a telephone calling committee was set up and all families affected were notified. Cards were made hurriedly and the Noratadata Club members helped to set-up at the hospital. Shots were begun about 8:45 p.m. and completed by midnight.

Dr. Woodall of the Malone-Hogan graciously arranged the deal and came down to supervise it. He took time and effort to get the deal started, after being called by John Stuckwisch.

A Dr. Hale, State Health Officer for this district, came down Thursday and conferred with Stuckwisch.

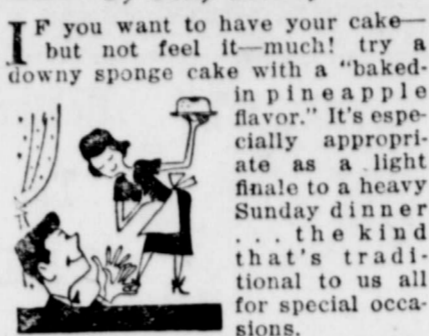
The young people of the church will meet at 7:30 p.m.

Take A Light Bow

Pineapple Sponge Cake
2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour; 4 eggs; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 1 cup hot pineapple juice, or syrup drained from canned pineapple; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Sift flour once, measure, and sift again. Beat eggs and salt together until very thick and light colored—about 5 to 7 minutes. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add 1 1/2 cups of the flour, alternately with the hot pineapple juice, beating well after each addition. Combine remaining flour and baking powder and sift over batter; beat thoroughly. Add vanilla; blend.

Turn batter into ungreased 9-inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Remove from oven, invert pan, and let stand 1 hour, or until cake is cool.

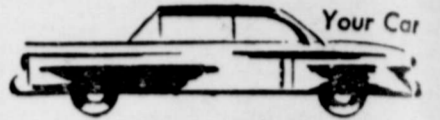

Just back from visiting with my daughter's family—and playing Grandpop to two of the cutest kids you ever saw. While there I picked up a couple of new ideas on child raising:

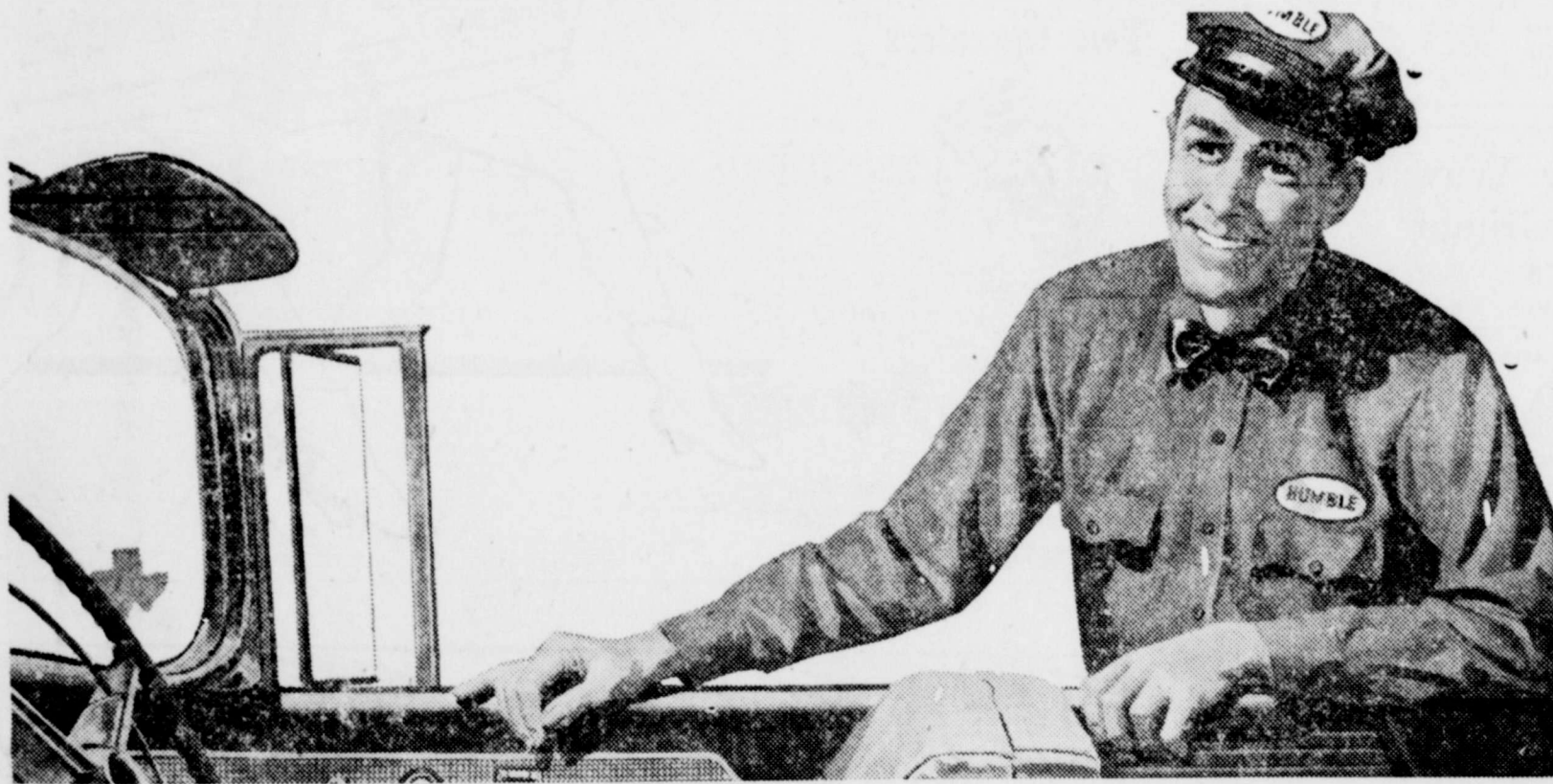
If your child's learning to use a pen, provide an old fountain pen—filled with bluing. Looks and writes like ink, but won't stain clothes or furniture.

