

difficult to truthfully make a direct charge. Maybe he was playing while the small packers have been suffering. politics, but it was equally apparent that some of the ministers answering the administration's letter were just as guilty of playing

It is generally admitted that the recovery program has been too experimental to bring lasting results. No system that smacks of the ill influences of the dole has ever done that. But the American people have at least had the satisfaction of witnessing an experiment, where effort was expended. And perhaps in these experiments there were too many unsound theories advanced by the brain trusters.

Some ministers have also taken occasion to criticize the crop control program or the AAA legislation. They have branded the program as an economic waste. Whether it is an economic waste, it is generally admitted that the republicans, should they be successful in 1936, will find it difficult to drop the program. Some kind of

crop control program will be continued. A depression or a financial panic has always involved more or less of an economic waste. Back in 1921, when thousands of poor cattle were dying on the ranges and too poor to even pay the freight on a shipment to the packing house, this was an economic waste. And back through the years when efforts have been made to get the cotton farmers to voluntarily control the cotton crop, economic waste has been involved just as economic waste was involved in Hoover's 1932 suggestion that every third row of cotton be plowed under and the late Huey Long's suggestion that no cotton be ginned in 1932, even after the cotton crop had been raised. There was an economic waste involved during the four or five year depression with a surplus of practically every commodity, yet the

people were too poor to supply their actual needs.

When a nation can cease having financial panics and depressions, then economic wastes will cease and when an individual devises a scheme that will stop these unfortunate periods, he ought to be in the president's chair and not on the side lines.

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



GOLDEN **PHANTOMS**

Fascinating Tales of **Lost Mines** @W.N.U.

NAVAHO GOLD

WESTERN newspapers during the spring of 1915 carried a story which dates back to 1546. In that distant year, is said, the Spanish explorers of the West discovered a placer in the Navaho country. It was lost, in the manner of so many old Spanish mines.

James O'Rourke, a western congressman, heard the story, and was inspired by it to gather together a small party to go down into the Navaho country to search for the

The party succeeded beyond their hopes. In a canyon somewhere in that strange region they came across a pile of stones which marked the location of some 200 pounds of silver matte and also a number of fine nuggets.

The Navaho, however, had an idea that these white men were trespassers on their land. Any gold or silver that lay within the reservation belonged to them. So it was only natural that a band of these Indians should rout out the intruders, chase them up a box canyon from which they could not

Prospectors who happened to come that way finally rescued the party, which returned home much the worse for wear. The only treasure they had to show for this chase of the golden phantom was the handful of gold nuggets, which they had 42-1tp taken on sight.

> Perhaps that lost Spanish mine is the same as Pech-la-Ki, a word which is a combination of Navaho and Spanish and means "white

> This mine is also in the Navaho country, somewhere near the famous Four Corners where Colorado, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico meet. The Navaho had sold silver specimens from Pech-la-Ki for many years, and more than one prospector had tried to find the source of their wealth, but a series of lost lives marks the search.

> This, too may have been the mine found long ago by Merrick and Mitchell. They were young prospectors in the Navaho country who came upon a rude forge or furnace and some nuggets of gold. While they were searching for the ledge from which the ore had come. Indians discovered them and both were killed.





Italy Takes Aksum Aksum was handed over to Italy's northern army Sunday by the governor, who made his submission to General Maravigna at Aduwa, center of the newlyannexed territory. The capitulation enabled the Fascists columns to establish a seventy-mile line from Adigrat, through Aduwa, to



MODERNS LIKE

BE up-to-date! If you belong to that generation which didn't like prunes—don't admit it. It labels you as a person who be-longs to that by-gone era when in plays, in stories and in life cheap boarding houses always served badly cooked prunes. It was part of the scenery which went with the act-a bowl of under-cooked

Today people like prunes. And the reason is that canned fresh prunes bear no resemblance to the hard shriveled fruit of other times. They are bright plum-colored, juicy delectable fruits canned in a rich good syrupy juice.

For Delicious Desserts

Fresh Prune Soufflé: Beat four egg whites stiff and fold in four tablespoons sugar. Drain the fruit from one No. 3 can of fresh prunes, remove the stones and cut the pulp fine. Fold the pulp into the egg whites (reserving the prune syrup for beverages, sauces, etc.). Add one-half teaspoon almond extract, and pour into a buttered baking dish. Bake in a 350 degree oven for twenty minutes, or until it is firm and a delicate brown. Serve at once with a yellow custard sauce poured over it. This serves eight persons.



Remove the stones from the fruit in one No. 3 can of fresh prunes, cut the prunes in pieces and return to the syrup. Add one-third cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon clove, and one-fourth teaspoon Mix one-third cup cornstarch with one-half cup orange juice. Add to the hot mixture, and cook in a double boiler, stirring constantly until the mixture is thick and smooth. Cool slightly, add one-half cup chopped nuts and fold in two stiffy-beaten egg whites. Pour into wet molds and chill. Serve with whipped cream. This serves eight persons.

The weekly average consumption of apparel class wool by United States mills in July was 5,894,000 pounds, scoured basis, compared with 5,677,000 pounds in June and 2,300,000 pounds in July 1934. Reports indicate that domestic mills continued to operate at a high rate in August and September. Government contracts for wool blankets and other wool fabrics and the large business on upholstery fabrics for the automobile industry have contributed greatly to the maintenance of wool consumption at the highest level in years.

The 1935 shearing season in the important wool producing countries of the southern hemisphere has commenced in the early districts. In Australia and Argentina especially, the coming clips have been adversely affected by drought conditions during the past winter (June-August) but wool growing conditions have been very favorable in the Union of South Africa and in New Zealand.

Early spring rains improved grazing conditions materially in Australia, especially in Queensland, but there has not been much improvement in Argentina. Early frosts caused some losses of lambs in Argentina and the Union of South Africa.

In the northern hemisphere only the United States and France show decreases. The ten European countries show an increase of about one percent to 255,000,000 pounds.

August exports of wool, from most southern hemisphere countries, greatly exceeded those of a year earlier. Exports from Australia and New Zealand for the first two months of the new season, up to August 31, were twice as large as for the same period of

Cotton Letter

There seems to be an urgent demand for spot cotton and some who thought earlier that the basis would remain low have revised their ideas. Aside from a discussion of the basis, however, the market is beginning to attract attention because in some portions of the belt cotton is being offered which is in excess of allotments and price becomes of much importance on this portion of the farmers' crop.

The spinning world has been good buyers but there is now a tendency to let up a little and it is not surprising that the market sags from the pressure of hedge sales. This condition is likely to continue until the heavy movement is past, which should be about November 15 to 20.

On the other hand, those who know say that capital is coming to America from all Europe and banks (the large ones) are loaded with deposits where they are anxious to loan. There is every probability of increased credit inflation which finally will be reflected in higher commodity prices. Therefore declines from present levels should not be of long duration, even though some decline does take place when the present urgent demand slackens.


