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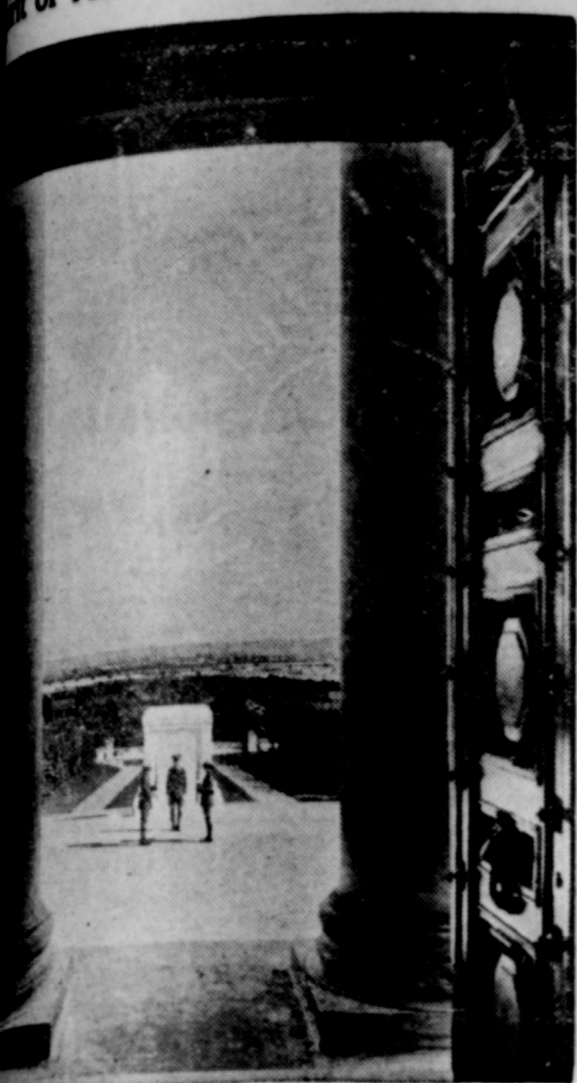

EXPECT LOST COMET

WILLIAM BAY, Wisconsin — Reappearance of the lost "comet of 1866" is expected some time the first two weeks in November. It is known also as Tempel's comet, and its return coincides with the possibility on November 15-17 of the "rain of fire" from the famous Leonid meteors. A special watch has been set for this comet by the British Astronomical association because its location may throw light on a fantastic theory that comets are thrown off by planets. Tempel's comet was found in 1866, moving in the main stream of the Leonid meteors, which that year filled the heavens with shooting stars. Both comet and Leonids were due to return in 1899, but no comet was sighted, and only a few meteors. This year completes the 33-year "period" for the comet's return.

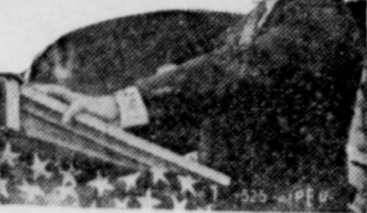
BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION Baptist state convention will be held this week in the First Baptist church at Albuquerque.

"THE things we were taught have not come true. We were taught to save, and in many parts of this country the savings of prudent people have been dissipated by careless and conscienceless financial manipulation. "We were taught to work and we have denied the opportunity to work. We are taught to increase the products of our labor and we have found that while the products increased the return has decreased. "We were taught to bring forth the fruits of the earth and we have found that the fruits of the earth have found no market. The results of our labor have been lost in the smash of an economic system unable to fulfill its purposes."

"I think we are all beginning to realize that some new factor is needed in our economic life as a nation. We are beginning to find that mere drifting is not enough."

"What we must do is to revise our tariff on the basis of a reciprocal exchange of goods, allowing other nations to buy and to pay for our goods by sending us such of their goods as will not seriously throw any of our industries out of balance, and incidentally making impossible in this country the continuance of pure monopolies which cause us to pay excessive prices for many of the necessities of life."

