#### DEMOCRACY LIES IN YOUR HANDS

We have been hearing considerable about the lack of morale among the drafted men in the armed forces and have been reading even more about it in various magazines, one of which rather hit the nail on the head this week.

That publication intimated that the new soldiers are a bunch of sissies pantywaists partly because they are not being trained as soldiers should be and partly because they cannot be so trained for lack of equipment.

And the article brings out the point that the men resent the fact that material is not being provided because of tie-ups, strikes and other delays among the civilian population. All of which probably explains the matter.

However, the article goes on to explain that soldiers are supposed to be men trained to fight, and to be so trained they must have a a. m. fighting spirit. Whereas the draftees and those who enlisted in 1917-18 were fighting mad, the present soldiers just cannot get that

Of course, they are opposed to Naziism and Germany and are in favor of Britain and democracy, the article brings out, but that is as far as it goes.

Frankly we do not blame the boys!

Taken from their jobs and schools and placed in uniforms and sent to training camps, they find many of their officers little better educated in things military than are they as raw recruits, all because we, in our peace-loving way, allowed our armed forces to dwindle during two decades to such a point that there were neither officers nor enlisted men.

That cannot be helped now; the men and the nation must make the best of it. They must get along with such officers as can be provided and the commissioned officers must apply themselves so as to make themselves better leaders and gain the confidence of the men.

So that cannot be helped! But we do believe that we know how to improve the morale of every military man, from what we used to call "No. 4 man in the rear rank" on up. The answer lies with you and with us, the private citizens of the United States.

We are like the men in one respect; we do not have the fighting spirit. We do not mean to imply that we should be shouting for 8 p. m. war; on the contrary we do not want war. But we should be 100 per 8 p. m. cent in our preparation for any eventuality.

We should take the world situation more seriously. We should all believe that the Western Hemisphere can be invaded and that a real danger exists. We should quit this hiding behind two oceans. We should stop listening to the Lindberghs, the Wheelers, the Nyes. We should speed up production, speed up civilian movements, speed up our thoughts, speed up preparation for war.

And then-and only then-can we expect the boys in the training camps and in outposts to work hard at becoming efficient soldiers, at making themselves the greatest armed force this nation ever

And only then, when we do have the fighting spirit among civilians and military men and have become an armed camp, can we feel 7:30 p. m. that we, in the long run, can expect a lasting peace. Probably we will have to fight, but our soldiers will be trained for it and will have a spirit to fight for democracy and for their nation, thus making them | m. more efficient, better able to take care of themselves, insuring a smaller loss of life and property, a quicker solution of the world's

The question of morale lies not with the boys, but with you.

### NOT AS DUMB AS WE LOOK

Sometimes we know about things, big things, weeks before they happen, for most people realize that a newspaperman should be informed about what is to come and he is "let in on the know."

He then can cooperate in the matter, watch for developments and release news regarding it if and when the time comes. Seldom does a newspaperman jump the gun, and only then in order to accomplish something by way of speeding it up, whether ill-advised or

The point is that there are times when news-frequently somewhat garbled-filters out and becomes a general rumor before it is published in the local newspaper. Still, perhaps, the newspaper holds back until confirmation of the story.

So don't think that we don't know what is going on; we do. And when it can be told, it will be!

### BUT THAT'S THE WAY IT GOES






