Windsor interests, who made a location in section 29, April 1st probably created more interest than any election held for several years past. Both sides waged a heated contest and distributed various circulars and cards over town on the eve of the election. The women vote polled was heavy, the fairer sex exercised their privilege and voted in greater numbers than the men. It is not known how the voting percentage actually stood, but it is believed that the woman vote was far larger than the man.

CITY ELECTION HELD TUESDAY, APRIL 1

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GOOD ROADS MEET TO BE HELD IN ALBUQUERQUE

The prospects are auspicious for one of the largest and most representative good roads gatherings that has ever been held in the southwest, when the joint meetings of the United States Good Roads association and Bankhead National Highway association and United Good Roads show will be held in Albuquerque, May 25-31, according to the statement issued by Director-General Rountree of these organizations.

Invitations have been extended to the governors of the various states throughout the Union to attend these conventions, participate in the same and also to appoint 100 delegates from their respective state, by Governor Hinkle, on behalf of the state of New Mexico, by Mayor E. B. Swope, on behalf of the city of Albuquerque, by President Allen Bruce, on behalf of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, by President O. A. Larrazola, on behalf of the United States Good Roads association, by President Benahan Cameron, on behalf of the Bankhead National Highway association, by Director-General J. A. Rountree, on behalf of both these organizations.

Twenty-one governors have notified Gov. J. F. Hinkle that they will take the invitation to attend the conventions under advisement, a number of them write that if they can possibly arrange to do so, they will attend. Each of the following governors have agreed to appoint from ten to 100 delegates to represent their respective states: Governors Brandon, of Alabama, Hunt of Arizona, Richardson of California, Denby of Delaware, Moore of Idaho, Kendall of Iowa, McCray of Indiana, Parker of Louisiana, Davis of Kansas, Ritchie of Maryland, Preus of Minnesota, Hyde of Missouri, Brown of New Hampshire, Scrugan of Nevada, Nestos of North Dakota, Trapp of Oklahoma, Mabey of Utah, Neff of Texas, Trinkle of Virginia, Morgan of West Virginia, Ross of Wyoming.

The United States Good Roads show will consist of exhibits from the bureau of public roads and various state highway departments, improved road machinery and road material promises to be one of the most attractive features of the coming meeting.

Fifteen state highway commissioners and engineers have promised to have exhibits at the United States Good Roads show consisting of maps, pictures, profiles, and samples of materials used in building roads in their respective states. It is expected that at least 30 or 40 states will be represented at this show. It will be an opportunity for the good roads boosters of the country to see what is being done in road building in the various states throughout the nation.

A splendid collection of oil paintings by Rollins was on exhibition at the Chamber of Commerce last Friday, but on account of the dust storm very few were able to see it. The collection consisted of a series of pictures of Chaco canon, in the northwestern part of our state, which combined both beauty and historic interest.

ART EXHIBIT

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FRED HALSEY MURDERED SUNDAY NIGHT

An Unknown Assailant Fatally Shoots Prominent Farmer Returning Home From Church

Quick Work of Officers has Resulted in the Arrest of Several Suspects--Murdered Man's Wife Held in Connection with the Killing

Fred Halsey, a farmer living about six miles south of Hope, was shot and instantly killed at his home Sunday evening between 10 and 10:30 p. m. as he was returning from the Nazarine church here. According to the evidence which was brought out in the coroner's inquest by Justice of the Peace S. W. Gilbert of Artesia, Mr. Halsey with his wife, Mrs. E. L. Burns and little granddaughter drove up to a gate between the barn and residence of the deceased. Mr. Halsey got out of the car to open the gate. Just as the car passed the deceased a shot was fired from a nearby tamarack hedge killing Halsey. The weapon used was a shot gun loaded with number six shot. The shot took effect just below the heart and above a small watch carried in a vest pocket.

