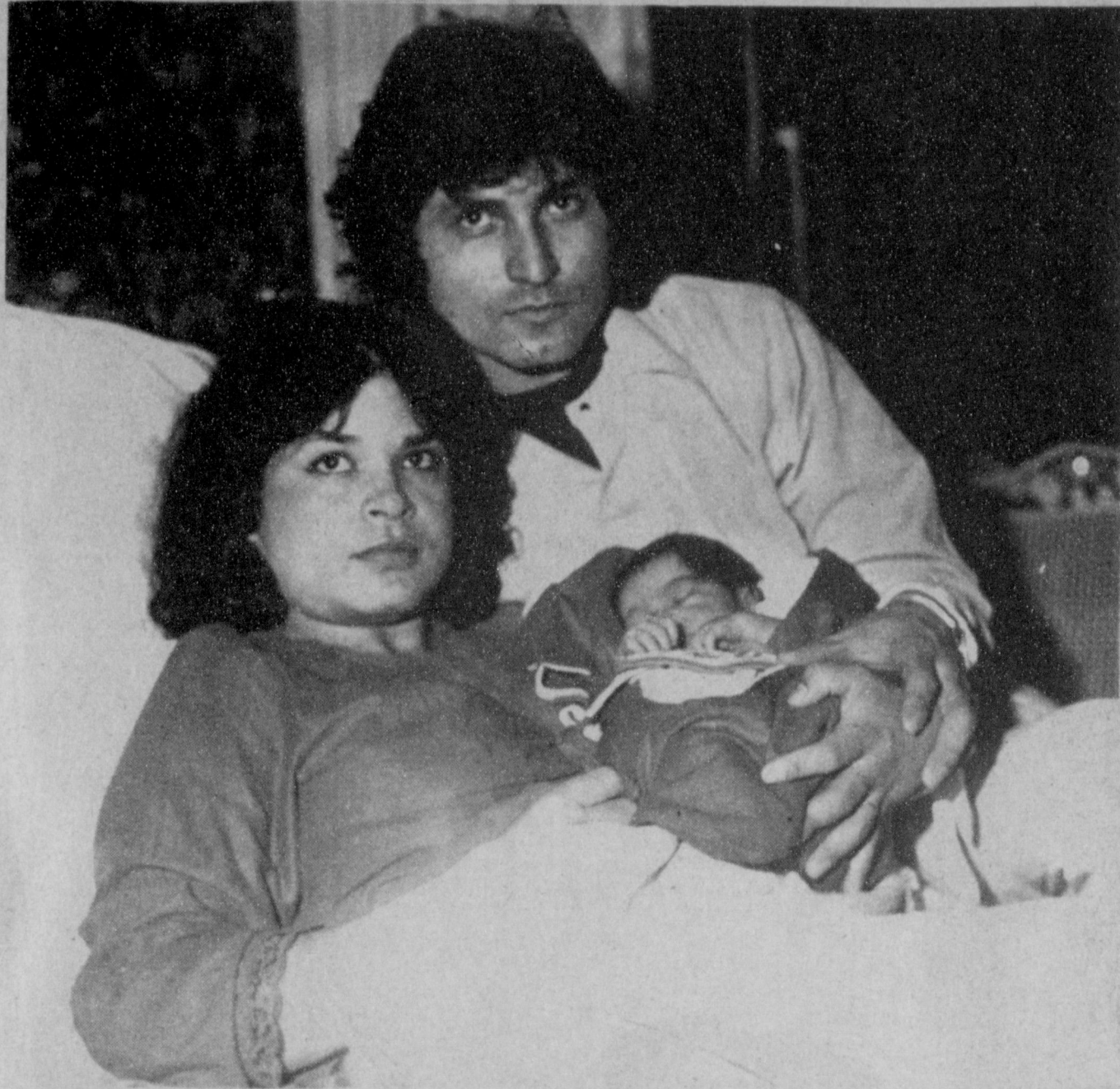

Crystal Vega finally made it into the world, shortly after her mother, Maria, arrived at West Plains Medical Center on Sunday, January 6, and was born at 11:40 a.m.