Plague Bacillus Found by Japanese Scientist

The paths that lead to obscurity and fame are ever present in the field of science. Baron Shihaburo Kitasato spent all his long life on the most painstaking researches on tuberculosis without making one new and really important contribution to our knowledge of the disease. But he discovered the bacillus of plague in a few days.

Forty years earlier, Dr. Claude Lillington relates in Hygeia Magazine, the world had settled down to the comfortable conviction that plague had little more historical interest and that modern sanitation had banished it from our midst. In 1894 an epidemic of plague broke out in Hongkong which startled the entire world. Kitasato, who had been sent from Japan to Germany to study under the eminent scientist Robert Koch, hurried back to his own country. Two days after Kitasato had arrived in Hongkong, he had found numerous bacilli in the infected glands and in the heart of a patient who had died of plague.

In a few days Kitasato again cabled Koch to tell him that he had succeeded in cultivating the bacillus artificially.

said act are hereby authorized to execute the necessary instrument or instruments to effect the exchange of lands therein provided for with the government of the United States; provided that in the determination of values of the lands now owned by the State of New Mexico the value of the lands, the timber thereon and mineral rights pertaining thereto shall control the determination of value. The legislature may enact laws for the carrying out of the provisions hereof in accordance herewith.

The proposed constitution amendment No. 2 as certified to the County Clerk, as provided in Sec. 41-404, 1929 Codification, reads as follows:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

A House joint resolution proposing to amend Section Nineteen of Article Four of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico; and fixing the time for holding an election thereon.

H. J. R. No. 10. Approved March 18, 1931.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section Nineteen of Article Four of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, said article being entitled "Legislative Department," so as to read as follows:

Sec. 19. No bill shall be introduced at any regular session of the Legislature subsequent to the forty-fifth legislative day, except the general appropriation bill, bills to provide for the current expenses of the government, and such bills as may be referred to the Legislature by the Governor by special message specifically setting forth the emergency or necessity requiring such legislation.

Section 2. In event of the passage and approval of the foregoing amendment the same shall be submitted to the people at the election in November, 1932; provided, however, that in case a special election is held prior to 1932 the same shall be submitted to the people at such election.

We do further proclaim that at said election the qualified voters of the County of Eddy shall vote for two State Representatives, for the Nineteenth District, we do further proclaim that at said election the qualified voters of the County of Eddy shall vote for a District Attorney for the Fifth Judicial District, and we do further proclaim that at said election the qualified voters of the County of Eddy shall vote for one State Senator from the Twentieth Senatorial District. And we do further proclaim that the qualified voters of the County of Eddy shall vote for the following officers to be elected by the County of Eddy:

AN OPEN LETTER

TO THE VOTERS OF ARTESIA AND NORTH EDDY COUNTY:

Two years ago you honored me with the office of County Superintendent of schools. Approaching the close of my first term I offer the following account of my stewardship:

- (1) During this period of time the educational qualification of the average rural teacher has been increased from a little less than two years of college training, to two and one-half years of college training.
- (2) The instructional service rendered in our rural schools has been improved through better trained teachers, texts furnished all indigent children and the furnishing in sufficient amount all necessary school supplies.
- (3) Introduced use of standard graduation tests for all children completing the eighth grade of rural schools.
- (4) Particular attention has been given to the safety factor of school transportation. For the first time school busses have been required to carry all safety devices. All trucks have been compelled to carry Public Liability Insurance, thus protecting you against any financial loss incurred by reason of your child being injured in any accident while riding to and from school.
- (5) An honest attempt has been made to curtail school expense keeping in mind the interest of our school and justice to the teachers as well as regard for the taxpayers ability to pay.

Direct charge accounts for all rural schools of North Eddy County have been reduced as much as from 200 to 400 per cent.

The Rural Administrative Account (Office account of County Superintendent) during this period has been reduced 30 per cent.

Both Direct Charge accounts and Rural Administrative reductions were made at the insistence of your County Superintendent, and not as a result of demands made by taxpayers.

The above statements are simple facts, taken from the public records of Eddy county.

