

SAFETY COUNCIL SCORES AN IDEA

Perhaps there is nothing new under the sun, but the New Mexico Safety Council has compounded a new formula for safety out of old principles.

There are no new laws involved and the old method of an unsafe driver being reported maintains. But whereas heretofore such reports have come from police officers and have meant that the offender every age group. would be hailed into court, under the new method a volunteer corps of "safety patrolmen," resolved to make the highways safer for themselves, as well as others, will do the actual reporting.

Alarmed by the sharp increase in the number of traffic fatalities in the state-there were twenty-four in January-the council commissioned the members of the volunteer corps.






