# Production Started in Quarter Muncys Injured Million Dollar Refinery Here

New Plant of New Mexico Asphalt & Refining . STORES TO CLOSE Company Is Major Unit in State-Makes Outlet \* for Getty-Wills Crude.

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#### EQUIPMENT ADDED . Chamber of Commerce,

Cracking Furnace, Storage and Others Built \* Since May.

Artesia's newest quarter million dollar industry, the refinery of the New Mexico Asphalt & Refining Company, went into operation Saturday, when the first petroleum products began coming fom the stills after exhaustive sts had been made a few days

The refinery, at the site of the former Midwest Refining Company plant, has been under contruction since May, and workmen still are busy adding some buildings and finishing up the plant, which includes a 2,000 barrel cracking unit.

The new Artesia business is an important development for New Mexico, for it is one of the major manufacturing units in the state. This is especially true as more than half of the gasoline consumed in the state is imported, in spite of the fact the oil business is one of the most important industries of Southeast New Mexico.

The refinery also gives an outlet for 1,000 barels of crude a day from the Neil Wills area, which heretofore has had no outlet.

#### IS CLIMATE SWAPPING WITH MID-WEST?

Climatic conditions change over the ages; we all know that. But does it ever happen within the lifetime of a person?

Our old boss on The Edina (Mo.) Sentinel has been wondering just that, while we, many miles away, have been wondering the same

That country up there, although it has its dry years, is known as a relatively wet section. However, the dry years seem to be coming more frequently. In fact, up to a week ago, Northeast Missouri has had less precipitation since the first of the current year than Artesia had in May, which has been added to in every other month.

While the desert in Southeast New Mexico is green and lush, the farmers up Missouri way are about to lose their year's labors for want of water. Of course, they don't irrigate there, but then the farmers a. m. in the Pecos Valley have needed to irrigate very little this year because of well-timed rains.

Then there is the mater of water for human consumption. Here we have an inexhaustible Artesian supply; in the old home town the reservoir has gone dry and the city dads are hurrying up the cleaning out of old and forgotten wells.

For the well-being of the citizens of both localities, we hope the climates are not being exchanged. Up there they need much rain p. m. every year; here we do not. In this section we have plenty of underground water for crops and the average rainfall on the ranges is enough to provide for the livestock. And besides, the arid climate in New Mexico is one of its most delightful assets. Rain here makes things green, but it plays hob with the humidity.

If the climate changes, it will be tough both ways.

#### OR WAS IT JUST A DREAM?

Although we dream frequently, seldom do we remember afterwards what it was about. And it is very unusual for us to dream about something which just has happened; it is more likely to be about some event or events remote from our conscious thoughts.

But we had a dandy the other night, a matter of hours only after we had attended the rodeo at Carlsbad. We dreamed we were awarded the sweepstakes award of the

whole blooming rodeo!

Imagine how startled we were to realize this when we awakened, when we have some difficulty mounting the hurricane deck of a tame plug, let alone staying aboard a wild bronc.

But it all was very simple, after we managed to bring back more of the dream; it was accomplished by entering every event in the whole shebang-something no other cowpoke seemed to have the nerve to do-and then failed to compete, but watched from the grandstand. Although we hate to compare ourselves—even in a dream—to

At any speed—other than very, very low—let the engine help you brake. It doesn't hurt the engine and it doesn't require any gas. In using the engine for a brake, leave the clutch in until you are nearly to the stopping point. Then kick the clutch out and make the stop. In the illustration, the left foot is getting ready to depress the clutch pedal when the brake and engine have slowed the car down to the proper speed.

If you can see far ahead that you must make a stop, the engine can do much of the braking for you and thus save the brakes from excessive