I am now asking your support in my race for a second term. It has been my purpose to maintain and improve the efficiency of our rural schools, attempting to hold our nine month term, yet keeping our expenditures within the taxpayers ability to pay. If you don't believe it has been a big job, ask yourself or any other taxpayer. If re-elected I shall pursue the same course.

Being quite human I have made some mistakes and some enemies while serving your schools. If re-elected I expect to make some mistakes and some enemies.

I am not so foolish as to imagine I have made you the best county superintendent you might have had. I, along with your most splendid State Superintendent and some dozen of your best City Superintendents of New Mexico am not a college graduate.

I have done work in The East Texas Teachers College, The Texas University, The Abilene Christian College and The Normal University of this State.

While I deplore my lack of a finished college education and somewhat envy the man or woman who possess such, I do believe my lack of that does not in any way serve as an impediment in administering to your rural schools.

Before going into the office of County Superintendent of Schools January 1, 1931, I had taught for twelve consecutive years in rural schools. During that period I feel that I gained more knowledge of rural life, rural people and the problems of their school than might have been gained by an equal number of years spent in the study of the theory of rural education in the best college in the land.

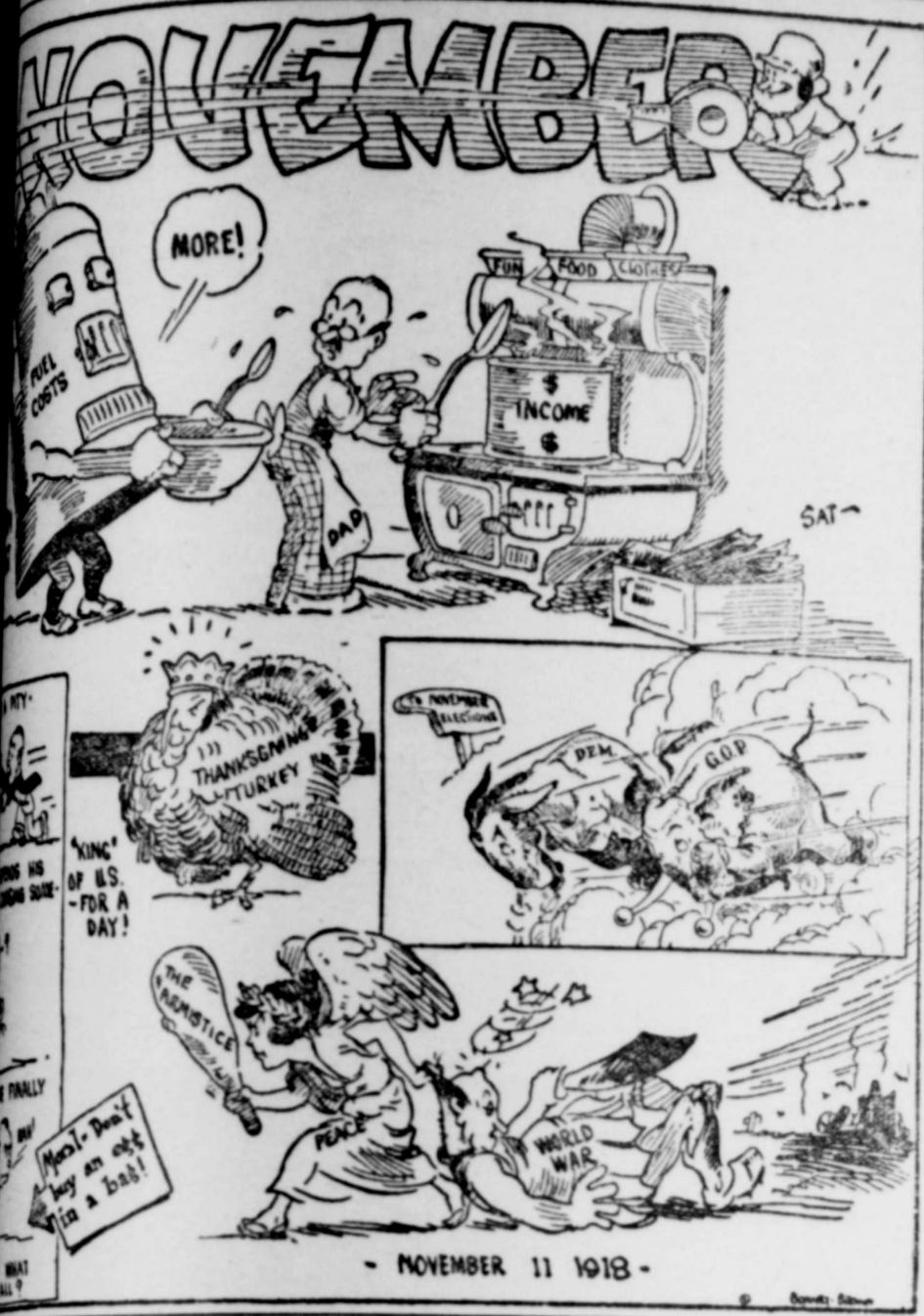

SHUART RAPS MOON IN SPEECH AT PECOS THURSDAY NIGHT

Governor Arthur Seligman did not submit the names of his boards and commissions to the state senate for confirmation because "he would not subject citizens of New Mexico of the caliber and prominence that he sought to make up the boards and commissions to the indignity of asking consideration of their appointment from a group of petty partisan politicians who used their positions as state senators more for the purpose of obstructing the beneficial program of the democratic administration than to advance the welfare and interests of the people of New Mexico," according to a prepared address by Harry Shuart, publicity manager for the democrats and editor of New Mexico, at Pecos Thursday night.

Mr. Shuart considered several members of the senate singly and failed to find anything good in them.

Regarding Z. B. Moon, Eddy county democrat, he said:

"To have submitted to any group of which he was a member the name of any self respecting citizen of New Mexico for consideration would have been an insult."

He referred to Hugh B. Woodward, lieutenant governor under R. C. Dillon as "a man whose reputation is that of a double crosser," and said that criticism of Seligman from him "is not likely to receive serious consideration."

