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Wise Counseling

VISE COUNSELING is always worth whole. Wise counseling, we feel, has resulted in \$200,000 being saved in the cash balances for the Eddy County schools.

And it was the counseling of local individuals, which won over those in higher state offices because originally budgets for the school of Eddy County not only provided for the spending of estimated revenues of over \$900,000 but the approximately \$400,000 cash balance on hand plus ne \$70,000 which did not exist.

But the final budgets, as approved, not only iminated the \$20,000 but approximately another \$200,000 and left it for the rainy day, which many feel may arrived.

The arguments advanced in counseling stressed clearly tax expenditures must be dropped. It emphasized the fact we all need many things we don't have and can't have because we haven't the money with which to pay for them.

The teachers' salary issue was undoubtedly settled. Because all teachers in Eddy County receive an increase of \$200 for the coming year. Teachers, who teach their second year in the county receive an additional increase of \$60 per year From Public Funds making for those teachers, who have taught one year or more an actual increase of \$230 for the coming year. The Eddy County teachers' salary schedule provides for an automatic increase of \$60 per year every year for 16 full years. Some counties increased this to 20 years this year. Eddy County, however, voted to leave this automatic increase to continue over the 16-year period, rather than for 20 years. This alone means that any teacher, who teaches 16 years in the county is drawing \$960 more per year for the sixteenth year, or more than she or he drew for the first year they taught.

Other things, such as providing ef temporary class rooms here, were not done. It perhaps could and should have been done under the new legislation, which permits the appropriating of 5 per cent of the maintenance and operation funds for buildings.

We got along last year and doubtless can again this year, yet temporary class rooms would have eliminated some of the half day classes, which have been conducted the past year and which

apparently will have to be continued.

Maybe another year can see that problem solved. Bonds, of course, have been voted for additional school plants if and when these

buildings can be erected. But wise, practical and business principles are going to have to be applied to all our spending of public funds. Business principles are going to have to be applied to city, county, state and federal

spending in the weeks and months ahead. Far to long now many have felt too much money was being spent for education, which wasn't being received. Too many theories have been employed and the practical side of life has been

neglected. Wise counseling can restore this and return us to the right pathway.

We feel we in Eddy County have made a splendid start and although we have far to go the fact we are now faced in the right direction certainly speaks well for the future.-O.E.P.

Most officials and employes are not concerned about the fact their salary is known or can be learned. They knew when they accepted the job they were working for the public. They accepted

their job knowing this. A democratic form of government depends on an enlightened people. It is only in those countries, which had such forms of government as prevailed in Germany and Italy and which prevails today in Russia, that public information and facts, data and public records are kept from the people, who after all, provide the money.

There is no room in America for those practices or for the attitude and conduct of dictators. Those, who have accepted public responsibilities and serve the public know this, even though they often times forget it.

Once again may we say that those filling offices, high and low, and elected to that post are responsible to those who put them in their office and they should remember this at all times.

and the sound capacity output of our agricultural plant." Broad requirements outlined by Secretary Anderson for such a program included:

Keep our agriculture geared to developments in other segments of the economy, to the end that a high level of income and employ

Helping maintain stability of prices at levels fair to both producers and consumers, through a long-range system of commodity price floors, modernization of the parity formula, and reduced costs of production.

An over-all land program make sure we conserve and improve our agricultural resrouces. Measures having to do with the welfare and rights of farm people -good prices and income, public services and facilities, improved employment opportunities and tenure - in short, the right of equal opportunity.

The learning and application of more and more knowledge-intensified research in biological sciences; research and service programs in marketing and distribuproduction techno and in efforts to expand industrial uses of farm products.





Ground-water work therefore starts with a geological study to find out in what places and at what depths such formations occur. PROMOTIONS: Officers who are not of the Regular Army now may apply for commissions in the Officers Reserve Corps and remain on active duty in their pres-ent rank in the Army of the United They will be eligible for the highest reserve rank to which they are at present entitled. Generally, this is one grade above their present rank. Approximately 50,000 officers from components other than the Regular Army are affected by the new War Department policy.

LEADERS: The search for men who can lead goes on in the Army. For that reason, a four weeks' school, known as the Potential Leaders' Course, is being set up at all AGF Replacement Training Centers. Enlisted men who show signs of having the stuff from which leadership is made will receive the instruction. Approxi-mately 960 students will be enrolled when the classes are running at full capacity.


