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

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

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

THREE brothers named Rolle-stone went into the Uintah basin in the '60s, in search of gold. They found more than they were looking for in a rich silver and gold deposit-silver sulphide, sprinkled liberally with coarse gold.

The Indians had warned them, in no uncertain terms, never to return to the mine, but three years later they took five mules and went back for more of the ore. He said, at least, that it was in the Uintah reservation and that he had an understanding with the Utes so that he would be unmolested if he kept the place a secret. It is certain that men who tried to follow him were fired on by unseen per-

Rhoads made a trip into the unknown region every year for 18 years; then he died. A man named Hartzell married the widow in hopes, it may be, of inheriting the mine, but she did not know the location-and although Hartzell hunted for a long time for the mysterious mine he never sacceeded in locating it.




