A new program to be instituted at the hospital, according to Macklin, will be 'The Intercept Program,' which is treatment for alcoholism.

'An alcoholic only needs help when he is drunk," reminded Macklin. "We will be instituting a medically orientated inpatient program, as well as an outpatient treatment program.'

He said alcoholics will be treated for some 14 days as an inpatient in the hospital, with 3-4 days being used for de-toxification, then the patient will be treated by the medical director, counselors and psychologists.

'Marketing the program will be geared for people in a crisis situation, said Macklin, "we will be doing extensive radio and television advertising, all geared toward the crisis situation.

"Care starts when the alcoholic patient enters the Intercept Program which is provided by a licensed acute care hospital, where all necessary services are readily available," he continued. "Recognizing that the disease of alcoho-' lism can be caused or aggravated by a multitude of sociological, phsiological or psychological factors, noting is overlooked in the initial screen-

ing process. "The physician, psychologist, counselor and nursing staff become intrinsically involved in identifying each problematic aspect of the alcoholic's profile and they work independently and together to formulate a plan for successful treatment.'

More information will be released on the planned program in future issues of The Journals.

### Comment **On Sports** By Pete Fritchie

WASHINGTON, D.C.--In Major League baseball's toughest division, the East in the American League, both the Baltimore Orioles and New York Yankees have improved their roster. Toronto, which was the

world champion Detroit Tigers' nearest nemesis, is certain to be strong again and the Blue Jays might also improve. But the Tigers have picked up a new starting pitcher from the New York Mets.

That seems to underscore what's considered the most important strength on contending clubs--pitching. The Yankees, however, have added several intereesting players, including manager Yogi Berra's son. Richy Henderson adds speed and punch, will play center field.

The Tigers are strong down the center and needed only more starting pitching. So it could be, again this year, a case of four strong teams in the American East--and maybe five, if Boston is in it. (Manager Ralph Houk has departed Boston.)

The 1985 season, however, isn't likely to be a runaway race like that of 1984. The competition this year knows how good the Tigers are, and competing teams like the O's and Yanks have improved.