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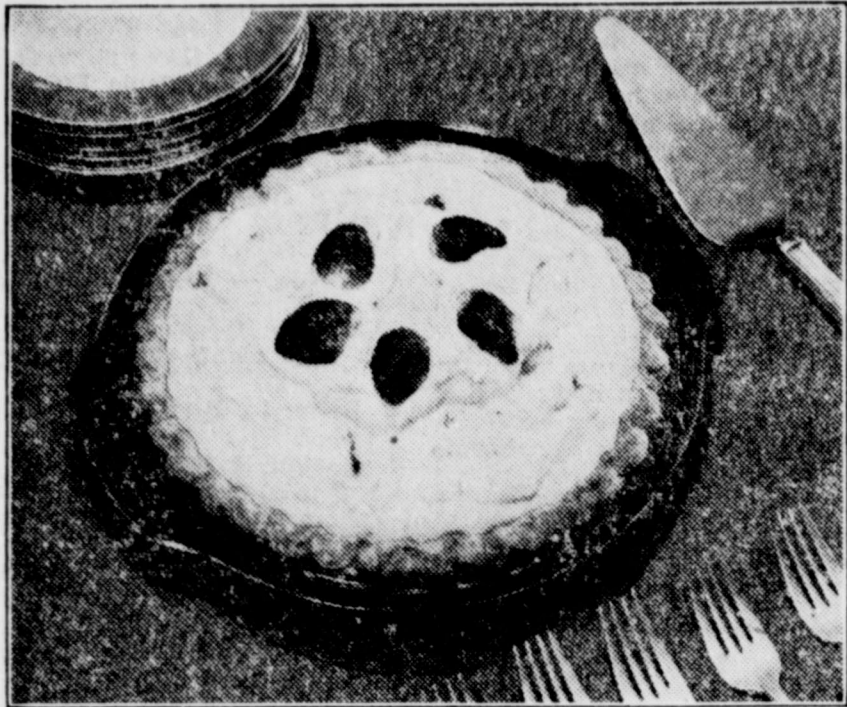

New No-Roll Pastry

Here is an amazing new quick and easy method for preparing a pastry that is mixed in the pan and shaped in the pan. The pie crust is unusually rich and tender and keeps its perfect shape.

