News Briefs of the "Sunshine State," Gleaned from Many Sources

State Registration Director Earl Hennigan praised operation of the new permanent registration in the recent municipal elections, but expresend belief that a purging provision might well be inserted in the law by the next legislature. The act now provides for no closing of registration lists before municipal voting, although it does close them 30 days before general and primary elections. "It seems that closing of the books 10 or 15 days before the city elections would be advisable," said Hennigan.



London traffic is taking on a new and different aspect with the revival of the gas generator which is being used in lieu of the motor fuel tank on many British vehicles.

Wartime restrictions on the use manufacturing device with which engineers have experimented for years. One London omnibus hauls year 1940. Many cars of average horsepower have been equipped with genera-

tors, including trucks and tractors. A fuel of high calorific value is produced in the generator. This gas is cooled by air going to the generator, to which steam is supplied to keep the temperature below the ash-fusion point. On the way to the engine the gas passes through a dust-removing cleanser. Total operating costs for a 11/2-ton vehicle making a weekly round of 600 miles amounts to around \$40.

The Big Smoke Ship-Biggest day of the year for the Eskimos comes on a frigid morning in July when they scan the blizzard-swept shoreline for "the big smoke ship" which opens navigation from "the outside."