Republicans have charged, he said, that failure to submit these names for approval was a violation of the law.

"Based on that contention," he averred, Governor Seligman also violated the law when he did not follow out the mandatory provision that 1 1/2 mills property tax shall be levied for highway purposes."

Seligman's refusal here saved the taxpayers \$900,000, during his administration, he said.

NEW MEXICO COTTON IMPROVES IN QUALITY

In recent grade and staple releases by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, covering New Mexico, Arizona and California, New Mexico showed a larger percentage of cotton in the higher classes and better staples than either of the other states, says G. R. Quisenberry, of the New Mexico state college. This shows that the cotton improvement program, fostered by the New Mexico State College and the New Mexico Crop Improvement Association is obtaining definite and progressive results.

The staple lengths reflect on the work done by the Extension Service during the past eight years, in cooperation with the New Mexico Crop Improvement Association. Pure seed has been released thru the Extension Service to the different crop improvement units in every county where cotton is grown. In this release 34 per cent of the New Mexico cotton staples run from 1 1-16 to 1 3-32 inches, and 66 per cent to 1 1-8 inches and better. This was the highest record of any state. All the grades show 78 per cent of extra white good middling and better and 22 per cent extra white strict middling.

New Mexico cotton growers have practically eliminated all cotton except Acala and little seed planted during the past year was more than two years removed from certified seed. This cotton is demanding a premium over other cotton sufficient to more than cover the freight from New Mexico to concentration points.

The Acclimatization Station at State College, which is under the direction of the Bureau of Plant Industry, is, at present, turning its stocks of seed over to the College. These are then released by the Extension Agronomist to the individual crop improvement units in the various counties and they in turn are distributing this seed to farmers in their immediate vicinity, thus making certified and pure seed available to every cotton grower in New Mexico. Not only is the staple of this cotton holding up, but, according to the Census Bureau figures, the acre yield of lint has been increasing in New Mexico for the past ten years.

CAVERN VISITORS

Cavern visitors for November totaled 2,524 against 3,310 for November of 1931. Forty-two states and thirteen foreign countries were represented among the visitors.
