## THE CITY CONVENTION.

The convention, which was called for the purpose of nominating four trustees and a mayor, convened Monday afternoon at 3 p. m. in the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting resulted in nominating a new ticket with the exception of one incumbent, Frank Donahue, who is at present serving on the city council.

Dr. Chester Russell was selected as chairman and R. A. Brewer clerk. These officers presided over the entire meeting. Nominations were first in order for Mayor. The names of Dr. J. J. Clarke and M. H. Ferriman were voted on as respective candidates for this office, the names of six candidates were presented for town trustees. These were: C. W. Bartlett, D. I. Clowe, F. H. Donahue, J. L. Truett, V. L. Gates and B. J. Lampton. Of the six men nominated the four receiving the majority of the votes were: C. W. Bartlett, D. I. Clowe, J. L. Truett and F. H. Donahue. Landis Feather received the majority of votes over I. C. Keller for City Treasurer.

Dr. J. J. Clarke, the nominee for mayor was called upon for a speech. In responding declared that he had no special desire to serve as Mayor since he served in a similar capacity before and realizing the responsibility that rested upon the Mayorship, but since it was the decision of the members present that he should serve in this capacity he was willing to put forth his best efforts in this direction.

There were only two nominees for town trustees present, C. W. Bartlett and J. L. Truett, who responded with short talks when called upon. Both nominees stated that they were willing to devote time necessary to attend to Artesia a better place in which to live, forth all energy possible to make and know the duties of the office

## SCOUT ORGANIZATION

### Boy Scout Troop is Planned for Artesia

### Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce will Assist in the Organization

A movement is on foot to organize a Boy Scout troop in Artesia. The Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Rotary club, hope to soon perfect plans whereby the organization will soon be functioning. While a previous effort sometime ago did not meet with success, the two above named organizations of Artesia have become thoroughly awake to the opportunity now open and will follow the example of some of the larger cities.

That an organization of the Boy Scout movement here is needed can not be disputed and with this aim in view some of the men of our town who have had previous experience in work of this kind have offered their services. The men named to head the scout movement are D. I. Clowe and Ray Bartlett. Both of these men were chosen because of their previous experience. Mr. Clowe because he has a wide experience in boys work and Mr. Bartlett because of his experience along this line together with his military training.

A committee consisting of Jim Robertson, J. J. Clarke, Rex Wheatley, Frank Donahue and Martin Yates were appointed from the Rotary club to confer with similar committees from other organizations.

Here are some things connected with the Boy Scouts. All different creeds and sects are recognized and all organizations dealing and working with boy life are represented. Any boy 12 years of age or over is eligible to become a scout. The only requirements are that he knows:

1. The scout law, sign, salute and significance of the badge.
  2. The composition and history of the National flag and the customary form of respect due it.
  3. Tie the following knots: square reef, sheet-bend, bow line, fisherman's sheep shank, halter, hitch, timber hitch and two half hitches.
- A few of its teachings are, honesty, reverence, obedience, cooking, saving, points of compass, signaling, first aid, map reading, star constellation, etc.

The scout must also take the scout

oath and do a good turn each day. The teachings of the Boy Scout are not military, but rather the teachings of good fellowship combined with sports and religion.

## ROTARY WILL SPONSOR JUVENILE BAND.

At the Rotary luncheon Tuesday two far reaching and important movements were taken up and discussed. One was that the Rotary club will get behind and sponsor the Artesia Juvenile Band. The club proposes to lend this organization aid where ever possible. So here after the Juvenile Band will be known as the Artesia Rotary Juvenile Band and will be so broadcasted at the program given at Roswell on April 4th.

The organization of a Boy Scout troop was taken up and discussed by two special guests at this occasion, D. I. Clowe and Ray Bartlett, both experienced men in organizations of this kind. Full details of the Boy Scout movement will be found elsewhere in this issue.

## HAGERMAN BALL TEAM.

The Hagerman basket ball team, who by reason of their recent victory over the opposing teams are again state champions of the basket ball court, journeyed down to Artesia recently and had photographer R. O. Rodden take several pictures of the team. They were accompanied by their coach R. M. Thomas. Mr. Rodden informs us that he will do the photographic work for the entire Hagerman High School. The remainder of the students are to come later.

The fact that the Hagerman High School have chosen the Rodden studio to do their work, speaks well indeed for the class of workmanship turned out by Mr. Rodden. Especially when one considers the distance the Hagerman students have to come.

WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Artesia, New Mexico, held on the 20th day of February, 1924, a resolution was duly adopted directing that the question of issuing negotiable coupon bonds of the town of Artesia, New Mexico, in the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purpose of enlarging, improving and extending the system of supplying water of said town, said bonds to be payable not exceeding thirty years after their date, but redeemable at the option of the Board of Trustees of said Town of Artesia, at any time after twenty years after their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent (6) per annum, interest payable semi-annually, and

WHEREAS, the proper officers of said Town were in said Resolution directed to cause to be published, a notice of said election wherein shall be stated the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued, and the amount thereof, and the time and places of holding such election as required by law.

THEREFORE, I, M. H. QUESTION SUBMITTED Shall the Town of Artesia issue its negotiable coupon bonds in the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purpose of enlarging, improving and extending the system of supplying water for said Town, said bonds to be payable not more than 30 nor less than 20 years after date, and to bear interest at not more than six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually? Sometime when there is a small

 tended to furnish  
 the family a good  
 meal try:



**Dumplings**  
**With Steak.**—  
 Cook the steak  
 first on one side  
 in a smoking hot  
 frying pan, sea-  
 son well and cover with boiling water.  
 Drop on dumplings made from any  
 good recipe or use the following: One  
 cupful of flour, two teaspoonfuls of  
 baking powder, one-third of a cupful  
 of milk, one-third of a teaspoonful of  
 salt and one tablespoonful of fat.  
 Drop by spoonfuls on the steak and  
 cover tightly, steam for twenty  
 minutes.

