## Toltec Oil Man Talks About Well

We are going to strike oil in Lunsford vice president of the Toltee Oil Company today. Our first well in Chaves county, which we drilled to a depth of 3120 feet and then abandoned proved the existence of oilbearing sands, and it is now simply a question of finding the oil in commercial quantities. But our second well which we started about four miles distant from the first well may prove to be at the right location. If it dosen't we will continue drilling wells

The Toltec company is the Chicago concern that has more than 500,000 acres of state land under lease in Chaves, Lincoln Guadalupe, Torrance, San Miguel and Santa Fe counties. It also has the San Cristopal ranch of Senator B. E. Pankey in the Lamy district of this county under lease for oil exploration purposes, and has drilled one well there to a depth of 1615 feet. Due to the fact that it has been found necessary to enlarge the bore of this well, the company is now pulling some of the casing, and it will be three weeks before drilling can be resum-

Mr. Lunsford states that five showings of oil and three of gas were encountered in the first Chaves county well and that gas has been encountered in drilling the well on the Pankey ranch. The formation in Chaves county, he says, is similar to that found in the oil fields of the Gulf coast, while that on the Pankey ranch duplicates the formation of the Blackwell field in Oklahoma.



Russia's wrath against intriguers in her borders is rising daily.

At Karsk a German miller named Tolman, who had attempted to burn a mill, was arrested by a big crowd. He was seized and tied to a railroad track near by. The crowd ordered engineer to run over the prisoner. The former demurred. Then the crowd tried to start the engine but could not. They went back to the engineer and at the point of bayonets forced him to kill Tolman by running him down. Body of German was literally reduced to

Shepherd, United Press staff correspondent at Petrograd, tried their utmost to produce rioting in Petrograd a few days ago, when an anarchist committed suicide in the garden of General Durnovo's residence during the Cossack attack on that house.

#### NINETY-EIGHT INDICTED. PLOT TO INCITE REVOLUTION IN IN DIA BARED AT FRISCO.

Indictments charging conspiracy to promote revolution against British rule in India were returned at Sar Francisco against ninety-eight mer located in various sections of America and abroad and ranging from mil lionaires and diplomats to Hindu laborers, with the Pacific coast metropolis as the base of operations in this country. The true bills were presen ed to Federal Judge Morrow by t United States grand jury after man

weeks' investigation. Former German consuls in Chicago Honolulu, Manilo and San Francisco, together with members of their staffs and former attaches of German embassy at Washington, are among those indicted.

#### Twenty Airplanes in Raid.

The largest number of German airplanes ever raiding London dropped bombs over the city Saturday. Twenty machines were seen. Apparently de sirous of profiting by their poor ain in previous raids, due to great heigh at which bombs were released, German air pirates flew very low, and plainly

seen from the street. As soon as the sound of he antiaircraft guns engaging the raiders was heard many of the populace hurried into their cellars. Peppering o. the guns firing at the Germans gave ample warning of the raid.

Four German machines were com pletely wrecked. The bombs killed thirty-seven persons and wounded 141

#### Orleans Sunk.

The American steamship Orleans o the Oriental Navigation company ha. been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine. Four of the crew were drowned, but all members of armed naval guard were saved. Name of the place and time of attack were with held by the state degartment. As the first ship flying the American flag to brave a tranatlantic voyage after Ger many announced her policy of relent less submarine warfare, the Orlean. was given a great demonstration upor her arrival at Bordeaux.

#### Government Controls Exports. President Wilson issued a procla

mation on Sunday night establishing govvernment control over exports o certain necessaries to allied neutra and enemy countries, through the li censing of such shipments, effective Sunday next. It is virtually an em borgo and gives the United States at opportunity to determine its own re quirements.

#### All to Be Sent Home.

All German diplomatic agents are to be cleaned out of the United State: as the government proceeds with it: work of stopping the leak of military information to Germany. Remova of the Teutons has been under con sideration for several weeks, but the recent spy seare brought the situation to a head.

#### Unit Drafte Aug. 15.

The war department will draft na tional guard units Aug. 15. State will be given credit for all men service against men to be called national army.
