Whites of 6 eggs, 21/2 cups of cake flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup shortening, 11/2 cups sugar, 1 cup sweet milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream sugar and shortening thoroughly, add milk and flour alternately, beating well after each addition, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites (do not beat until too dry), add vanilla and bake as loaf or layer cake at 325 degrees.

MEMO TO THE CITY DADS

As we continue to grow and the business section of Artesia expands, don't you think we should extend the fire zone?

And don't you think it should be done at once? We have noticed a number of new buildings in the last few months being erected in what within a very few years may be in the busiest parts of the city. And of them, a considerable percentage are of the most flimsy fire-inviting materials. Some, in fact, seem to be nothing more or less than firetraps!

Under the present ordinance, when the city clerk and manager are approached for a building permit, they have no stopcock, nor any authority to refuse to issue it, even though they may know in a, m their minds that the structure in question should be outlawed before

They and you and we know there are a number of old buildings on Main Street which should not be there. They cannot be repaired, because the ordinance does not allow issuing a further permit for them. And in a few years, after the fire zone has been extended in several directions, some of the buildings now being built or contemplated will be in the same state of affairs.

Even though some landlords, from selfish reasons, in order to put up buildings for high rentals at low cost, might not say they agree every age group. with us, we believe the majority of citizens of Artesia will support the extension of the fire zone.

Then why, we wonder, would it not be expedient to pass a revised ordinance at once?

BY WAY OF BEING CONSISTENT

We wish there were a traffic ordinance to regulate left-hand

We don't give a whoop whether the ordinance calls for inside or outside of the center of an intersection, but just some way designated, so inside and outside thinkers wouldn't meet head-on time

However, we strongly urge the inside turn, the method adopted the last few years in practically every large city-certainly in those 8 p. m. places where a study of the matter has been made, for it is much easier, much safer and less likely to cause traffic jams.

By the simple method of playing with a few scraps of paper on a roughly-drawn map of an intersection, anyone can see readily the advantage of the inside turn. But it isn't worth a hoot unless everyone observes it.

And the simple way to urge drivers to use that method is the painting of lines for them to follow. We'd like to see it tried at one intersection as an experiment—then an ordinance passed.

The credit for the innovation of in 1824, belongs to Colonel Marmeduke, who later became governor of Missouri. In company with about eighty traders he transport-\$25,000 to \$30,000 worth of merchandise to Santa Fe, some on the backs of mules but mainly in twenty-five wheeled vehicles, including one or two stout road wagons, two carts and the remainder made up was transferred to Clovis as car of Dearborn carriages. The desert route was surprisingly free of obstacles to wagon transportation and they reached their destination with little difficulty, considering that this was the first experiment

with wagons. At this time large capital was invested in the fur-trading business, but it was several years yet before the Santa Fe trade began to attract the attention of the financiers. Public-spirited men, however, had already begun to recognize the promising aspects of the growing business. The selling price of the American goods at Santa Fe was double the original cost. This allowed sufficient margin to control the market against wares imported by way of Vera Cruz and Chihuahua. A large proportion of the merchandise consigned from Missouri to Santa Fe was relayed during the following autumn by caravan south to Chihuahua. The goods were paid for

principally in gold and silver coin. A bill authorizing the president of the United States to appoint a commission to survey a road from the Missouri River to the boundary line of New Mexico was introduced in Congress by Senator Thomas Hart Benton of Missouri in 1824. The bill, as approved on March 3, 1825, authorized an appropriation of \$300,000 for marking out the road and obtaining the consent of the Indians to its unmolested use. The New Mexicans, just as eager as the Americans for the protection and development of the trade, in June, 1825, sent Manuel Simon Escudero of Chihuahua to visit St. Louis and Washington with a commission approved by

Governor Vaca. Benjamin Reeves, George Sibley, and Thomas Mathers were appointed commissioners to carry out the provisions of the bill and a treaty was made with the Osage Indians \$800 in merchandise. Herndon said the Arizona Hotel Association has promised full cooperation in an effort to boost the two states' tourist business. "We believe the combined attractions of the two states offer greater variety and interest than those of any other areas in the U. S.," he added.

The Coronado commission annnounced that Spanish Ambassador Juan F. De Cardenas would visit Santa Fe during his visit to New Mexico and dedicate the Coronado museum at Bernalillo.

Preliminary reports for the census in Hot Springs, Deming, Silver City and Hatch showed population gains for each. Hot Springs showed a 1940 population of 2,740 as compared to 1,336 in 1930, a gain of more than 100 per cent. Deming's 1940 population was reported as 3,591, as compared with 3,377, a 10-year gain of 214. Silver City's figures are 5,015, as compared with 3,510 in 1930, an increase of 1,505. Hatch reported \$23 this year as against 364, a gain of 459 and more than doubling the population.

State Game Warden Elliott Barker announced the successful conclusion of a two-year hunt for a huge stock-killing bear in the San Mateo Mountains. The animal was killed by State Hunter John St. John, who reported its footprints measured 101/2 by 6 inches.

Application for a grant to build a \$25,000 aeronautics laboratory has been submitted, University of New Mexico officials announced. The laboratory would be located on the campus and would be designed to permit more cooperation between the school and the civilian pilot training course, offered at the university and other colleges throughout the country.



Five trips with the lifeboat accounted for the 51 men in the S-48, a hazardous rescue in rough seas and strong winds.