A small hole was torn in the body of the deceased not more than one-half inch in diameter. From this fact it is evident that the assailant was not more than eight or ten feet from Mr. Halsey at the time the shot was fired. Mr. Halsey moaned three times and expired before the body was brought into the residence.

The inquest was held Monday morning at 9 o'clock at the home of the deceased. The jury was composed of farmers and neighbors of the Hope community. They were: Dr. O. E. Pucket, foreman; W. M. Keller, Clyde Gant, Oliver Scoggin, Will E. Scoggin and George M. Chambers. District Attorney Dillard Wyatt, who was summoned immediately was at the time in Lea county in the interest of his campaign, came to Artesia as soon as possible and has conducted an investigation here assisted by Sheriff

Ned Shattuck and Deputy Sheriff Ben Roten. Luther Rogers and Preston Sears, both of Artesia, have been arrested in connection with the killing and other arrests are expected momentarily.

LATER--Mrs. Fred Halsey and a party by the name of "Cottonwood Bill" were placed under arrest and Preston Sears was released. All of the above parties except Sears were taken to Carlsbad and placed in custody, awaiting further developments.

The funeral of Mr. Halsey was held in Artesia Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 p. m. at the Baptist church. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. L. Simmons, local pastor of that church here. Interment was made in the Woodbine cemetery. Mr. Halsey is survived by his wife and other relatives who live at a distance.

Later development Wednesday resulted in the arrest of an additional party, Jean Perdue, proprietor of the Perdue restaurant here, who is said to have admitted the ownership of a gun found Wednesday on the premises of the deceased, which is thought to have been the weapon used to kill Halsey, the gun, a 16 gauge double barrel shot gun was located in a peculiar manner according to a story current on the streets of Artesia Thursday morning.

A. J. Harvell of Cisco, Texas, who is visiting here is said to have seen in a dream the weapon used. The gun according to his story was in water. He reported his dream and an investigation was conducted. The gun was found in a tank of water about twenty steps northeast of the spot where the deceased was killed.

Perdue was arrested and placed in jail here Wednesday and was taken to Roswell Thursday morning.

I am in favor of a bank guaranty law and assisted in drawing the first bills which were introduced in the legislature in 1921 and 1923, House Bill 334 was passed by the house in the 1924 legislature, but failed of passage in the senate and while this is perhaps the most needed legislation at this time, there are numerous existing laws that need to be amended and I am going to Santa Fe to help put some of them over whether I am elected or not.

QUARANTINE REMOVED

Pecos Valley Cotton Can Be Shipped Anywhere

Eastern Market Will be Opened for Our Cotton After Two Years of Quarantine

The following is an excerpt of a letter received by the secretary of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce, Dr. J. J. Clarke. This announcement we are sure will be of vital interest to many cotton farmers around Artesia and in other communities.

United States Department of Agriculture, El Paso, Texas.
Secretary Chamber of Commerce, Artesia, New Mexico.

Dear Sir:
Will you kindly give such publicity as you can through the medium of your chamber, to the following:

The above department has decided to allow the unrestricted movement of baled cotton from districts in which no infection of pink boll worm of cotton has been found for two years.

The above announcement should be exceedingly good news to the cotton growers of the Pecos Valley since it opens up an unrestricted market for cotton growers of this district. While the fact that the quarantine has been removed may not affect the price of cotton here, it will be a distinct advantage to the farmer in many ways. Heretofore the Pecos Valley farmer could only ship his cotton to New Orleans, Galveston or some other port for export, unless the baled cotton went through the process of fumigation, which was an added expense to the grower, because it cost approximately one cent per pound for every bale fumigated. Now, however, the Pecos Valley cotton will be allowed to go to the eastern markets just like any other cotton.

This release will not apply to cotton seed as we understand it. The first pink boll worm was found near Carlsbad in 1920 and again in 1921, since that time a quarantine has been maintained against all cotton grown in this section.

