## THE HATCH PROPOSAL

Of all the compromises suggested in the present supreme court controversy, that of U. S. Senator Hatch sound the most logical. Hatch advocates changing the court gradually and by piecemeal rather than the swift alteration provided in the Roosevelt court bill. The proposal is designed to at least get away from the charge that Roose velt is trying to pack the court, which many people fear. Hatch, regarded as a key man in the present struggle, has proposed to limit the appointment of new supreme court justices to one a year, whereas under the Roosevelt plan, six new justices should be appointed immediately if the six justices over seventy years of age did not retire immediately. The proposal would preclude the possibility of any administration gaining control over the supreme court.






