State Comptroller Bob Bullock late last week, sent check totaling \$57.4 million in local tax payments to the 997 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Sales Tax Rebate Check

Received For October

"The border region economy is looking better than it has in three years, Local sales tax collections in the border area are up 13.2 percent in 1984 compared to last year, and we're hoping this improvement will continue," Bullock said. This month's checks are the

first to reflect receipts from taxes on new goods and services collected for the first time beginning October 2, Bullock added.

Muleshoe's check was in the amount of \$13,013.79, down from the \$18,438.04 at the same time last year. However, Muleshoe is still running .85 percent ahead of receipts last year at \$202,625.15, compared to the figure of \$200,959.47 for the same time a year ago.

At Morton, the check was up for October, 1984. On the same date last year, Morton received a check for \$2,894.37, compared to the \$3,053.20 for the same time this year. Their receipts for the year are up 6.52 percent for the year with total payments this year to date in the amount of \$48,497.35, as compared to the payments for the same period of time last year of \$45,527.66.

Littlefield shows an increase of 6.00 percent for the year with total tax receipts for the year of \$262,233.49, compared to payments of \$247,387.26 for the same period last year. Their October, 1903 payment was \$21,247.96, down to the \$15.846.07 for the same period this year.

This month, Friona is showing the largest percentage of increase for the year in tax rebates at 9.30 percent increase. This is reflected by their payments to date this year

being at \$101,592.97, compared to the \$92,944.78 for the same period last year. Their payment for October was \$7,325.53, and was \$8,725.35 for the same time last year.

Houston received the largest check--\$10 million--pushing payments for the year up 4.9 percent to \$144.9 million. Dallas' check for \$7.1 million brought its total to \$99.2 million, a 15.8 percent increase over 1983.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.2 million brought total 1984 payments to \$49.4 million, up 16 percent for the year. Austin received \$2.8 million for a \$37.2 million 1984 total and a 30

percent increase. Fort Worth's check was \$2.1 million, bringing total payments to \$30.5 million, up 15 percent. El Paso received \$1.3 million for a total of \$18.2 million, 14.7 percent over last year.



### Cocoa Vs. Carob

Perhaps because of advertising, some consumers have the false perception that carob is nutritionally superior to cocoa, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"When cocoa and carob are compared, cocoa is shown to have more nutrients carob," says Mary K. Sweeten. Tests by the United States Department of Agriculture indicate that cocoa has more protein, calcium, phosphorous, iron, potassium, vitamin A, riboflavin and niacin than does

carob powder, she explains. Cocoa powder does contain more fat than carob, says Sweeten, which is one reason why some consumers select it.

However, the commercially manufactured carob products often rival those containing cocoa since vegetable fats such as palm kernel oil and coconut oil are added to make solid carob products. Both of these oils are more highly saturated than cocoa butter, she says.

Food products containing carob are often advertised as "natural foods," Sweeten observes. While some consumers may assume that "natural" foods are nutritionally superior to regular foods, this is often not the case, says the nutri-

tionist. Since there is no legal definition for the term "natural," Sweeten advises consumers to carefully read the food product labels before buying the food product.

It is sponsored by Wayland's Lifelong Learning Center and Graduate Program, in cooperation with the U.S.-China Educational Exchange Council and China Inc. of San Sightseeing, Francisco.

Offering either continuing education credit or graduate credit in education, the trip will include lectures, discussions and field trips conducted in English by faculty members of educational institutions China.

The trip will feature visits into six universities in China, including Hong Kong and Shanghai, and stops at such other places as the Cred Wall, the Forbidden City, and Qin Tom, where the recent excavation of 6,000 terra cotta soldiers shook the world of archeology.

The revision of the trip schedule has resulted in departure from Amarillo and additional sightseeing days in China and Honolulu, Hawaii.

"With 5,000 years of history and a territory as large as the United States, China has much to offer the foreign visitor -- her scenic beauty, millennia of culture, exquisite art, grandeur of archeological excavation, a uniquely different lifestyle, and much more," said Henderson,

who is the tour director. Cost of the trip is \$3,000 for lifelong learning credit and \$3,300 for graduate credit. The package includes round-trip airfare from Amarillo and all other transportation throughout the tour; all accommodations in

China; three meals a day in Cinda and two in Hong Kong; all sightseeing, field trips, cultural programs, academic studies, and other lessons; and visa fee, China study materials, and travel kit.

Transportation furnished from the Wayland campus to Amarillo on June 28.

Because of the revision in the travel schedule, the deadline for application and trip deposit has been extended to January 15, 1985. A \$250 deposit is due at that time, and partial refunds are available upon cancellation through June 10.





and on patios increased. According to the poll, more than 90 million Americans are actively involved in home or community fruit and vegetable gardening, Tanksley points out.

Among trends that have emerged since the annual

survey started in 1971 are these: the incidence vegetable gardening has averaged 44 percent annually; the Midwest is the nation's number one gardening region; gardening is more popular in rural areas than in small towns, suburbs or cities; the tomato is the most popular vegetable in home gardens; and gardening for food is more popular among married households and people 50 years of age or older.

In Texas, gardening is a year-round activity due to the milder climate, notes Tanksley. Spring and fall gardens can be equally productive and can provide high quality, nutritious vegetables.

For information on vegetable, fruit and nut varieties that are adapted to Bailey County, contact the county extension office, concluded Tanksley.

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
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# Bowl Games Are Featuring Nations' Top Football Teams



Undefeated Brigham Young, #4, not only played no one in the top twenty, but played only four teams with winning seasons. Fifteen years ago, our problems with Penn State were similar. The polls placed the Nittany Lions at or near the top, but because of their laid-back schedules, we rated them considerably lower. Since then. Penn State has beefed up its schedule and the Lions have gained much more credibility. We would hope that BYU would do the same.



November 28-Applications from high school seniors are being accepted by Angelo State University for approximatley 400 Carr Academic Scholarships for 1985-86 ranging in value from \$1,000 to \$3,500.

Supported by a growing multi-million dollar trust established in 1978 by Mr. Robert G. Carr of San Angelo, the undergraduate scholarships may be renewed annually by the University and can be worth from \$4,000 to \$14,000 during a four-year course of undergraduate study.

During the current year, approximately 900 students are attending Angelo State University on Carr Academic Scholarships.

The priority deadline for submitting applications and all supporting materials for 1985-86 is March 1, 1985, although completed applications from outstanding students may be considered up until July 1, 1985, to the extent that funds are available.

Applicants who are high school seniors must normally have a high school average of 90 or above, rank in the top 10 percent of their class, and present a composite score of 21 or more on the ACT or a combined math and verbal score

of 900 or more on the SAT.

Priority will be given to deserving individuals of high academic ability with financial need.
