JUST OFF THE PRESS

A new irrigation bulletin by Dean W. Bloodgood and A. S. Curry, of the New Mexico A. & M. College is just off the press. It covers the results of experiments on irrigation for the past several years performed to determine the water requiremen in the Mesilla Valley for alfalfa. wheat, peaches, corn, Irish potatoes soybeans, grapes, tomatoes, cabbage, Sudan grass, onions, rye, cotsorghums, oats, barley, sweet potatoes and chili. On alfalfa alone 85 tests were made.

The publication includes a brief history of the development of irrigation in this valley, purpose and scope of the investigation performed, duty of water terms defined and explained, such as "second-foot," "acre-"irrigation head," "water requirement," etc. It also discussed any of the factors which affect the duty of water on various crops some of these factors being method of water delivery, and of distribution system, preparation of the land surface, soil texture, amount of water per irrigation, climate, and many others.

For alfalfa the best duty was obtained from about fifty acre inches of water per acre, applied in five inch irrigations; for wheat, from 15 to 20 acre inches per acre, applied in four inch irrigations; and for the other crops the duty varied widely with the crop under consideration. HEAVY OIL ROYALTIES Selecting Blouse PAID TO THE TEXAS UNIVERSITY IN AUGUST

AUSTIN, Texas.-A check for \$122,587.90 from the Texon Oil Company, operating on University of Texas land, was received at Land Commissioner J. T. Robison's office last week. This brings the total royalties for August to \$236,278.01, the of July royalties.

The July royalties of \$243,000 were obtained through the adjustment of prices, which caused the Texon Company to pay an additional \$22,000. During August one lease on university land produced oil worth \$1,250,962.96, the royalty on which amounted to \$156,370.37. The lease consists of 10,240 acres and is in

Reagan county. About \$200,000 of the university oil royalties is in the permanent fund and the remainder is in state depositories drawing 2 per cent interest, it was reported. Interest from the permanent fund will go into the available fund, it is expected, which would provide a large sum annually.



SUIT AT SANTA FE WILL TEST AUTO TAX LAW

Santa Fe, N. M .- Holding the tax features of the new motor vehicle act constitutional and enforceable, Judge Reed Holloman of the first juducial district Monday afternoon handed down a decision in a friendly injunction suit brought by the county commisisoners of Santa Fe, Comptroller R. H. Carter, to test this provision, which effects all of the 50,000 automoble owners in New Mexico

District Attorney David Chavez, Jr., who brought the suit for the county officials, announced an appeal to the supreme court but in the meantime the comptroller will pro-


ceed to enforce the law.

The provision held valid by Judge Holloman requires all applicants for automobile license for 1926 to present to the comptroller's office receipts showing they have paid the 1926 property tax on their cars, or in lieu thereof, veterans' exemption certificates. The 1926 property tax on automobiles becomes payable December 1, 1926, and delinquent after December 31, 1925, far in advance of the property tax on all other kinds of real property. The return date for autos, as fixed by this law is October 1.

The tuning coil can be made at home by anyone of average skill. It is wound on a 31/2-inch tube, 4 inches long. The primary (L1) consists of 12 turns of No. 22 dec. wire. Half an inch away from the primary wind a secondary (L2) of 47 turns of the same size wire. Cl is a variable condenser of .0005 capacity, preferably low-loss. C2 is a .00025 grid condenser and C3 is a .001 fixed condenser. Regeneration is controlled mainly by the rheostat. This hook-up could be used very nicely in a portable set, as it will work effectively with dry-cell tubes.

Advice on Hook-Ups for Builders of Radio Sets

In attempting to try out some new hook-up the fan often makes connections rather hurriedly with any scraps of wire that may be left over from some previous experimental work. Frequently one or two connections in the circuit hooked up in this way are so poor that they affect the working of the circuit.

If you have much experimenting to do, it is wise to cut a number of pieces of wire, varying in length, and solder clips on the ends. Then when you want to make up a new circuit it is easy to clip the wires on where they belong with the assurance that all connections are tight.

QUARANTINE MONDAY

SANTA FE, N. M.—Governor A. T. Hannett Monday amended the Texas, which has been forced since December 30, 1924.

