





With a large part of the state dry, spotted showers that penetrated only a few inches have done little good wheat harvest of only 483,662,000 since dry winds bring the soil back to its former dry state in a few days time.

Terraced lands will hold the water and catch, in many instances, some adjacent run-off. These terraces and contours have afforded, in most instances where dashing rains have occurred, an absolute insurance against erop failure.
