The act authorizes an annual appropriation of not more than \$500,000,000.

Under the temporary plans of federal aid, the secretary of agriculture is authorized to make soil conservation payments to producers measured by (1) their treatment or use of land for soil restoration, conservation, or erosion prevention, (2) changes in the use of their land, and (3) the domestic allotment of one or more designated commodities. Productivity of the land affected is to be taken into consideration in making payments measured by changes in use of land or treatment of land for soil conservation.

The act authorizes the secretary of agriculture to utilize county and community committees of agricultural producers in carrying out the provisions of the act.




