#### Cocoa Vs. Carob

Perhaps because of advertising, some consumers have the false perception that carob is nutritionally superior to cocoa, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"When cocoa and carob are compared, cocoa is shown to have more nutrients than carob," says Mary K. Sweeten. Tests by the United States Department of Agriculture indicate that cocoa has more protein, calcium, phosphorus, iron, potassium, vitamin A, riboflavin and niacin than does carob powder, she explains.

Cocoa powder does contain more fat than carob, says Sweeten, which is one reason why some consumers select it.

However, the commercially manufactured carob products often rival those containing cocoa since vegetable fats such as palm kernel oil and coconut oil are added to make solid carob products. Both of these oils are more highly saturated than cocoa butter, she says.

Food products containing carob are often advertised as "natural foods," Sweeten observes. While some consumers may assume that "natural" foods are nutritionally superior to regular foods, this is often not the case, says the nutritionist.

Since there is no legal definition for the term "natural," Sweeten advises consumers to carefully read the food product labels before buying the food product.

## WBU's First China Travel Study Program Slated

Reservations are still being accepted for Wayland Baptist University's first China Travel

Study Program, slated for next summer, according to Dr. Billie Henderson, dean of lifelong learning.

Open to all interested persons, the trip is scheduled for June 28 to Aug. 1, 1985, a revision from the previously-announced dates. It is sponsored by Wayland's Lifelong Learning Center and Graduate Program, in cooperation with the U.S.-China Educational Exchange Council and China Sightseeing, Inc. of San Francisco.

Offering either continuing education credit or graduate credit in education, the trip will include lectures, discussions and field trips conducted in English by faculty members of educational institutions in China.

The trip will feature visits into six universities in China, including Hong Kong and Shanghai, and stops at such other places as the Cred Wall, the Forbidden City, and Qin Tom, where the recent excavation of 6,000 terra cotta soldiers shook the world of archeology.

The revision of the trip schedule has resulted in departure from Amarillo and additional sightseeing days in China and Honolulu, Hawaii.

"With 5,000 years of history and a territory as large as the

United States, China has much to offer the foreign visitor -- her scenic beauty, millennia of culture, exquisite art, grandeur of archeological excavation, a uniquely different lifestyle, and much more," said Henderson, who is the tour director.

Cost of the trip is \$3,000 for lifelong learning credit and \$3,300 for graduate credit. The package includes round-trip airfare from Amarillo and all other transportation throughout the tour; all accommodations in China; three meals a day in Cinda and two in Hong Kong; all sightseeing, field trips, cultural programs, academic studies, and other lessons; and

visa fee, China study materials, and travel kit.

Transportation will be furnished from the Wayland campus to Amarillo on June 28.

Because of the revision in the travel schedule, the deadline for application and trip deposit has been extended to January 15, 1985. A \$250 deposit is due at that time, and partial refunds are available upon cancellation through June 10.

Persons interested in the trip should contact Henderson or Dr. Harold Temple, dean of the graduate program, at (806) 296-5521 for a brochure and application form. The trip is reserved for a maximum of 30 persons.

## Nations' Gardeners Continue To 'Grow'

Eight out of every 10 American households were involved in some form of indoor or outdoor gardening during 1984 and produced some \$13 billion worth of food, according to Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Gardening ranks as the number one outdoor leisure activity of U.S. households again this year, he said. Most

popular gardening activities were flower gardening, 47 percent of all households; vegetable gardening, 40 percent; indoor houseplants, 46 percent; and lawns, 63 percent.

That information is based on the latest nationwide poll by Gardens for All, a national gardening association, points out Tanksley.

Although the poll showed a slight decline in backyard and community gardens from 1983, the number of households growing a small amount of vegetables and fruits in containers and border plantings and on patios increased.

According to the poll, more than 90 million Americans are actively involved in home or community fruit and vegetable gardening, Tanksley points out.

Among trends that have emerged since the annual

survey started in 1971 are these: the incidence of vegetable gardening has averaged 44 percent annually; the Midwest is the nation's number one gardening region; gardening is more popular in rural areas than in small towns, suburbs or cities; the tomato is the most popular vegetable in home gardens; and gardening for food is more popular among married households and people 50 years of age or older.

In Texas, gardening is a year-round activity due to the milder climate, notes Tanksley. Spring and fall gardens can be equally productive and can provide high quality, nutritious vegetables.

For information on vegetable, fruit and nut varieties that are adapted to Bailey County, contact the county extension office, concluded Tanksley.

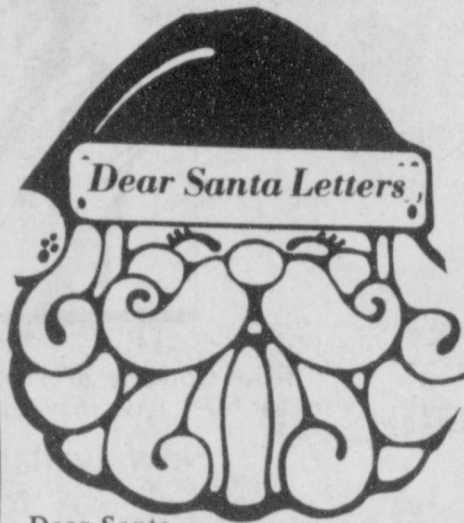
They also reviewed the deposit pledges from First National Bank; reviewed the county treasurer's report and made a budget amendment.

