Bulldogs Put on Good Performance, but Drop Game at Clovis Friday to Wildcats 13 to 0

Even though losing 13 to 0, the Bulldog gridders of Artesia High School put in their best appearance of the football season Friday evening at Clovis, where the locals held the Wildcats scoreless until late in the third period.

Coach Buster Riddle's lads rose to their heights against the Clovis High School eleven, when four desperate goal-line stands were made within the Artesia 10-yard stripe. Each time the Orange and Black stood off the highly-rated prep schoolers of the border city for four downs to stave off what seemed sure to be four scores.

Clovis blasted its way to a touchdown late in the third quarter and came back with another power drive in the final canto to beat the game and hard fighting Bulldogs. The Wildcats converted the extra point after the first tally. Too many big, experienced and fresh reserves told the story Friday evening, for it took everything Coach R. K. Staubs could rake together to pull out a narrow margin win over his old prep school protegee, Riddle.

Artesia drove twice to within fifteen yards of the Clovis goal-line but had breaks lost the ball for the Orange and Black both times.

Staubs' powerhouse began to roll with the opening whistle and was not stopped until it reached the Artesia two-yard line, after which LeRoy Harmon, Bulldog fullback, stood calmly in his own end zone and booted the locals out of danger. The Wildcats had driven to the 10-yard stripe for a first down and the Bulldogs were penalized half the distance to the goal-line on first down for unnecessary roughness. Four blasting tries at the Artesia line, which held like a brick wall, netted three yards and the Bulldogs took possession.

Minutes later Daugherty, Clovis fullback, intercepted Harmon's second down pass on the Artesia 40-

yard line and the Wildcats were off on another drive which ended as did the first with Harmon again kicking out of danger from behind his own goal.

Razzle-dazzle set up the next scoring threat late in the second quarter with the play, before it began, looking as though it would be the old sleeper pass. The ball was on the Bulldog 31-yard line and it was first down for Clovis.

Daugherty passed to Colvin, Wildcat halfback, who was standing out near the sidelines, but the halfback, instead of running the ball as is done on the sleeper pass play, passed, a long one complete to Krattiger, right halfback, who was knocked down on the eighty-yard line. Again the Bulldogs held and R. D. Wright, Bulldog right halfback, this time punted out of danger from behind his goal.

Clovis drove to the Bulldog one-yard line before the half ended but the Bulldog line held and Artesia again kicked out.

Daugherty drove over for the first tally late in the third period from the Artesia eight-yard line after power plays had set up the score. Daugherty converted for the extra point by the placekick method.

It was Daugherty again carrying the pigskin on the pay-off trip in the first two minutes of the final quarter. He pounded through the right side of the Orange and Black line from the five-yard line. This time he missed the try for conversion as the place-kick went wide of the posts.

Artesia's most serious threat came as a result of a Riddle special, that has worked for a lot of yardage at one time or another in every game this season. Harmon passed across the line to Dwight House, Bulldog right end, from the Artesia 40-yard stripe, and House lateraled to Allen Mills, local fullback, who carried it on down to the Clovis 23-yard line. There he fumbled and Harmon recovered for Artesia on the Clovis 14-yard line.