**Creamed Cabbage and Green Peppers.**—  
 Take one pint of shredded  
 cooked cabbage, set over hot water in  
 a double boiler. Fry two tablespo-  
 onfuls of minced onion and one minced  
 green pepper in two tablespoonfuls of  
 butter. Remove the vegetables, add to  
 the cabbage and make a white sauce  
 by using two tablespoonfuls of melted  
 butter, the same of flour, and when  
 well blended add one cupful of milk.  
 Cook until thick, season with salt and  
 cayenne and add the sauce to the cab-  
 bage. Serve hot.

**Tuna Fish Loaf.**—Take a pound can  
 of tuna fish, two eggs, one-half cupful  
 of water, one-fourth of a teaspoonful  
 of celery salt, one cupful of bread  
 crumbs, one teaspoonful of baking pow-  
 der, one teaspoonful of salt, the juice  
 of half a lemon and a dash of cayenne.  
 Mix well, season to taste, and put into  
 a well-greased bread pan and brown.  
 Turn out and serve with:

**Parsley Sauce.**—Wash and cover  
 with boiling water one bunch of  
 parsley to which a pinch of salt and  
 soda has been added. Cook ten  
 minutes, strain and add to a cupful of  
 rich white sauce, stir in a tablespo-  
 onful of minced parsley and pour over  
 the loaf.

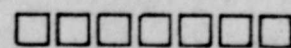

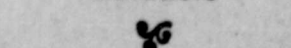

## LARGE SUMMER SCHOOL EXPECTED.

Fort Sam Houston, Texas (Special):--A demonstration troop of Cavalry and one company of Infantry from the Regular Army will be detailed to the Citizens' Military Training Camp to be held in August at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. These units will be full strength and picked from the finest troops in the Eighth Corps Area.

The Cavalry troop will have the finest horses the Army has and students will be allowed the use of these mounts. The Infantry company will specialize in snappy close order drill and will have on it's roster several crack shots.

Every thing is being made ready for 450 students at Fort Huachuca this summer and every convenience and accomodation will be given by the Government free of any expense to the boys.

It will be advisable to young men intending to apply to send in their applications as soon as possible to the C. M. T. C. Officer, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

79 applications have already been approved for the camp at Huachuca and it is noted that among the applicants are several fine athletes from the schools and colleges of New Mexico and Arizona.

East Las Vegas, Mch 24:--The Normal University Summer School for 1924 will be as large as ever according to present indications. The school will be able to take care of all comers. This has been possible by the pledging of \$1600 by San Miguel County Chamber of Commerce to pay extra faculty members, additional to the regular staff to be paid by the regularly appropriated funds.

Most of the present winter school faculty will remain as regular instructors for the summer. In addition a number of the most progressive school men and women of the state and of the West have been employed. Among these are five city superintendents: Dr. E. E. Cole of Carrizozo, Alma Givins of Artesia, Raymond Huff of Clayton, Walter B. McFarland of East Las Vegas, and Cameron Bazzill of Roy. Three high school principals have been employed: Charles Redick of Gallup, W. L. Trimble of Raton and F. P. McCall of Las Vegas. Miss Lillian Cavet, formerly successful here in dramatic directing, will return after a winter of post-graduate study at the University of Arizona. Miss Ida G. Nolds will come back from California after a successful year there.

The commercial department, under Miss Heisen, will have an able assistant instructor in Mr. R. F. Estes, instructor in commercial subjects in the Raton High School.

During the absence of Miss Louise Jaramillo the department of music will be charge of Miss Myrtle Inches, who is at present director of public school music for the city of San Antonio, Texas. Miss Inches is the sister of Miss Jeanette Inches, professor of Latin.

An extra half term series of courses is being offered beginning April 11th for teachers whose schools close early. Enrollment at this time will enable many teachers in counties where many teachers in counties short of funds, to make more than the usual summer credit toward their degrees.

Ordinarily in planting each seed ear is responsible for at least two bushels of the crop expected. Think it over. The loss you sustain in planting one dead ear of corn more than outweighs the trouble of testing many ears. The agronomy department of the New Mexico Agricultural College gives the following pointers on culling your seed corn.

Culling of seed corn consists in carefully examining each ear for indications of ear germs, disease, immaturity, or any other defects, and discarding all the defective ears. The tips and butts should first be shelled off, and the grain discarded. The weight and firmness of the ear should be observed for signs of immaturity.

Good seed corn should have a plump, creamy white germ. The kernels should be fairly large and well-matured with plump tips, and the backs of the kernels should be plosy and free from blisters. Indications of mould should be carefully noted, and a few kernels from each ear should be cut across the germs to note the color. Any ears which have dead germs, mouldy kernels or cobs, rotted shanks, shrunk, blistered or dull, soft, starchy kernels should be discarded.

If time permits each ear should be tested for germination in a sand box or a rag doll tester. Five or six kernels should be removed from different parts of the ear for this test. If this not done, at least a composite sample of the lot of shelled seed should be tested, and if germination is more than 95 per cent the culling has been properly done. This test will be made free of charge by the Agricultural College Seed Laboratory.