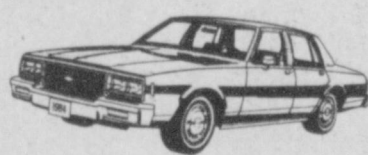

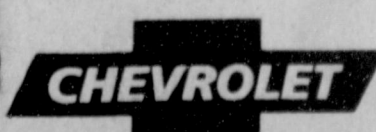

# Bowl Games Are Featuring Nations' Top Football Teams

In the California Bowl it will be Toledo defense vs Nevada-Las Vegas offense. Toledo allowing 9.9 points per game, UNLV scoring 30 points per game. The VPI-Air Force match-up in the Independence Bowl is so close, if a reserve linebacker caught a cold, we'd be tempted to switch our vote. Until a cadet sneezes, Air Force. Undeclared Brigham Young has everything to lose and nothing to win - except the football game-in its Holiday Bowl contest with 6-5 Michigan. A BYU loss will convince the skeptics they were right all the time.

The Florida Citrus Bowl offers the first bowl game between two ranked teams, Florida State, #11, and Georgia, #17. Earlier, the Bulldogs were buried by Florida 27-0 while State lost its season finale to Florida, 27-17. The new Cherry Bowl has a first-ever bowl team in Army, a surprise team in '84, while Michigan State, along with Michigan, has the poorest season record of any bowl team. But don't let that fool you. Based on pre-season expectations, both Iowa and Texas, Freedom Bowl opponents, had very disappointing seasons. An Iowa victory in this one, however, will depend on a healthy quarterback.

The Liberty Bowl game between Arkansas and Auburn should be as close as the two comparative scores: both almost identical defeats from Texas

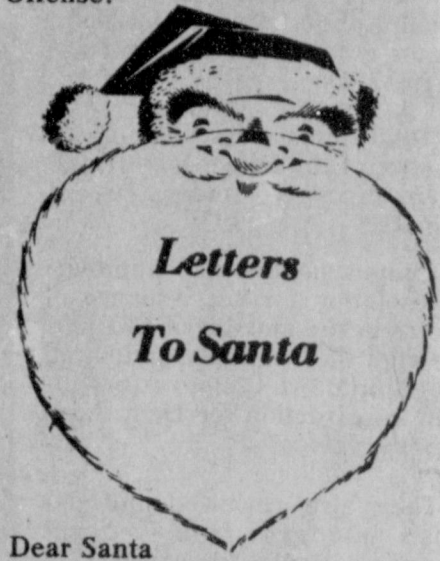
while the Razorbacks tied Mississippi. The Tigers, however, beat ol' Miss by four. South Carolina's loss to Navy probably prevented the Gamecocks from winning the national championship, but meeting Oklahoma State in the Gator Bowl will be no small challenge. Defense could win it for the Cowboys. No common opponents for Aloha Bowl teams, #10 SMU, #16, Notre Dame. Irish won last four games in 7-4 season, the Mustangs finished 9-2 in a tie for first in the Southwest Conference. The Irish and Gerry Faust just might come through.

Maryland's ACC champions are ranked 12th, and their Sun Bowl opponent Tennessee is tied for 20th. Vanderbilt beat Maryland, lost to the Vols. Nevertheless, Maryland. There's another game-this one in the Hall of Fame Bowl-where a broken fingernail could make us change our pick. Wisconsin, un-ranked, vs Kentucky, #19, the Wildcats winning three of their final four. Peach Bowl perpetrators are two conference runners-up, Virginia in the ACC, Purdue in the Big Ten, and schedule-toughness might have been given more consideration in picking this one.

West Virginia won 7 of their opening 8 games, then folded in the final three, while TCU continued to surprise all season. The Bluebonnet Bowl could hold another surprise. 8th-ranked Doug Flutie-whoops, Boston College-will try his passing

artistry vs Houston in the Cotton Bowl. A difficult challenge for Houston. Last year's national champion, Miami, #15, and #18, UCLA, are featured in the Fiesta Bowl, the Hurricanes losing four games in a tough schedule. Big difference: Miami's 365 points vs UCLA's 255.

The Big Ten has won just twice in 15 years in the Rose Bowl where 5th-ranked Ohio State meets #20 Southern Cal. In the past, the safe pick has been the Pac-10 team, but not this year. Nebraska's 359 point offense vs LSU's 305 point total could make for offensive show in the Sugar Bowl, but instead they may shut each other down. The Tigers gave up 100 more points than the Cornhuskers. The Orange Bowl pulls more rank than any of the 18 bowls as Oklahoma, #2, tries to hold its lofty position vs #6, Washington, 10-1 on the season. It's possible that the Husky defense just might outscore the Sooner Offense!

### HIGHLIGHTS

Years ago when we rated the top twenty colleges as a regular feature of our weekly forecast, we stated that our ratings are based on power quotients which put almost as much emphasis on the strength of each team's schedule as they do on its won-lost record. Florida, our #1 team, played SIX teams that were ranked in every poll. Oklahoma, #2, played THREE teams in everyone's top twenty. Nebraska, #3, also played three. Undeclared Brigham Young, #4, not only played no one in the top twenty, but played only four teams with winning seasons. Fifteen years ago, our problems with Penn State were similar. The polls placed the Nittany Lions at or near the top, but because of their laid-back schedules, we rated them considerably lower. Since then, Penn State has beefed up its schedule and the Lions have gained much more credibility. We would hope that BYU would do the same.

The Harmon system finished 1984 with a forecasting percentage of .744. We forecast the results of 2,070 games, 40 ending in ties. Of the remaining 2,030, there were 1,510 winners and 520 losers.

The conference ratings listed below are based on each league's power quotient average which includes the ratings of each team from top to bottom in every conference. Of the 57 conferences, here are the twenty strongest in the nation:
