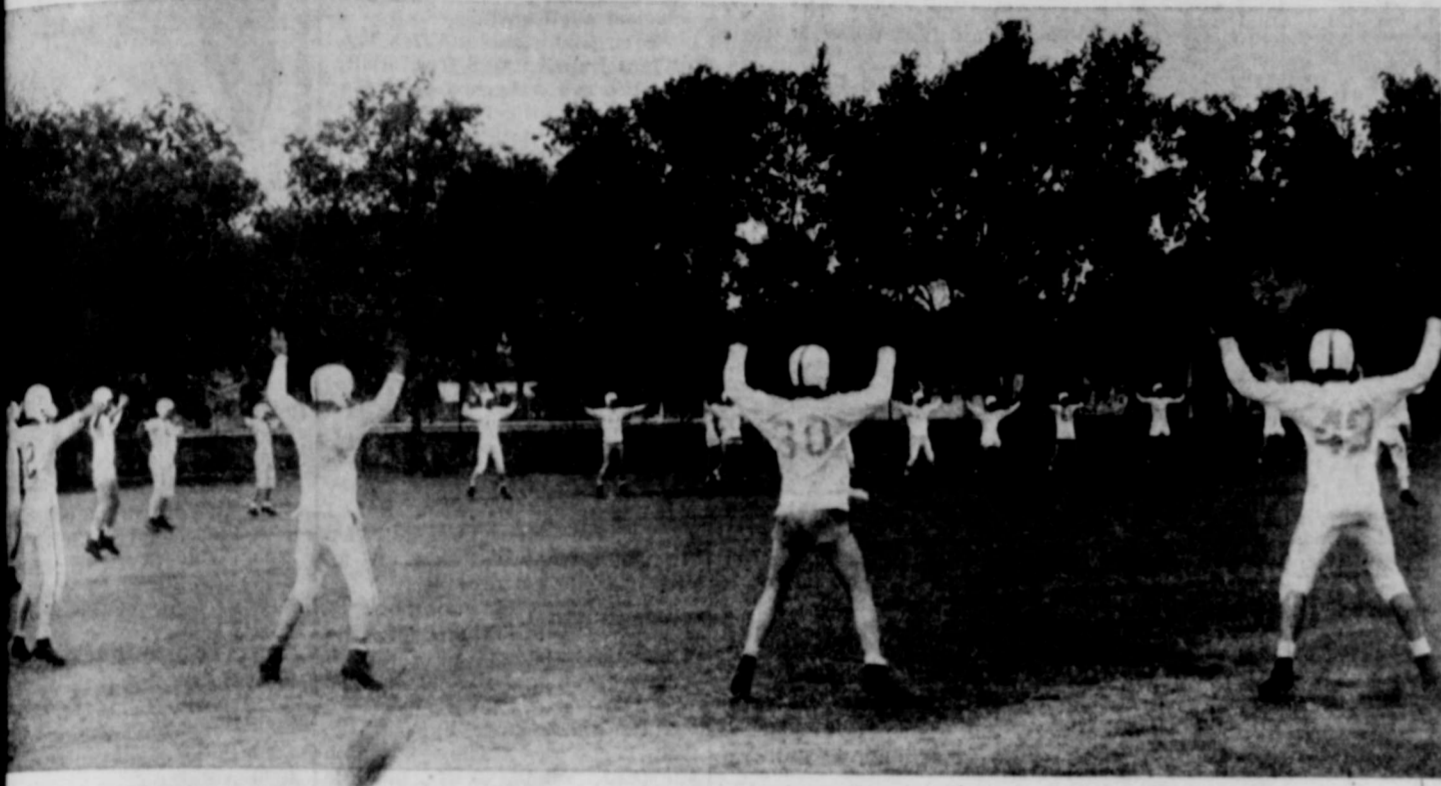

First National Bank Wins School Bond Bid

City Institution Is \$1,600 Under Outside Bidders

The First National Bank of Artesia was low bidder on the \$250,000 school improvement bond issue when bids were opened today and the local bank bid was unanimously accepted by the Board of Education.

There were three other bidders — the State of New Mexico, Zahner & Co., of Kansas City, and Quinn & Co., of Albuquerque, acting for the bond house of Lucas Eisen & Waекler, Kansas City.

The First National's bid of 2 percent interest, with payment at par value of the \$1,600 denomination bonds plus accrued interest, was more than \$1,600 less than other bids. Under the bid accepted interest cost to the school district on the issue will amount to \$15,000, less whatever interest has accrued from the July 1 date of the bonds until the school district receives the money for them.

State Alarmed At Ever-Rising Fatality Rate

By JOHN B. CURTIS SANTA FE (AP)—Gov. John F. Simms, alarmed over the recent drastic upswing in traffic deaths, today announced an immediate tough, statewide crackdown on traffic violators which will feature every trick in the book.

The state is not going to be too concerned over the ethics of its approach, the governor said. As he spoke, 39 highway deaths in July and 30 so far in August had skyrocketed the 1955 toll to 207—just even with the 1954 toll on the same date. The last few weeks had erased a margin of improvement which had ranged from 25 to more than 30 lives for many months.

Beyond Talk Stage "We've gotten beyond the discussion stage," Simms told a news conference. "I'm awfully upset and I'm coming out swinging. I want to stop this slaughter, and quickly."

"We are going to save some of these people's lives whether they want us to or not."

Unmarked cars boasting radio-including the governor's Lincoln limousine — will be thrown into the campaign. Simms estimated perhaps as many as half a hundred such cars would be obtained from various state agencies and even private sources.

The campaign will aim mostly at moving traffic violations, especially speeding and yellow line violations.

Help Tourist Trade Simms said he thought the program would help — rather than hurt — the state's tourist business. But even if the tourist business should suffer, he said, that would not affect his intention to go forward with the plan.

All Pecos Waters Running High; Crappie Fishing Reported Fair

SANTA FE (AP)—The State Game Department says rain and high water has contributed to poor fishing in New Mexico generally. The department painted this picture: Taos—Good fishing in Rio Grande above mouth of Red River; lower Red River murky, fishing poor; high mountain lakes, fair; rains have affected fishing unfavorably.

Raton—Lots of rain, creeks and rivers muddy, fishing fair with every kind of bait; Charette Lakes fair, still low.

Santa Fe—Fenton Lake and Cebolla fair.

Pecos—All streams high; Gallinas Creek and high country streams fair; Rio La Casa, Sapello Creek and Tecolote Creek poor; Collins Lake fair for crappie, poor for trout; Storrie Lake trout poor, some crappie being caught.

Reserve—Very poor fishing, water high.

Silver City—Wall and Bear Canyon Lakes poor for trout; remote streams are probably good, all streams high and clear.

Alamogordo—Fishing poor. Farmington—River muddy and high, conditions poor, little or no activity.

Capitan—Ruidoso Fair to good although murky, several limits taken; Nogal Lake poor.

Truth or Consequences—Caballo Lake poor, rising and still muddy; Elephant Butte Lake also rising; channel catfish and crappie fair, bass poor.

Gallup—Bluewater Lake fair, having a runoff; Indian reservation fishing good but roads are questionable; access depends on weather conditions.

Doak Walker's Last Game of Great Career

DALLAS (AP)—The year's only exhibition professional football game in Texas is expected to pull 50,000 fans into the Cotton Bowl tomorrow night. Most of them will be looking for Doak Walker.

The annual charity game sponsored by the Dallas Salesmanship club pits the Detroit Lions against the Philadelphia Eagles. Walker, the former SMU All America ball carrier, is with Detroit.

Both squads arrived so late yesterday that workouts were delayed until this afternoon.

Walker, the Dallas product playing his sixth and final season with the Lions, attracted the most attention as the pro players arrived. Among those on hand to greet him was Mayor Bob Thornton, who gave him the keys to the city.

Tomorrow will be Doak Walker Day in Dallas. The former SMU student will be playing his last game in the Cotton Bowl, and the 20th appearance in his college and pro career.

So far Walker has played before 1,010,000 fans in the big bowl.

Detroit Coach Buddy Parker, whose Lions have won four of their last five appearances in the Salesmanship club affairs, wasn't talking victory. He said his squad was not as far along as it was last year and that the Eagles, who have already beaten Baltimore 21-6 in an exhibition, are "up on us."

Satterfield Gets Decision Over Valdes

CHICAGO (AP)—Bob Satterfield, the unpredictable heavyweight slugger, pondered over his in-and-out fight progress today after scoring a unanimous decision over Cuban Nino Valdes, a leading contender for Rocky Marciano's title.

Satterfield dealt the giant Valdes his 10th defeat in 45 bouts last night in a nationally televised 10-rounder at Chicago Stadium.

In a bout that very few observers thought would go the limit, since both men had 75 per cent knockout averages, Satterfield hammered Valdes to the floor in the final round, but he couldn't keep him there. The Chicago Negro, outweighed 32 pounds and a 3-1 underdog, won a unanimous decision.

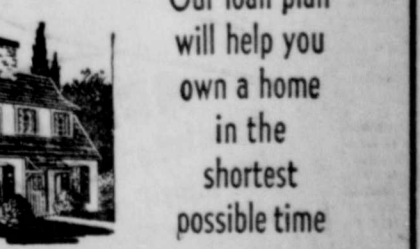
Satterfield weighed 183; Valdes 215.

Before last night's bout Valdes had won 23 of 33 fights by knockouts and was ranked No. 5 among heavyweight ring contenders. Satterfield has scored 30 knockouts in 38 victories. He has lost 19.

The Yanks, who three times have won seven in a row this season, gave up their chance at eight straight as Boston scored five times in the sixth inning. Grady Hatton and Jim Piersall faced Bob Turley for back-to-back triples to get the frame under way.

Delock, a 25-year-old right-hander who had failed against New York in two previous tries, checked the Bombers on two hits until the seventh when Elston Howard's double and a pinch single by Joe Collins scored the Yanks' run. He gave five hits for the night.

A two-night doubleheader between Baltimore and the Nats at Washington was rained out.

Brooklyn Loses In the National League, Brooklyn lost its second straight to New York 5-1; Milwaukee homered past St. Louis 11-4; Chicago regained fifth place from Cincinnati 3-2, and Pittsburgh defeated Philadelphia 6-4.

Willie Mays led the Giants' attack with a triple, two singles and a walk and figured in all of New York's runs. Ramon Montant, going the distance for the first time in the Majors, won his second while scattering eight hits and striking out eight.

Del Crandall's grand-slammer in the eighth put the Braves beyond reach, following earlier homers by Andy Pafko and Ed Mathews that had built a 5-4 lead.

Hank Sauer, only a sometimes starter with the Cubs these days, belted a pair of homers for all of Chicago's runs. Smokey Burgess hit a two-run shot in the first for the Redlegs before Bob Rush settled down for his 10th victory.

The Phils got three runs in the first, then Elroy Face knuckled down while the Pirates batted back with 16 hits, 11 of them off loser Curt Simmons. Richie Ashburn, tops in NL hitting, pulled a back muscle trying to beat out a hit and left the game in the second inning.

WHO DOES IT?

Beef Roasts Lead Weekend Shopping Field as Top Buys

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS
Shoppers in the nation's food stores will find a tempting variety of meats on the list of specials this weekend.

In beef, round roast will be a favorite and boneless chuck pot roast also will be popular. Steaks and prime ribs however, will be a couple of cents a pound higher than a week ago in some stores. Elsewhere, there'll be no price change.

Loins of pork will be a feature in some parts of the country. Few markets will offer specials on legs of lamb, but there will be good buys in lamb shoulder roasts.

Veal weather particularly popular as a weekend attraction, will be offered at sale prices in a number of markets. Veal shoulder roast will be the favorite cut.

Few Chickens
Only a few stores plan to feature frying and stewing chickens, although prices generally will be no higher than a week ago.

The rise in egg prices goes on. Increases of two cents a dozen on large grade "A" whites are planned in stores in many sections of the country. Butter prices show little change.

Pork prices should start coming down in the months immediately ahead. The U. S. Department of Agriculture says farmers expect to market considerably more hogs during this half of the year than they did in the same months of 1934. Abundant supplies should bring lower prices.

Eating pork this fall will help farmers in several ways. The USDA points out that when you eat pork you're also consuming some of the plentiful supply of feed grains. In most years, more than four bushels out of every 10 bush of corn is sold through hogs.

Vegetables Up
Stormy weather sent vegetable prices up in some sections of the country during the week, but the list of good buys offers a good variety, nevertheless. Produce men recommend onions, potatoes, peppers, tomatoes, eggplant, cabbage, pascal celery, and iceberg, romaine and Big Boston lettuce.

In the "moderately priced" classification—meaning they're not bargains, but not too expensive either—are beans, cauliflower, corn and cucumbers.

Cantaloupes and Honeydew melons are rated as good buys, with

THRIFTY KEBABS WITH BARBECUE SAUCE

Ingredients: 1 medium-sized onion (finely chopped), 1/2 a small green pepper (finely chopped),

prices remaining at what probably will be the lowest levels of the season. Watermelons and limes continue abundant.

Peach prices, which started out at a very high level, continue to drift lower. They took another drop this week.

Oranges and grapefruit are described as moderately priced by fruit specialists.

1/3 cup undrained sweet pickle relish, 1/3 cup cider vinegar, 1 cup chili sauce, 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco sauce, 1 can (12 ounces) luncheon meat, 2 medium-sized onions, 1 green pepper, small mushrooms, melted butter or margarine.

Method: Mix chopped onion, chopped green pepper, pickle relish, vinegar, chili sauce, brown sugar, prepared mustard and Tabasco sauce together in a saucepan. Bring to a boil; simmer about 10 to 20 minutes; reserve. Cut the luncheon meat in half, then in thirds and those pieces in thirds to make 18 pieces. Peel onions and cut into wedges small enough to hold together on skewers. Remove seeds and membranes from green pepper; cut into 1 inch squares. Remove stems from the mushrooms for other use; wipe caps with damp cloth. Alternate luncheon meat, onion wedges, green pepper squares and mushrooms in skewers. Grill over moderate heat, turning occasionally; until browned and heated through; onion wedges will be only partly tender. Brush skewer food with melted butter occasionally. Serve with reheated reserved sauce. It makes 4 servings. Any leftover sauce may be stored in tightly covered container in refrigerator.

HOT CORNSTICKS

Method: Sift together the flour, salt, baking powder and sugar; stir in cornmeal. Beat egg enough to combine yolk and white; beat in milk enough to combine; stir in melted butter. Add dry-ingredient mixture; beat just until smooth—about 1 minute. Do not overbeat. Spoon into 14 hot greased cornstick pans. Bake in hot (425 degree) oven 15 to 20 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Serve at once.