Mazola No-Roll Pastry Shell
(Single 8 or 9-inch Crust)
1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
1½ teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
½ cup salad oil
2 tablespoons cold milk

Sift dry ingredients into pie pan. Combine salad oil and milk in measuring cup. Whip with fork and pour all at once over flour mixture. Mix with fork until flour is completely dampened. Press evenly and firmly with fingers to line bottom of pan; then press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Be sure dough is pressed to uniform thickness. To flute, pinch dough lightly with fingers. Do not use a high fluted edge.

For Baked Shell: Prick entire surface; bake in hot oven (425° F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Cool; fill as desired.

For Unbaked Shell: Fill as desired and bake in hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes, then reduce to mod-

erate (350° F.) and bake until filling tests done.

Always prepare filling before making pastry.

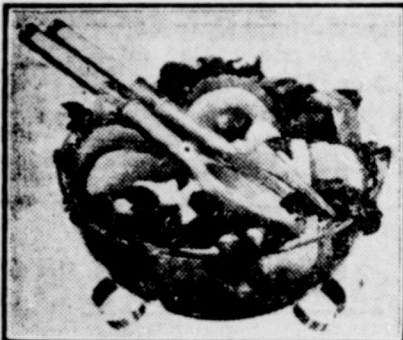
Use a baked 9-inch No-Roll Pastry Shell in preparing this delicious pie.

Strawberry Pie

1 envelope gelatin
4 tablespoons cold water
2 egg yolks
¾ cup light corn syrup
1 cup crushed strawberries
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 egg whites
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
¾ cup heavy cream, whipped

Soften gelatin in cold water. Beat egg yolks slightly in top of double boiler. Add corn syrup. Cook over boiling water, about 5 minutes, stirring constantly, until mixture is slightly thickened. Add gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly. Combine strawberries and lemon juice and add to gelatin mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg whites and salt until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in sugar. Fold in strawberry mixture; then lightly fold in whipped cream. Pile into baked pie shell. Chill thoroughly.

Dressings For Salads

Spring and summer brings us a wide variety of fresh fruit to use in attractive salad combinations. And here are two excellent dressing recipes to serve with your fruit salads.

Celery Seed Dressing
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon celery seed
½ cup Karo Syrup, Red Label
¼ to ½ cup vinegar
1 cup salad oil
1 tablespoon grated onion

Place all ingredients in a small bowl. Beat with rotary beater until well blended and thickened. Place in covered container. Chill several hours. Shake before serving. Makes about 1½ cups.

Banana Cream Dressing
½ cup dark corn syrup
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 bananas, sliced

Add corn syrup gradually to whipped cream, stirring gently until well blended. Just before serving, sprinkle lemon juice over sliced bananas. Fold into whipped cream, corn syrup mixture. Serve as a salad dressing for fruit gelatin or fresh fruit salads. Makes about 3 cups.

Combine pudding mix and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil and is slightly thickened. (Mixture will continue to thicken as it cools.) Remove from heat. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes; stir once or twice just to mix. Chill. Then fold in almonds. Spoon into sherbet glasses or serving bowl. Makes 4 servings.

Nibble While You Play

DON'T make your guests wait till table-time! Put out heaped-up platters of delicious Macaroni Wafers so they can nibble while playing the "zany" games indigenous to the "Mad Hatter" party you're giving at your house!

Macaroni Wafers
¼ cup butter; ½ cup firmly packed brown sugar; ½ cup granulated sugar; 1 egg, well beaten; ½ cup finely chopped walnuts; 4 cups malted whole wheat flakes; ¼ cup shredded coconut.

Cream butter. Add sugars gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Add remaining ingredients and stir until thoroughly mixed. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 10 minutes, or until golden brown. Allow cookies to cool slightly. Then place baking sheet over low heat and remove cookies with spatula. Makes about 5½ dozen cookies.