When she was born, some 28 minutes after her mother arrived at the local hospital, she became the first baby born in Bailey County for 1985, and the recipient of several gifts.

At the time of her arrival, Crystal weighed in at six pounds even and the tiny third child for the Vegas has been more preoccupied with sleeping than taking note of her surroundings.

When Mr. and Mrs. Jose Carlos Vega took their tiny daughter home, she was greeted by her sister, Iris Dinorah, age seven; and her brother, Jose Carlos Vega, Jr., age five.

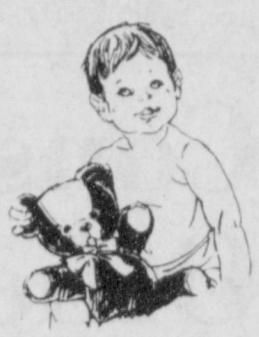
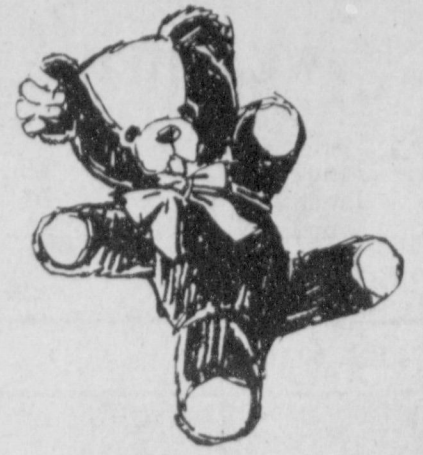

Creative Woman

Information on aluminum foil in the microwave oven, safety with major home appliances, and the infra red microwave will be presented on "The Creative Woman" show on January 15 and 19.

Cathy McCreery, home economist with the Reynolds Metals Co. from Dallas, Texas will explain and show how to use aluminum foil in the microwave oven. She will eliminate some of the old myths about the use of foil in the microwave oven. It can be used for shielding, for defrosting and even in cooking.

Another guest will demonstrate a new microwave oven on the market that uses an infra red sensor with microprocessor. Debra Block is with Toshiba, Inc. from Wayne, New Jersey and she will explain some of the new features and demonstrate cooking in this technologically advanced microwave oven.

Joy Schrage, spokesperson for the Whirlpool Corporation is from Benton Harbor, Michigan and she will discuss safety with major home appliances. Mrs. Schrage works with the Appliance Information Service which helps consumers with the safety aspects of their electrical appliances.

Beef in a bag and wedding veils and headpieces will be the topics on the show on January 17. Merle Ellis is the spokesman for the Beef Industry and he will explain what beef in a bag is, and how it can be used to stretch the beef dollar. Bulk purchase savings will usually range from twenty to fifty cents per pound.

Karen Dillon, sewing instructor for Palmer/Pletsch Associates is also the author of a book called "Sew a Beautiful Wedding." She feels a lot of money can be saved by making the wedding veil and headpieces--even if the wedding gown is purchased. These savings can be over one hundred dollars. Ms. Dillon will talk about the different types of veiling fabrics

available, explain the most common lengths for the veils and show examples of the three basic styles. By making the wedding veil and headpiece, it can be one-of-a-kind and really provide the finishing touch to the bridal outfit.

"The Creative Woman" is produced by Sheryl Borden. The show airs on KENW-TV at 12 noon on Tuesday and Thursday and at 2:00 pm on Saturday. (All times are Mountain Standard). The show is also carried on KRWG-TV in Las Cruces and by KNME-TV in Albuquerque, as well as on over 70 PBS stations throughout the country. 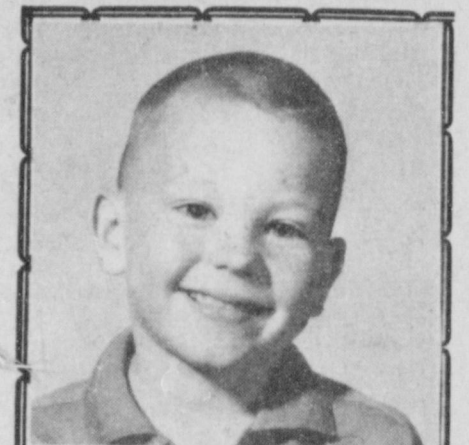
Texas Teacher's 'Write To Publish' Workshop Set

A new program to be instituted at the hospital, according to Macklin, will be 'The Intercept Program,' which is treatment for alcoholism.

