Sanitary Inspector Predicts a Flyless City With Order to Move All Livestock by May 15

Henderson, Floore Say Concert Group Old Artesia Ordinance Will Be Enforced in Order to Improve Sanitary Conditions.

Horses and Cows Affect-Include Chickens.

Carl Henderson of Carlsbad, district sanitary inspector, yesterday sued notice that the old Artesia city ordinance prohibiting the keeping of livestock within the city limits will be enforced beginning Cooperating with him is J. C.

Ploore, chief of police. Henderson predicted the move which is being made to eliminate unsanitary stock lots, should make Artesia practically flyless.

He and Floore have been striving to get livestock owners to keep their lots clean, doing away with fly and disease breeding places, but he said some owners will not comply. Hence the officers will

Alleys, streets and garbage collection are all handled well here, Henderson said, and he will not permit those efforts to be offset.

The sanitary inspector said that for its size, Artesia has as good a sewer system, with as high a percentage of connections, as any city of which he knows. But, he said he sees no point in keeping livestock within the city limits to counteract the good work done

> Farmers unable to participate in the 1939 AAA soil conservation program because of lack of funds for material to carry out soil building practices may obtain Farm Security Administration loans for this purpose through the local AAA committee, according to an announcement by Paul Ball, FSA rehabilitation supervisor in Eddy County.

"The entire amount of the loan must be used for practice to comply with the approved soil building practices," Ball said. "Amounts up to 60 per cent of the approximate AAA payment to be earned by the farm can be loaned. The loans will be secured by an assignment of the AAA benefit pay-

Ball said that in order to be eligible for these FSA loans, an applicant must be recommended by the AAA county committee, and unable to secure necessary credit



An amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, recently passed by Congress, is of particular interest to cotton and wheat farmers of New Mexico, according to Royce Banks, acting state executive officer. This amendment eliminates the provision in the law requiring that 80 per cent of the cotton and wheat acreage allotment be planted in order to qualify for payments on 100 per cent of the acreage allotment.

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



Will Make Loans To Wool Producers

Available on 1939 Production Same Basis as Last Year

The Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that loans to wool and mohair producers upon their 1939 production have been made available on substantially the same basis as the loans were made in 1938, according to Royce Banks, acting state executive officer of the AAA.

The loans will be available upon Etz & Cone, Nelson 1, NE sec. the security of negotiable warehouse receipts issued by warehouses approved by the corporation. Loan values will be determined by appraisers employed by the corporation in accordance with a schedule of classification and values for scoured or clean wool. It is estimated that the loans on the principal classes of wool will range between 15 and 22 cents a grease pound, basis Boston. In determining the loan values on wool stored at points other than Boston, adjustment will be made to reflect the proper transportation cost there. Loans to producers are expected to average 17 to

18 cents a grease pound. Loans on mohair stored at Boston or Texas points will be 30 and 20 cents, respectively, and 1 cent a grease pound less for mohair stored at other points.

The loans will be available from About April 15 to Oct. 31. They will bear 4 per cent interest and will mature 10 months from date, but in any event, not later than Nazarene Pastors May 31, 1940.