MAY BUILD ROAD TO ROSWELL ON BEE LINE

District Engineer Davidson was in Vaughn last Sunday conferring with the president of the local Chamber of Commerce on the grading of the road between here and Roswell. The grading gang has about completed the work on the south end of the road and in a short time will move to the north end and grade it.

There has been some question as to whether the road would go direct as it does now, or would have to follow section lines. As there is not much money available, the engineer says that it will be impossible to make a good road on section lines, and favors the "bee" line. It will be shorter, and there will be a chance to avoid bad hills and valleys that would cost too much to fix.

The Chamber of Commerce took the matter up at its meeting this week and decided to back the "bee" line. An effort will be made to get land owners who have land which the road will cross, to agree to let it be built across their land. The road was established in 1908 as a government highway, so that the government has the right to it, in spite of claims of landholders who secured the land since then, but it is hoped that the route can be secured without any trouble.

Undoubtedly the land owners will see the advantage of having a good highway built near them and will be willing to give the land that the road crosses and not force the government to build the road against their will—Vaughn News.

METHODIST PREACHER SERVES TERRITORY AS BIG AS SOME STATES

Alamogordo.—A new Methodist church is nearing completion at Weed, about 30 miles south and east of Cloudcroft. The Methodist Mission board furnished \$2000 for material and the work is being donated by the citizens of the community. The mountain people are enthusiastic over the new building and men, women and children gather there to do their share of the work.

Rev. A. L. Means, pastor of the Weed district, has jurisdiction over an area larger than the states of Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey or New Hampshire. His work takes him as far south as the Texas line and in his immense territory he travels hundreds of miles annually to visit his parishioners. Although he has a car, so much of the territory is inaccessible that much of the traveling is done on horseback. It is not uncommon for him to conduct five services on Sunday.

Rev. Mr. Means is a native of the Sacramento mountain country. When he was graduated from the Southern Methodist University at Dallas a few years ago, he asked the Methodist board to place him at Weed because of the opportunity there for an extensive work. He is the only missionary maintained by the church in the rural sections of New Mexico and is affectionally known as the "Bishop of the Mountains."

SIMPLE DISHES

A wholesome dessert which is good for the children is:



Butter scotch Pudding.—Melt one cupful of brown sugar and two tablespoonfuls of butter and cook until melted and brown; be careful not to burn. Pour over the mixture two cupfuls of hot milk and simmer ten minutes until all is dissolved. Meanwhile soak an inch-slice of bread in cold water until soft and press out all the water and crumble into bits. Pour the milk, sugar and butter mixture over the bread and beat in the yolks of two eggs, a little salt and a small teaspoonful of vanilla. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a pan of water twenty-five minutes. Beat the whites of the eggs stiff, add two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, the juice of half a lemon and beat again. Spread over the pudding and brown in a moderate oven.

Lemon Cheese Cakes.—For the filling for five individual pies, take one egg, three tablespoonfuls of sugar, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, the grated rind and a tablespoonful of lemon juice, one-fourth of a cupful of cake crumbs. Beat the yolk of an egg, add the sugar, salt, lemon juice and rind with the crumbs, mix well, fold in the beaten white of the egg which has been beaten stiff and turn into pastry-lined patty tins. Bake until the filling is set.

Tapioea and Date Sponge.—Cook one-third of a cupful of tapioea in a pint of boiling water slightly salted. When the tapioea is transparent, stir in one-half pound of dates which have been washed and pits removed, add one-fourth of a cupful of sugar and the juice of a large lemon. Beat the whites of two eggs very light and fold in the tapioea mixture. Cover and let stand on the back of the range until ready to serve. Serve with sugar and cream.

CARE OF BABY CHICKS

One of the simplest, yet most important, operations of poultry management is the proper brooding of baby chicks. The poultry department of the New Mexico State Agricultural college gives the following suggestions on this subject.

