The people of Artesia expect to push the road to the Plains and to further the work a committee consisting of G. U. McCrary, E. C. Higgins, William Dooley and O. H. Ragsdale will work up the matter here. At the same time all Artesians in Carlsbad next week are expected to line themselves behind Judge Mc-Crary to present the proposition to the commissioners. Such was the determination of the Artesia Commercial Club at its meeting Monday night.

The meeting was called to order by the president, E. B. Kemp, owing to the absence of the secretary, Dr. Jale D. Graham, the president appointed James D. Whelan secretary, pro tem.

Road Supervisor, J. T. Patrick was called upon to inform the club in regard to the work of laying out the proposed county road to the Mr. Patrick stated Plains. that he had had a conversation with J. H. Graham, county commissioner and that Mr. Graham had shown the greatest interest in the cause of the road. Mr. Graham urged that the people of Artesia find out how much they would spend toward the road and the com-

missoners would give as much proportionately as they had to Carlsbad. The petitions for the road have been duly signed and notices posted according to the law. The people of the Plains all want the road. It developed that the trade between the Plains and other points is growing rapidly and the people there are beginning to realize how much they are losing by not having the new route to Artesia. The new telephone line will run by the new road most of the way except where the road zigzags.