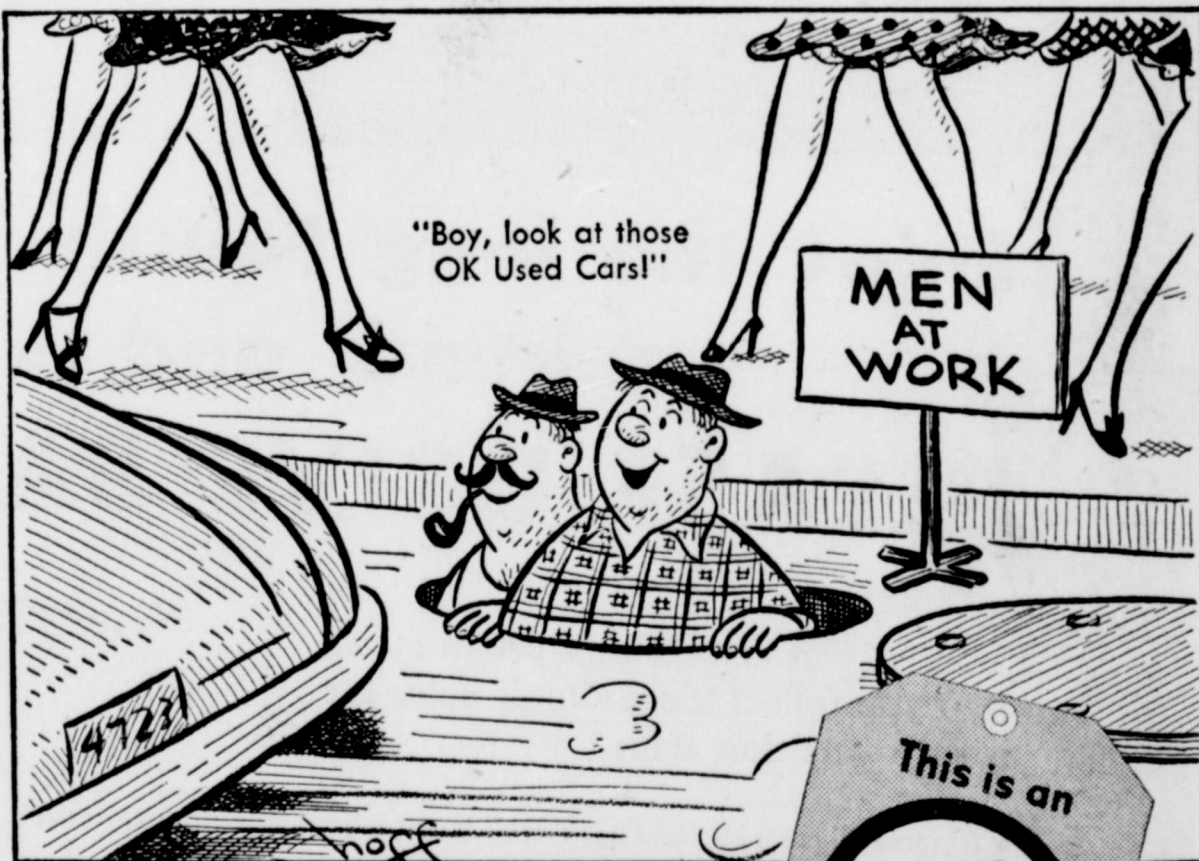

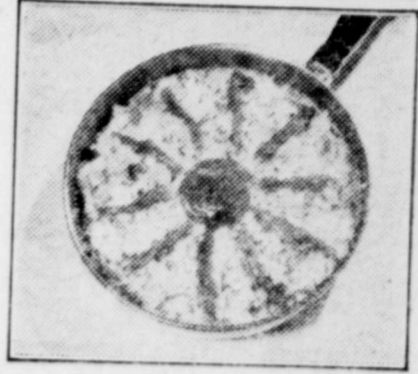

Sunny Pimiento Eggs Set The Mood

You can't help but start the new day with a cheerful disposition when a skillet of Sunny Pimiento Eggs is sizzling away on the stove. The aroma is mighty tantalizing and the appearance pretty, but just wait until you taste that first delicious forkful! Who ever thought those extra seasonings—headed by the flavorful pimiento—could work such wonders with scrambled eggs.

To make it a real Good Morning with a sunny mood for certain, garnish the scrambled eggs with a round, fat pimiento sun radiating bright red pimiento rays. It's enough to perk up all the sleepyheads and bring a smile to the before-breakfast scowler.