The amendment reads as follows: 'And I hereby further prohibit the shipment of any cattle, sheep, goats or swine, from the state of Texas loaded east of the above mentioned line, through the state of New Mexico, except by special permit by the Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico. Permit shall specify that said stock shall not be unloaded for feed or rest while going through New

Mexico." The line is the 100th meridian. The order prohibits the shipment into New Mexico of any cattle, sheep, goats, or any hoofs, horns, hides, skins or meat; any wool, hay, hair, straw fodder or other "materials" that the Cattle Sanitary Board considers dangerous, but exempts packing house products if not from a quarantined area.

Section 1203. Children between the ages of six and sixteen years, both inlusive, shall attend public schools of the state for as many weeks as the such children reside shall be in session, except that children actually 1, Union 1, Union 1, Chaves 2, Such children reside shall be in session, except that children actually 1, Union attending private or denomination schools maintaining courses of inapproved by the State 2, McKinley 1. Board of Education, those physically or mentally unfit or incompetent and these residing more than three miles from public school houses and to whom no free public means of conveyance to and from school are furnished shall be exempt from the provisions of this Act. The governing authorities of private and denominational schools shall monthly report to the governing authorities of the public schools wherein such private and denominational schools are situated, the children enrolled in such private and denominational schools who fail to attend the same. Section 1210. Parents, guardians and persons having control of children subject to the provisions of this Act are hereby made responsible for the public school attendance of such children, and any parent, guardian or person aforesaid who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter, after any school authority shall have given public notice of the substance of the provisions of this Act, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisoned in the county jail for not less than five nor more than ninety days, and in addition to the penalty aforesaid any parent, guardian or person having control of children subject to the provisions of this Act who shall welcome. Watch this be subject to the writ of mandamus issued out of the district court of the county, at the instance and in the name of county or municipal boards of education or county of city sup-erintendents of schools, without consent of the Attorney General. Justices of the peace shall also have jurisdiction in prosecutions under

Farm Home Needs Electric Help Too

Rural homes have suffered somewhat in plans discussed for farm elecrification, in the opinion of the Smithionian Institution of Washington, D. C. The greater emphasis has been placed on applying electric power to arm operations, according to the belef of the Institution. The great sosial issue of a home-like farm home has been comparatively neglected.

"On the average farm," says the 3mithsonian Institution, "the use of dther electric power or of mechanical iquipment for replacing animal and tuman muscular labor in the fields, tround the barns, and on the road s growing. The man's effective work by this multiplication of muscular efort is greatly increased, his working sours lessened and the tedium of his abor reduced.

"Usually with the rural woman it as not been thus. She still frequently uses coal oil lamps. By muscle's brawn she still wields the broom, treads the sewing machine, rubs the tlothes on a wash-board or hand-opersted washing machine, turns the slothes wringer and churn; washes the day. dishes, carries out the refuse and tetches the water and fuel.

"The house where the wife and mother are drudges can never be a bome in the highest sense.

"The only open question in this matter are how the rural consumer can meet the installation costs of the electric equipment and the operating costs of the service; and whether it is better to extend high tension lines or generate electric current on the farm In a small isolated plant."

CALLS IT OBLIGATION

Young Says Electrical Industry Must Solve Rural Problem as Matter of Duty.

Farm electrification is not a business opening as much as it is a social obligation, in the opinion of Owen D. Young, a farm owner and with a farm boyhood behind him, now chairman of the board of directors of the General Electric Company. The obligation, in Mr. Young's opinion, rests with the electrical industry.

In an interview which Mr. Young has just granted to the New York Times, he says: "It is the electrical industry's job to make its contribution to adequacy and economy in farm production. Otherwise, the electrical industry will be found wanting. And it must accept a problem of this magnitude and character as presenting a duty rather than a new market.

"The question is, how can a business of this size and importance be developed in such a way that the electrical industry can sell its service for pay? Anybody can produce goods at such a price that no one can afford to buy them. Business demands that the price shall be within reach of the potential customer, and that there shall be a fair return to the producer. A Job to Be Worked Out

"It is incumbent upon the manufacturing branch of the electrical industry to meet this problem. It must make and develop the necessary machinery. It can be done. The manufacturing branch supplied the textile field, it provided the machinery for the mine and the railroad, for the steel mill and the bakery.

"We can make farming attractive, comfortable and profitable. Electricity can lighten farm labors and in-

Mr. Young added that it was hardly to be expected that the isolated electric light and power company, having inter-connection of power lines with any other utility company, could go out and serve the farmer at a distinct loss.
