

TAXES

Some beautiful theories are being advanced as to the most feasible manner of equalizing the burden of taxation. Due to the present world wide financial condition, an equitable distribution of taxes is made more difficult because taxes can be considered practically a fixed expense, which can not well be raised or lowered with commodity prices.

All of the world's wealth has its origin in land and for this reason an advalorem tax is fundamentally the soundest method of raising revenue yet devised except in times of stress. The present local difficulty is not due so much to the fact that our advalorem tax is unsound as to the fact that farm land valuations have been too high.

Many new sources of revenue have been opened up in the form of the sales tax, the income tax, the inheritance tax and the corporate tax, but just as fast as new sources of revenue have been opened up, the politicians have hastened to overload the source.

Mr. Caswell Neal's analysis of the tax situation made here last week at a taxpayers meeting was amusing in many respects. Especially so in the light of recent developments. Many in the audience recalled that Mr. Neal urged the election of the present state administration from the same platform about six months previous. The four laws up for referendum are known to be pet measures of the state administration. Politically Mr. Neal has reversed himself and he now asks the citizens to kill four bills passed by an gives us an idea. 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

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



When he arrives at S. F. he finds that a woman has fallen and broken some ribs. She has been attended by a trained nurse who has applied strapping-the correct treatment. But after the nurse left the patient decided she did not like strapping. Therefore she took it off again. Therefore she is in pain again. But of course she is in no danger. The illness had been exaggerated on the telephone in order to persuade the doctor to travel sixty-six miles from home.

Every doctor has had experences similar to this true story. Tender hearted doctors have many of them. Ordinary doctors are SHOW AN INCREASE disposed to refuse such calls from time to time. Sometimes the danger to the patient is real but the doctor does not believe it. Can you blame him?

Health work must be planned. A rural clinic requires that mothers travel long distances-perhaps to the school house-with babies or toddlers. The health officer should not be expected to answer sick calls, while he is on duty as health officer.

What is regarded as one of the most remarkable of recent developments in man's war upon cancer has been made by this Soviet scientist. Prof. M. F. Sitovich, a graduate of the Military Academy of Medicine and hearer of the title of "Udarnik," one of the highest honors awarded by the Soviet union. Professor Sitovich's test is based upon the inhaling of chlorine by the patient. He says that the blood of a healthy person has invariably hemolized after chlorine inhalation, while that of a person afflicted with cancer has not hemolized in any of the tests he has conducted
