Artesia is becoming one of the dirtiest cities we ever have seen, and a number of people have urged us to do some romping, by way of informing the proper people what they should do about it and how

to go about it. And that is just what we propose to do. But the strange thing about it is that those upon whom we are bles and study not about but the about to romp are not the same ones most of our informants intended.

We are not going to jump on the city, or its employees. We are not going after the scalp of P. V. Morris, city manager, under whose jurisdiction the cleanliness of the city comes. We are not going to address an editorial to Mayor Emery Carper and the other city dads.

This is intended for some of our largest taxpayers, the very people who have a right to see that the city is clean and to demand it. Those taxpayers are merchants and storekeepers—some of them.

They are the ones whose employees sweep out the places of business, both fore and aft, shoving all before the brooms, and depositing the trash and dirt in the gutters in front and the allays behind.

Of course, the New Mexico wind helps greatly in messing up the city, but there is nothing we can do about that. It is true that if there is no trash to be blown about, the wind can hurt nothing in that LAKE ARTHUR-COTTONWOOD

Strange as it may seem, while some of our good citizens, most of them those who do cooperate by not littering up the streets and alleys, would have us get after the city in regard to the disgraceful condition, the city dads themselves are up in arms against the unco-

The city is handicapped because of a shortage of money in the proper fund and by a shortage of labor and equipment. These conditions cannot be helped at this time.

Shortly before the war, the city purchased a large garbage truck, by means of which the garbage and trash disposal problem was greatly aided. We hate to think what it would be like today were it not

But that truck and its crew can do only so much, no matter how hard the men work, and they are compelled to spend so much time in the business districts that the residence areas are slighted.

Brainard said if the merchants do not cooperate by way of making it easier for the disposal men to do their job properly and promptly in the business section, the city will have to impose a sliding scale for the necessary work—and the upward trend would start Memorial Hospital, 6:15 a. m. in with the business houses.

It all adds up to untidiness and is summed up in what Brainard said, "I thing we have a very dirty town, the fault of the merchants

And we are inclined to agree with Brainard. And if you will suffer yourselves to walk through some of our alleys you will see what we mean.




