

One hundred and six shots of gamma globulin were given to the Sterling City children Wednesday night at the hospital. Dr. Woodall of Malone-Hogan Clinic and Public Health Nurse Miss Barton supervised the mass "shooting". The reason for the gamma was that so many children presumably exposed to bulbar polio-the kind that killed little Ronnie Allen about noon Wedensday.

John M. Stuckwish, administrator of the local hospital, called Dr. Woodall of Big Spring and they got in touch with State Health authorities in Midland and Odessa. The gamma was rushed here and a telephone calling committe was set up and all families affected were notified. Cards were made hurriedly and the Noratadata Club members helped th eset-up at the hospital. Shots were begun about 8:45 p.m. and completed by mid-

Dr. Woodall of the Malone-Hogan graciously arranged the deal and came down to supervise it. He took time and effort to get the deal started, after being called by John Stuckwish.



F you want to have your cake—but not feel it—much! try a downy sponge cake with a "bakedin pineapple flavor." It's espe-



cially approprifinale to a heavy Sunday dinner the kind that's traditional to us all for special occa-

Pineapple Sponge Cake 2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour; 4 eggs; 4 teaspoon salt; 11/2 cups sugar; 1 cup hot pineapple juice, or syrup drained from canned pineapple; 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1 teaspoon

Sift flour once, measure, and sift again. Beat eggs and salt together until very thick and light coloredabout 5 to 7 minutes. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add 11/2 cups of the flour, alternately with the hot pineapple juice, beating well after each addition. Combine remaining flour and baking powder and sift over batter; beat thoroughly. Add vanilla; blend.

Turn batter into ungreased 9-inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Remove from oven, invert pan, and let stand 1 hour, or until cake is



If You Can't Lick 'em-Join 'em


Just back from visiting with my daughter's family-and playing Grandpop to two of the curest kids you ever saw. While there I picked up a couple of new ideas on child raising:

In addition to that his fleeces won trophies for the "Best Ram Fleece of the Show" and "Most Valuable Fleece from the Manufacturer's Viewpoint."

David Durham recently purchased a registered Rambouillet Ram for his flock from Ed Ratliff of Bronte. The ram, lamb was put in with his ewes for November lambs. David, Bitsy and Drew are building up a very nice flock of ewes.

Mineral requirements for beef cattle can be met by using salt and bone meal. These two minerals will geenrally supply the needed elements for animal nutrition. Bone meal and salt can either be fed free choice or mixed in a 2 to 1 ratio (two parts hone meal to one part salt). Steamed bone meal is preferred. Free choice might possibly give a little more efficient use of the mineral as cattle need more phosphorus at different times of the year than at others. If as much as two pounds of cottonseed cake cake is fed ,cattle do not need but very little if any bone







Celery Seed Dressing



Sunny Pimiento Eggs

6 eggs, beaten

1 can or jar (4 oz.) whole pimientos

3 tablespoons butter or margarine

¼ teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper 1/8 teaspoon celery salt 1 tablespoon Worcestershire

Pimientos for garnish

Heat the butter or margarine in a skillet. Chop half a can of pimientos into small pieces and add them to the beaten eggs, along with the salt, pepper, celery salt, and Worcestershire sauce. Pour into the skillet and cook over slow heat, stirring only enough to let the eggs fry evenly. Serve in the pan, garnished with a round of pimiento in the center and pimiento strips radiating from it-to simulate the sun. An additional can or jar of pimientos will be needed to complete this sunny decoration. The eggs will make four servings.






