A CHANCE FOR A NEW INDUSTRY

There is an opportunity of starting a small but profitable business here in cooperation with the mountain farmers and truckers. The statement is made without knowing all the facts connected with the proposed industry, but with a general knowledge that leads us to believe such a venture would be practical. For several years farmers and truck growers in and about the Mayhill community have been selling cabbage to the valley points. The local market, however, is not adequate to make the growing of cabbage profitable. A year or more ago several farmers of this vicinity including W. A. Grice was approached with a question of why it would not be practical to establish a small sauer kraut factory in the mountain section, since kraut is growing in popularity and would furnish an additional market for the cabbage.

Farmers of that vicinity have never seen fit to commercialize venture of this sort, but according to Mr. Grice they believe a small kraut factory could be established here with profit, both on account of the climatic condition and because of the excellent rail connection. Truckers from the mountain section offer in excess of 500,000 pounds of cabbage a year on the market to this section. The market, however, is limited and can easily be overloaded.

A venture of this sort might require lots of energy to get it started, but would require little capital. At least it is worth thinking

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

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



RUSSIA SEES VICTORY IN EVENT OF WAR WITH THE JAPANESE

MOSCOW-The full extent of a soviet ring of iron and concrete fortifications along the Manchurian border was revealed Sunday with publication of the text of General Vassily Constantinovich Bluecher's address to the communist congress.

General Bluecher is commanderin-chief of the Russian armies in the Far East. He described to the all-union congress in an address given last Thursday a red army so strong that it will "administer a blow capable of cracking and in some places destroying the very foundation of capitalism" in event of a Russo-Japanese war.

Challenges Japan General Bluecher challenged what he said was Japan's "feverish preparation" for war. Amid frequent cheers from delegates, the fighting man in blunt language cited three factors to support his accusation that Japan is converting Manchukuo into an armed

1. Construction of 1,000 kilometers (approximately 620 miles) of strategic railroads in North Manchukuo in the last two years, only 35 per cent of which, he said, were economically necessary.

2. Construction of 2,200 kilometers (approximately 367 miles) of highways in the same region. 3. Construction of 50 airdromes and aviation bases, concentrated north of Mukden.

"It is regrettable," said General Bluecher, who would have the responsibility of directing Far Eastern military operations in the event of war, "that the present policy of the Japanese imperialists does not guarantee we will not be involved in military com plications despite our effort to avoid them."

VERNON TATE SHOT TO DEATH ON BUSY STREET IN CLOVIS

A feud of several years stand-Mrs. Bryant Williams of Hope ing flared anew on a busy Clovis and when the smoke of its guns cleared, one man, Vernon Tate, lay dead and the three brothers were under arrest.

Vernon Tate, acquitted in 1930 of shooting and killing G. C. Bohanan and his son Carl, 19, was instantly killed and Carsey, Bee and Louis Bohanan, sons of G. C. Bohanan, were taken into custody several minutes later.

Tate was shot within 50 fee of where the elder Bohanan and his son, Carl, were shot on January 18, 1930, as he stepped from his car at a busy street corner shortly after two o'clock Monday

As he approached the curb at the corner, the three Bohanan brothers suddenly appeared and a fusillade of shots followed. Tate is alleged to have drawn his gun as the three men approached him. The shooting broke out and he fell fatally wounded in the gutter. Although the tragedy took place

during the peak of the afternoon's business at Clovis, no bystanders were struck by the flying bullets. After the shooting, Louis Bohanan ran to the offices of a doctor nearby where he took refuge until arrested by officers some few minutes later. Carsey and Bee ran into the Citizens Bank where they took refuge in the vault. All were armed. Louis Bohanan when taken into custody had a .38 automatic and rifle, and all the shots had been fired from the automatic. The rifle

had four unfired cartridges. One witness said Tate stepped back from the curb as the shooting started, his pistol in his hand. Two empty shells were found in his .38 caliber pistol, but the witness said he could not tell whether Tate had fired those bullets. He fell with the Bohanans firing at him from the front and rear. Two automobiles standing close by were perforated by the flying bullets.







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AVIATION REACHES 30TH BIRTHDAY

Aviation has progressed a long way since December 17, 1903, when Orville Wright made his memorable flight at Kitty Hawk, N. C. Since then, flying has become not only a major means of transportation, it has influenced profoundly every other method of transportation, by competition

and example Improvements in airplanes, however, are traceable in almost every case to improvements in the materials from which they are made, particularly in the case of metals. Because the flight of a plane depends upon its power to lift its weight from the ground, the first necessity has always been to provide maximum has required metallurgical ad-

The famous Liberty Motor, for | example, was a triumph of metal-lurgy. Through the use of molybdenum, an alloy that imparts great toughness to steel, it was possible to make the Liberty Motor light enough to develop one horsepower for every two pounds of weight.

Today the most advanced airplane engine is probably the Wright Cyclone. This is the engine used by Colonel and Mrs Lindbergh in their recent 30,000 mile flight. molybdenum steel. Fortunately, for war purposes, the United States has approxi-mately 85 per cent of the world's known supply of molybdenum. SANTA FE ASKS FOR TAX CORRECTION

Charging that the 5-mill tax imitation provided by statute was exceeded by the Eddy county board of commissioners in levying a special assessment upon all property in the county, the Santa Fe railroad requests correction of tax rolls on its property in a suit filed at Carlsbad in district court Saturday by Reid and Iden, Albuquerque attorneys, says the Current-Argus.

An "erroneous and illegal" charge of \$90.61 was made, the railroad company alleges, against its property as the result of a special levy of .000155 dollars on all taxable property in the county in 1933 assessments, made as a result of judgments against the county in two civil suits.

"Such corrections upon such tax rolls and showing thereon that the same was done under order of this court, and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem mete and just," are asked.

First judgment through which the levy was made, the information states, was handed down December 3, 1932, for \$1,000 with interest in favor of C. S. Brady in the case of the board of county commissioners of Eddy county against Robert A. Uihlien and others, ordering that a levy in sufficient amount to pay the judgment with interest be made by the commissioners and exempting the levy from the 5-mill limitation provided by statute.

Second judgment was May 18, 1933, against the commissioners for \$1,018.40 with interest in favor of W. H. Merchant in the case of the board of county commissioners against C. L. White and others, ordering that a levy be made by the board on all taxable property in the county for 1933 in amount sufficient to pay the judgment with interest.




