A CAMPAIGN PLEDGE

The Eddy county democratic primary, which is now passed history has served to remind us of the need of a uniform system for conducting such elections over the state. The recent primary was no exception with reference to charges of irregularities. These have always existed and always will, even with a rigid state law, but some of the most objectionable features may be eliminated by a good law.

The responsibility of the illegitimate or the illegal vote rests entirely with the candidates and by that we do not mean to make a sweeping charge and blame all for something one may have done or started, but it is a well known fact that there are occasions when the candidates or the candidate's friends are willing to overlook questionable votes if these questionable votes are in their favor, if not the votes of course are crooked. When one starts out to hire workers, his opponents naturally feel that they too must follow suit, however objectionable the procedure may be to them. In the mad scramble to get as many votes as possible, the question of the legality of the vote ceases to be a factor, but it's how have you voted or how many times have you voted that is important.

Thus it is, one candidate if he chooses can determine how clean the election shall be. If the vote is brought out, the others are going to get their share if possible.

The county chairman has said that if March 24th primary was to do over again he would call all candidates together at the time the names went on the ballot and seek an agreement among each and every one to conduct as clean a campaign as possible and not encourage illegal voting. "This would be impossible," you say. 

I suffered a good deal of anxiety but fortunately the little boy did not suffer at all-not even a looseness of the bowels. Not all patent remedies are as harmless as that!

Remeber too that strong caustics, like lye, and strong antiseptics, like lysol, are very useful to the person who knows about them but very dangerous in the adventurous hands of children. Keep poisons in their proper place.

MOUNTAIN GOATS CARRY UNDULANT FEVER GERM--REPORT

Extensive research on undulant fever is expected as the result of tests made by Dr. K. F. Meyers, professor of bacteriology at the University of California at San Francisco, on blood from Eddy county goats.

Dr. O. E. Puckett, county health officer, two weeks ago obtained blood samples from 52 goats on the ranch of Fred Cox at El Paso Gap and sent them to Meyers, according to the Carlsbad Current-Argus.

Twenty-three of the samples showed positive reactions to tests for the brucella basillus which causes undulant fever in human beings and contagious abortion in goats and cattle, Meyers told Puckett in a letter received Saturday.

The blood was taken from one herd of about 1,000 goats. Cox has about 3,500 goats on the