"An alcoholic only needs help when he is drunk," reminded Macklin. "We will be instituting a medically orientated inpatient program, as well as an outpatient treatment program."

He said alcoholics will be treated for some 14 days as an inpatient in the hospital, with 3-4 days being used for de-toxification, then the patient will be treated by the medical director, counselors and psychologists.

"Marketing the program will be geared for people in a crisis situation, said Macklin, "we will be doing extensive radio and television advertising, all geared toward the crisis situation."

"Care starts when the alcoholic patient enters the Intercept Program which is provided by a licensed acute care hospital, where all necessary services are readily available," he continued. "Recognizing that the disease of alcoholism can be caused or aggravated by a multitude of sociological, physiological or psychological factors, noting is overlooked in the initial screening process.

"The physician, psychologist, counselor and nursing staff become intrinsically involved in identifying each problematic aspect of the alcoholic's profile and they work independently and together to formulate a plan for successful treatment."

More information will be released on the planned program in future issues of The Journals.

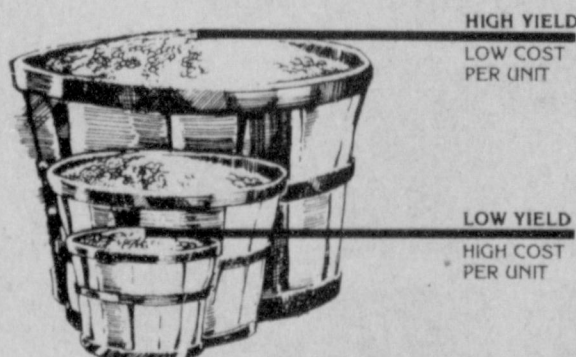

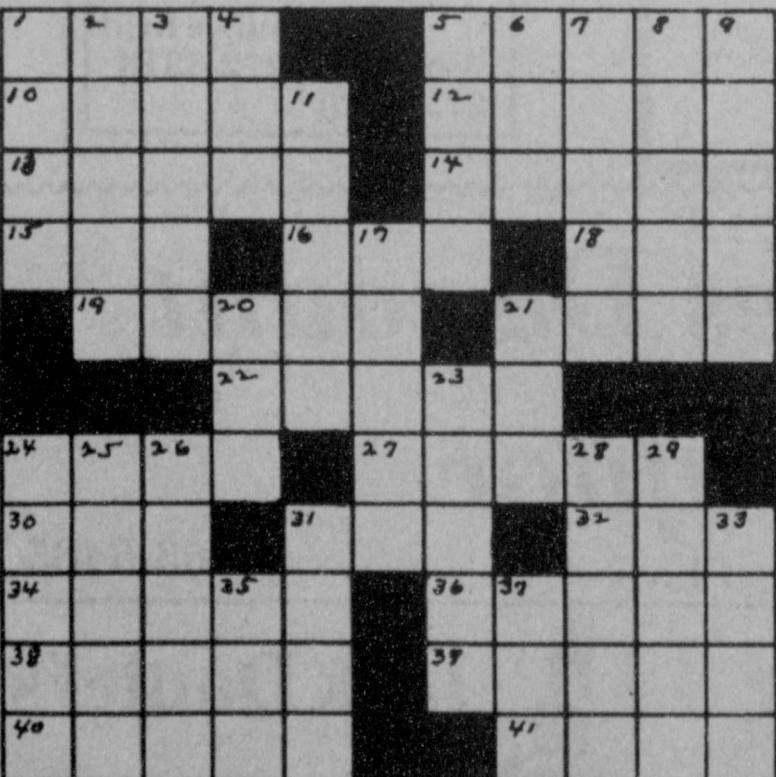