Sunny Pimiento Eggs

- 6 eggs, beaten
- 1 can or jar (4 oz.) whole pimientos
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Pimientos for garnish
Heat the butter or margarine in a skillet. Chop half a can of pimientos into small pieces and add them to the beaten eggs, along with the salt, pepper, celery salt, and Worcestershire sauce. Pour into the skillet and cook over slow heat, stirring only enough to let the eggs fry evenly. Serve in the pan, garnished with a round of pimiento in the center and pimiento strips radiating from it—to simulate the sun. An additional can or jar of pimientos will be needed to complete this sunny decoration. The eggs will make four servings.

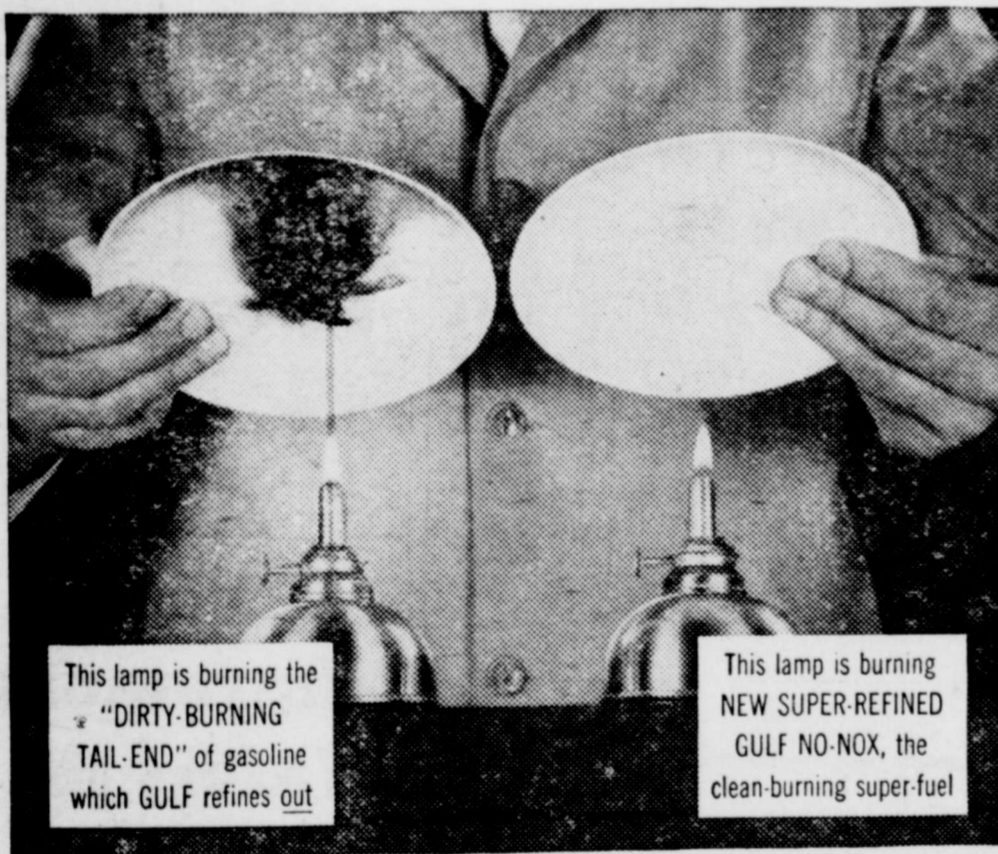

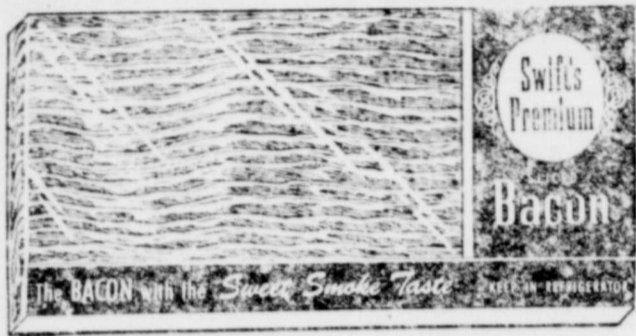
