Se ator Tillman's Case. We doubt if it is possible for any fair-minded man to read the President's accusations of Senator Tillman, and Senator Tillman's answer, without sympathy with the Senator and pity for the President.

The very chronology of the case makes for Senator Till man's vindication. While lec turing in the State of Washington in October, 1907, he learned that a real estate firm was filing claims for clients upon Oregon lands which had sbeen forfeited by a land-grant company that ostensibly owned his desire to make claims, and aathorized a resident of the region to act as his agent for placing claims, for eight quarter sections for members of his
family, to cost them, if finally secured, about $\$ 5,000$, which the government would get.
His lawful right to do this was beyond question. The fact that we was a Senator did not effect the transaction. He and his fasaily were citizens
with the same rights as other citizens under our land laws.

But those circumstances brought to Senator Tillman's of public land are held by landgrant corporations, which, like their titles. Consequently he did what it was his duty to do,
He brought the whole matter He brought the whole matter
to the ney General and caused the enactment by Congress of a joint resolution in January,
1908, ordering the Attorney 1908, ordering the Attorney
General to institute proceedings for the recovery of these forfeited lands. Success in
this litigation would have enabled Senator Tillman or any other citizen to establish
claims to the Oregon land or any other public land so re-