The first essential is to provide comfortable quarters. A brooder house should be constructed so that it is free from drafts and at the same time admits plenty of fresh air and sunshine. There are several standard makes of brooders on the market and any of these should give satisfactory service. The brooder should be started at least two days before the chicks are placed in the house, so that the temperature may be adjusted to the desired degree which, for the first week, should be ninety-five or one hundred degrees. Gradually reduce this temperature as the vitality of the chick increases.

The second essential is proper food. The floor of the hover should be covered with a fine litter of some digestible material, as fine-cut alfalfa or clover. Chicks should not be fed until they are at least forty-eight hours old, as the yolk of the egg which is absorbed by the chick just before hatching, furnishes the necessary nourishment for the first two or three days. One of the first foods the chick should have is four or butter milk, and such milk should be kept before them for the first few days. They should be fed for or five times a day a small amount of easily digested food. This may be homemade mixture of hard boiled eggs and stale bread crumbs, or dry oat meal, or a commercial chick feed may be used. Remember over feeding will do more harm than underfeeding. The important thing is to feed the chicks regularly just enough to satisfy their hunger and keep them exercising.

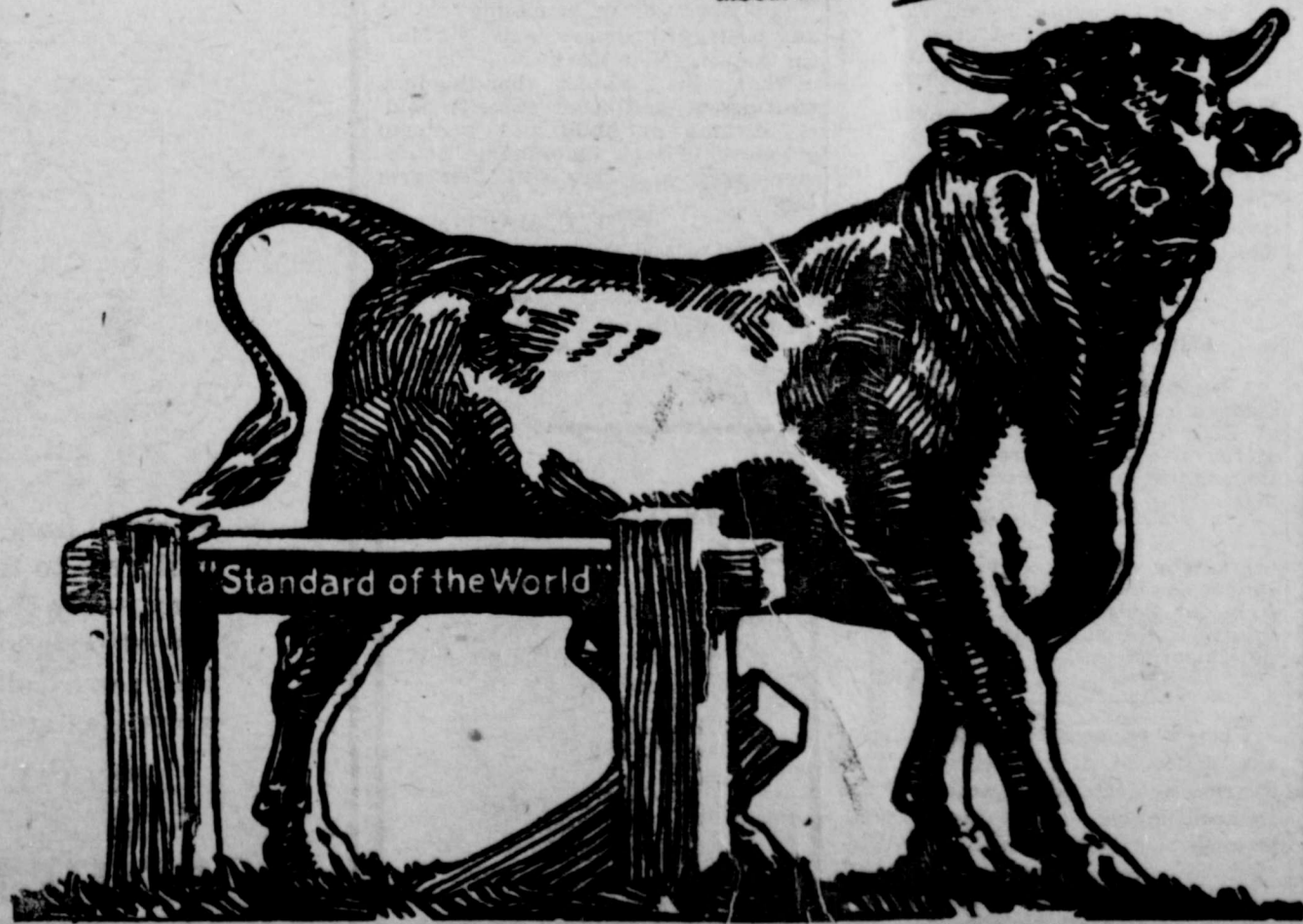

TO THE CITIZENS OF ARTESIA

On the other hand will Mr. Donahue, whose entire public life has been spent in the service of corporations, who is now a banker, according to his campaign managers, of unusual ability, will he write the guaranty state banking law in favor of the banks, or in favor of the depositors. I will site you to the passage of the Texas guaranty state banking law, which became effective January, 1910, because of the confidence of the people of Oklahoma had in the guaranty state banking law, many of them moved their money from Oklahoma into the guaranty fund banks of Texas.

