




Faith Rewarded

Faith in southeastern New Mexico brought the first settlers to the Pecos valley. It was faith combined with hope that made the pioneers gamble with the elements in starting the first industry, the business of raising livestock. Agricultural development followed and then came a search for the hidden natural resources as a modern civilization demanded new sources of power and in the hunt for new sources of power the oil industry was developed. In coming to this section the oil operators faced the same uncertainties, the same gamble as did his predecessors in trying to wrest the undeveloped territory from the savages.

Back through the years of trial and error, a new industry was made, an industry that has meant much to the Artesia community and much to the state of New Mexico. Oil has brought a new source of wealth to the southeastern part of the state, it has brought new payrolls and new taxes to help support the schools, the county and the state institutions.

In the drilling of one deep well, an oil operator turns several thousand dollars into wages to be spent by the oil workers and drillers in the community in which they live. It is noteworthy to mention, since the fact has never been called to the attention of the public, that wages paid workers on one deeep well are equal and will probably exceed those paid workers in erecting the finest building in Artesia.

In connection with the upward turn in industrial activity of southeastern New Mexico, it is gratifying to us to note the number of improvements that have been made in the business and residential section of Artesia during the past six montths. Modernization of the homes as well as the erection of new buildings will make for a more substantial city, a city we hope will eventually offer the advantages of the larger population centers.

The Frazier-Lemke act granting a five-year moratorium for paying off farm mortgages and effecting billions of dollars of indebtedness was held unconstitutional Monday by the Supreme Court, at Wash-

In a decision ready by Associate Justice Brandeis, it rules on a case brought by the Louisville Joint principles of government, econ-Stock Land Bank against William W. Radford, Sr.

The federal disrtict court for western Kentucky and the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals upheld the legislation affecting farm debts estimated at \$12,000,000,000 by the Minnesota attorney general.

The Supreme Court's ruling was unanimous. Other courts had divided on the

act, some upholding it and others ruling it unconstitutional.

In signing the bill, forced thru congress in the closing hours of the last session, President Roosevelt said it probably would need amendment.

The law provided for the moratorium if attempts failed to scale a farmer's debts down to a figure he could pay. The property could not be foreclosed during the five years if the owner paid a "reasonable rental."

In addition, the act enabled the farmer to obtain full title to his property by payment of its appraised value, regardless of the amount stitpulated in the mort-gage, at the end of the five-year

Recent Rains Help Farms and Ranges Mrs. Grace Stiewig, widow of Ted R. Stiewig, who was killed in

Just one more rain and New Mexico farmers will raise a good feed crop; two more timely rains and the state should have one of says G. R. Quesenberry of the New Mexico State College.

Recent general rains over a large part of the state have materially improved the grass situation and insured a crop over most of the dry land section. They have added materially to the stored water supply, increased spring flow and generally improved the farming and range outlook over the entire state.

Farmers are planting their crops just as quickly as they can get into the field. Seasonal conditions should provide a means for farmers not only to grow enough feed to carry their livestock over another year, but to plant crops, the stubble of which may be left on the land and insure against dust storms such as have occurred during the past season. The best crops for this purpose are no doubt sorghum and sudan grass over a large part of the plains area, and millet in the higher elevations. Where terraces have been built, strips of alfalfa, broom grass, or other perennial crops may be planted with success above the terrace and the intervening strips used for the usual crop production This would protect the terraces in case of heavy rains and also prevent much erosion on the land

Seed stocks for most of the principal field crops in New Mexico have been located by dealers, government agencies and others. The Rehabilitation Corporation has now in storage for its clients large stocks of high germinating seed of the best varieties, which are available thru all of the county relief administrations to farmers who are being rehabilitated, as well as to others in the community. It was not possible to stock up with certified seed in a large number of counties, but the best seeds are available.







But in later times other rival towns sprang up in the country and the importance of Monument began to wane as other places outstripped it in the race for com-mercial supremacy.







Deep wells are drilled by the like a fish-tail, is screwed on the end of a long string of drill pipe, reaching from the bottom of the well to the top. At its upper end is a kelly-a rod of square section, thirty to fifty feet long. This passes through a square hole in a sort of horizontal gear-wheel, which turns it like an auger. The kelly is able to slip down as the bit bores into the earth. From time to time a new section of drill pipe is in serted to piece out the line.

Water Necessary Through the hollow tube of the drill pipe goes water, pumped under high pressure, heavily mudladen. This gelatinous mixture is jetted out with great force thru aperatures near the end of the bit. It picks up the cuttings from the bottom of the hole, and brings them to the top.

In very deep wells the viscosity of the mud must be carefully controlled by chemical means to prevent setting or clogging. Control