The bankers association met in Oklahoma City in July of 1912 and endorsed a guaranty state banking law in order that confidence might be restored in the banks of Oklahoma. The people, because of the guaranty state banking law, deposited their money in the banks of Oklahoma, but when the supreme test of the law came, the banks failed, and the people lost their money, as well as their confidence.

Taking under consideration the number of bankers already in the state senate, together with the fact that the bankers have written the present banking laws, do you not believe that you had better be careful about sending bankers to the New Mexico senate.

When I announced my candidacy I stated that I had a legislative record. That record will bear me out that my name is on the concurrent resolution which made women suffrage possible.

I also helped to write and pass national prohibition, by endorsing the concurrent resolution from the Texas legislature.

I supported the Dean bill which is the enforcement law for state-wide prohibition in Texas. I voted for fourteen million dollars appropriation for public schools, appropriation for the blind and the insane and supported the moral program without a single exception, and yet they say that religion and politics will not mix.

By reference to the "lives of the presidents" of the U. S. you will find that two of them were regularly ordained ministers. There is today serving in the U. S. congress, five regularly ordained ministers.

In 1918 I had an occasion to make a systematic search of the congressional records of the United States and I found there had served in the United States congress one hundred and seventeen ministers and not one of them had ever been connected with a political scandal.

In view of the nature of the campaign being made against me I wish to say my moral character has passed unchallenged annually for twenty-five years at the Methodist church conference.

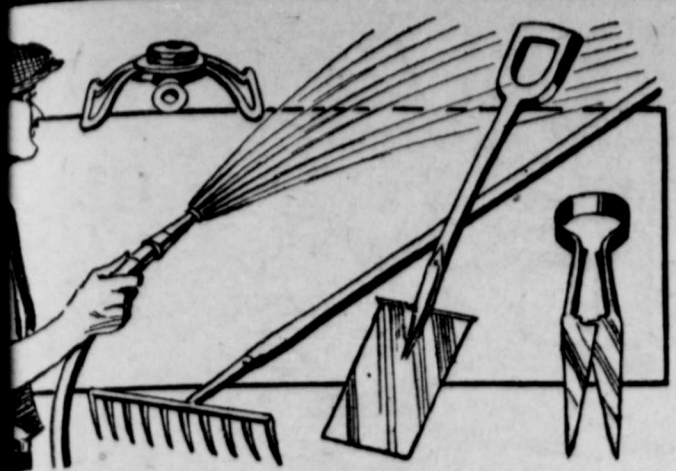
